15 Nisan 5781 27 March 2021

Join Rabbi David Novak and your Temple Sinai community for an online seder experience Saturday evening, March 27 at 6:30 p.m. Rabbi Novak will be using the new haggadah of the Reform Movement, "Mishkan haSeder." There is no charge and all are welcome.

Here's what you'll need on your end:

- ✧ A seder plate with the ritual items: matzah, karpas (Spring greens), horseradish, charoset, a roasted beet, a hard boiled egg
- ✧ A haggadah (even though we will be using different ones)
- ✧ Wine or grape juice and glasses for four cups of wine for each participant
- ✧ Your own meal for the "festive meal"

From Rabbi Novak

The new month of Nisan begins March 14th on a night when you will barely see the moon. As we have for thousands of years, the lunar/solar Jewish calendar begins a new month with a new moon. When the moon is full 15 days later you will know that we have arrived at our festival of freedom, Pesach.

Passover is rightfully one of our people's most popular and widely observed festivals because of the *seder*, a ritualized retelling of our narrative with an elaborate meal as the centerpiece. Hundreds (maybe thousands?) of *haggadot* have been created to interpret and reinterpret God's freeing our ancestors from Egyptian bondage.

Through words, through questioning, through ritual foods, we reenact and retell the story (haggadah means "telling"), encouraged to elaborate on what is in the haggadah.

I am particularly excited as the Central Conference of American Rabbis (CCAR) is introducing a new haggadah for the Reform Movement called "Mishkan haSeder." The new haggadah is described as:

"Combining age-old texts, fresh insights, inspiring poetry, new translations, and breathtaking art, Mishkan HaSeder offers beautiful new translations by Rabbis Janet and Sheldon Marder in conversation with an extraordinary collection of poetry from a diverse array of poets. The running commentary by Rabbis Oren Hayon, Seth Limmer, and Amy Scheinerman draws out the historic background of the seder rituals, builds on the social justice issues of our day, and offers contemporary connections to Passover. The text is complemented by full-color works from acclaimed artist Tobi Kahn that will enhance any seder experience.

"Mishkan HaSeder features poetry by Yehuda Amichai, Ellen Bass, Lucille Clifton, Edward Hirsch, Ross Gay, Emma Lazarus, Denise Levertov, Ada Limon, Grace Paley, Dan Pagis, Adrienne Rich, and many more."

Elsewhere in this edition of the Shofar you will see an invitation to our Temple Sinai first (and hopefully last) Zoom Community Seder on March 27, 2021 at 6:30 p.m. It is my hope that for those of us who are looking for guests for seder or have no place to be on the first night of Passover will join in with me and your fellow Sinai congregants.

Called "*Z'man simchat heruteynu*"—Passover is the time of our rejoicing for our freedom! As we retell our ancient story made new again, may we all find release from the narrow places that still hold us back.

Torah Portions March 2021

March 6—22 Adar

Ki Tisa (When You Elevate)

Exodus 30:11– 34:35

Moses stays with God on Mount Sinai for 40 days and 40 nights. There, he is given the 10 Commandments on stone tablets. Fearing Moses will never return, the Israelites turn to Aaron, who demands that everyone bring him their gold, so he can make a golden calf. When Moses comes down the mountain and sees the people dancing around this idol, he smashes the tablets on the ground. God punishes with a plague all the Israelites who were involved. Moses builds a tent to be his meeting place with God.

March 13—29 Adar

Vayakhel-Pekudei (And He Assembled-Accountings of)

Exodus 35:1 - 38:20 — Exodus 38:21 - 40:38

God commands the Israelites not to do any work in the sanctuary on Shabbat. The Israelites gather gifts for God. Moses appoints Ohaliab and Bezalel build God's Sanctuary. Aaron and the priests are given their clothing for work in the Sanctuary. Moses anoints Aaron and his sons to make their priestly positions official. A cloud descends upon the Tent of Meeting, and God's presence fills the Tabernacle.

March 20—7 Nisan

Vayikra (And He Called)

Leviticus 1:1 - 5:26

God describes the laws of animal sacrifice. God explains the different sacrifices that atone for guilt or sins, and distinguishes between sins committed inadvertently and sins committed on purpose.

March 27—14 Nisan

Tzav (Command)

Leviticus 6:1 - 8:36

God continues to describe the different laws of sacrifices. A distinction is made between sin offerings, burnt offerings, and homage offerings, with each following its own process. God then commands the priests to make another offering that ordains themselves in their positions.

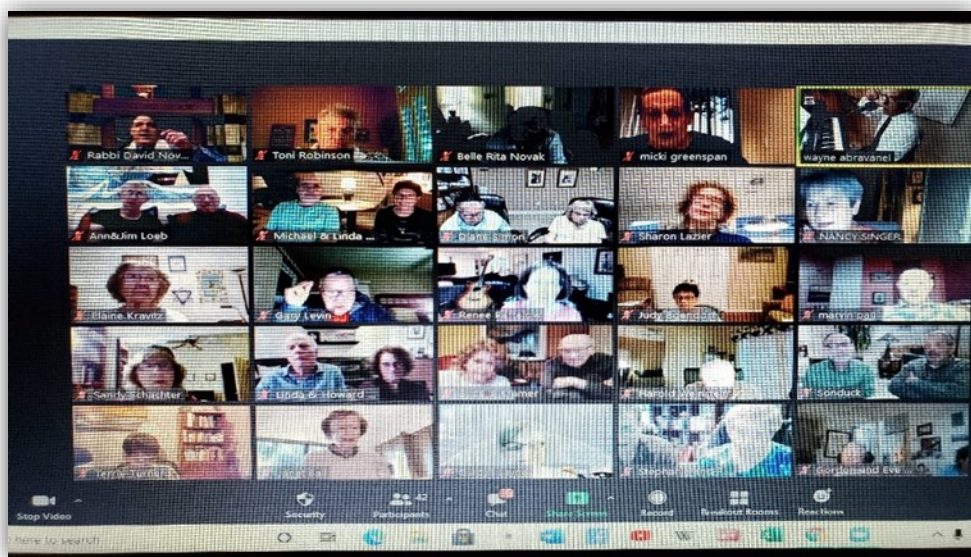

The Absolute, Hands-Down, Best Passover Apple Cake

Nu, who are we to argue?

INGREDIENTS

Dough:

6 eggs

1 cup oil

2 cups sugar

2 teaspoons potato starch

2 cups matzo cake meal

Pinch salt

Filling:

2 teaspoons cinnamon

3/4 cup sugar

Juice of one lemon

5 large Granny Smith or Braeburn apples,
peeled

Topping:

1/4 cup sugar

1—2 teaspoons cinnamon

DIRECTIONS

1. Grease a 9-inch springform pan. Place parchment paper on bottom. Heat oven to 350 degrees.
2. Beat eggs with sugar until blended. Add oil and beat. Sift together potato starch, cake meal, and pinch salt. Add sifter items to egg mixture.
3. For the filling, mix together cinnamon, sugar, and lemon juice. Mix in the apples.
4. Put two cups of dough (1/2 of the amount prepared) into the springform pan.
5. Add the apple filling (Minus the accumulated liquid).
6. Put in remaining two cups of dough. Sprinkle with sugar cinnamon topping.
7. Place springform on a cookie sheet since liquid may seep out.
8. Bake at 350 degrees for one hour.

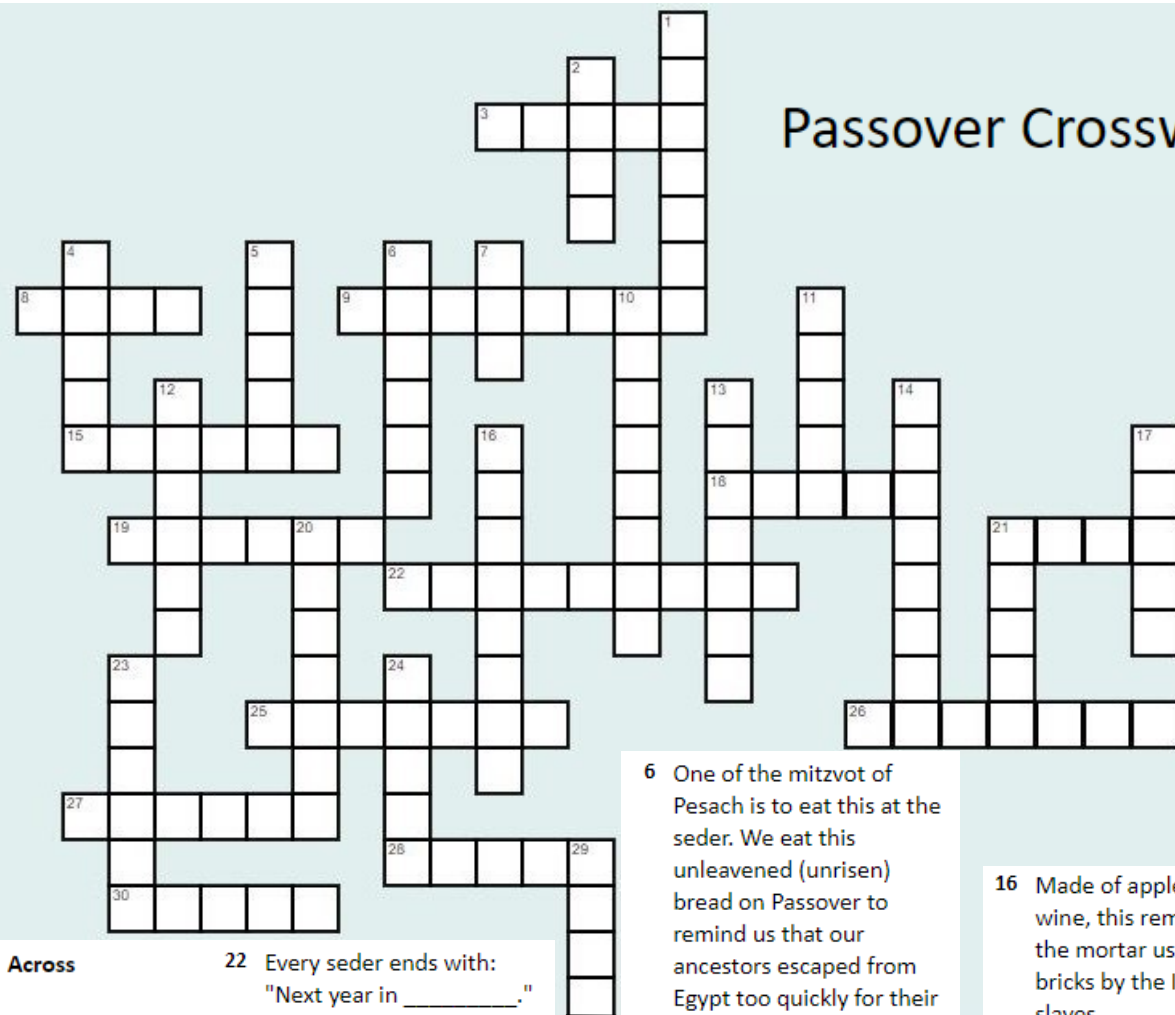

- 8 We spill one ____ of wine when each plague is recited, to remind us that Egyptians suffered, too.
- 9 The book that we read at the seder is Hebrew for "telling."
- 15 The Hagaddah begins the Passover story with "We were ____ of Pharaoh in Egypt."
- 22 Every seder ends with: "Next year in ____."
- 25 Punishments inflicted on the Egyptians.
- 26 Ruler of Egypt
- 27 Why is this night different from all other ____?

- 18 Moses' brother

- 13 Foods made from flour that has risen. Not eaten on Pesach.
- 14 Bitter herb dipped in charoset, eaten between two pieces of matzah at the seder: Hillel ____.

- 17 The sea that split for the Israelites to cross is sometimes called the Red Sea, and sometimes called the Sea of ____.
- 20 Lit before beginning the seder.
- 21 We dip greens into salt ____ to remind us of tears.
- 23 Moses' sister
- 24 "In every generation, a person must consider himself to have been freed from slavery in ____."
- 29 Bitter ____ reminds us of the bitterness of slavery.
