




From the Rabbi

This is a recent d'var Torah that I gave at Sinai on December 15, 2023, the first Shabbat after Hanukkah ended:

Israel is in a war against terrorists. Jews worldwide are mostly in support of Israel's aims, to destroy the terrorist infrastructure in Gaza while preserving civilian life. Meanwhile outside of Israel, here in the West, we are seeing acts that are anti-Jewish at synagogues, in public right-of-ways, on college campuses. This is a challenging time to be Jewish. It has always been a challenging time to be Jewish.

I have discerned this from two reasons:

The first is that we are a tiny people in the scope of the world population. There are perhaps 16 million Jews in the world (17 million depending on how you are counting) out of a worldwide population of over eight billion people. We are a rounding error.

The second is that most people in the world have never met a Jewish person. I'm not talking about in foreign countries. Even here in the United States where 90% of American congressional districts have no discernible Jewish population. We congregate along the coasts and in some urban cities. The population of the United States is 330 million—we are, on a good day, sixseven million, or about 2% of the overall population.

As an example of this let me share with you a time when I was doing interim rabbinic work on Florida's west coast in a suburban area. A group of confirmands came to the synagogue from a local Methodist Church. After the usual questions about the sanctuary: why the head covering, what are those lights on the wall, one student, a 16-year-old asked me what we thought of the second coming.

I had to think fast: Jesus does not play a role in Jewish life and we did not affirm his divinity. This is just one example of how we live around others, thinking that they understand our lives, and they do not.

Even at a recent Hanukkah party that I attended I had to explain to the non-Jews present why we observe Hanukkah.

There are many millions of people who just do not think about Jews, Judaism, or Jewish practices.

Then there are those who have never met a Jew who attract attention through their acts of vandalism, violence, and protest. This has been recently magnified on college campuses. In the US the president of the University of Pennsylvania resigned after her mishandled appearance before a House committee.

At campuses like Columbia and UCLA there are protests where students are making it challenging for Jewish students to study, let alone be Jewish. These attract attention. I read an article that shows that in many, many college campuses that is not the case. "In the Shadow of War: Hotspots of Antisemitism on US College campuses" a study produced at Brandeis, found that at a number of schools, including Duke, Washington University in St. Louis, Tulane as well University of Florida, Brandeis, Cal Tech, Florida Atlantic, Florida State, Penn State, University of Central Florida, CU Boulder, University of Delaware, and University of Miami Jewish students report far lower—though still significant—levels of antisemitic hostility.

Those that exhibited higher levels of antisemitic hostility were Boston University, Columbia, George Washington, NYU, OSU, Queens College, Cal, UCLA, UCSC, Michigan, Penn, and University of Wisconsin: all schools with higher levels of Jewish students. Most of the students polled experienced hostility toward Israel from other students; 30% reported encountering hostility toward Israel from faculty.

In a very small survey of students an Op-Ed writer in the Wall Street Journal queried 250 students who were saying "from the river to the sea" if they knew what it meant.

Nearly half of the students who embrace the slogan were able to name the river and the sea.

Some of the alternative answers were the Nile and the Euphrates, the Caribbean, the Dead Sea and the Atlantic. Less than a quarter of these students knew who Yasser Arafat was (12 of them, or more than 10%, thought he was the first prime minister of Israel). Asked in what decade Israelis and Palestinians had signed the Oslo Accords, more than a quarter of the chant's supporters claimed that no such peace agreements had ever been signed.

Would learning basic political facts about the conflict moderate students' opinions? Of the 80 students who saw the map, 75% similarly changed their view.

A third group of students claimed the chant called for a Palestine to replace Israel. Sixty percent of those students reduced their support for the slogan when they learned it would entail the subjugation, expulsion or annihilation of seven million Jewish and two million Arab Israelis. You get the point: college students are using a phrase without understanding the geopolitics behind what they are screaming. But it rhymes!

Last night we watched as our Hanukkah candles burned brightly, all eight of them complemented by the shammash. Hanukkah is a time that represents our being here in a world where being here has never been easy. The lights that we add each night progressively promote the miracle of our being. More than the cruse of oil that the Maccabees found and our sages codified, our lighting the menorah is a symbol in our homes that we will continue to persist, whether people know about who we are and what we do or not.

Our diaspora community together with our brothers and sisters in Israel lit and brought light into the world. Many of the Hanukkah menorahs in the destroyed kibbutzim were rescued and lit. We are still bringing light into the world.






The Paris Seamstress
