A MESSAGE FROM THE

Rabbi



Chadesh yameinu kekedem

We are in the three-week period of mourning that began with the 17th of Tammuz and comes to a crescendo on the 9th of Av, known as Tisha B'Av. It is the only day in the Hebrew calendar, other than Yom Kippur, in which the Jewish community observes a full 25-hour fast.

Tisha B'Av marks the destruction of the First and Second Temples and is understood to be the beginning of an almost 2,000-year-long exile of the Jewish people from our holy city of Jerusalem.

Today, as a community, in addition to the fast, we read from the Book of Lamentations, also called Eicha, which translates to "How can this be?" The text is a heart-wrenching cry by the prophet Jeremiah, as he walks the city now laying in ruin. Looking for a reason for this fall from greatness beyond the external fact of the Romans' conquest of Jerusalem, the rabbis suggest societal causes for the destruction of the Temples. They say that the first Temple was destroyed because of murderous behavior and the second because of baseless hatred, turning the focus from blaming others or even self-pity to examining how we, our own Jewish

community, treat each other.

As the prophet Isaiah preached "Learn to do good. Devote yourselves to justice; aid the wronged. Uphold the rights of the orphan; defend the cause of the widow."

The customs and traditions around Tisha B'Av can be a framework by which we can look at societal fracture, hate, trauma, resilience, and hope. As we learn from the prophets and our sacred narrative, the greatest promise offered to Jerusalem was the hope, the faith, that the people could return to upholding the ethical and moral underpinnings of our religion and that Jerusalem would rise like a phoenix, becoming a city of justice once again: "After that you shall be called City of Righteousness, Faithful City" (Isaiah 1.) As our Torah teaches *Olam Chesed Yebaneh* Justice, equality, and concern for one another will heal the brokenness.

Join us here at TBT on Saturday evening, August 6th at 8:00 PM for our annual Tisha B'Av evening program. We will study, pray, hear the haunting words of Eicha to stir our souls as we reanimate ourselves in working toward a better tomorrow.



A MESSAGE FROM OUR President



Hello, Friends Old and New,

Thank you for the opportunity to serve as your temple president.

Our tradition teaches us that our personal journeys in life should not take place alone.* As such, our lives are fully enriched by the participation in a transformative kehillah, a sacred community. It is within this community that one feels the warmth of others, develops personal relationships, and prioritizes caring. **To be part of a kehillah means to have a sense of belonging, a feeling that members matter to each other, and that Judaism can be best lived and experienced through a commitment to be together.**

After college in Indiana, we returned to Roswell, were married by Rabbi Tam, and joined Temple Beth Tikvah as a young married couple. For the past 30 years, Dahlia and I, and our daughters Emily and Hannah, have been proud to call Temple Beth Tikvah our community. This is our home.

Temple Beth Tikvah is where in community, my family and I mourned the passing of my grandparents and my mother. TBT is, where in community, we welcomed our daughters with namings, celebrated their consecrations, bat mitzvahs, and confirmations, and hope to see them blessed under the chuppah. TBT is where we have built lifelong friendships and created family with those whose relatives live far away. TBT is where we have been supported and embraced as we navigate the challenges, questions, and joys of life.

I am proud of Temple Beth Tikvah, its amazing clergy, its superb staff, its dedicated lay leadership, and its vibrant congregation, of which you are an essential part. This is my home, and yours.

As I start my term as your synagogue president, I want to personally welcome you home. We are all part of this community that WE share.




