

Friends - My heart hurts. Telling my 8 year old about the state of our world is so painful. This girl's heart fills with pride when reciting the Pledge of Allegiance and singing America the Beautiful. Yet, even at 8 years of age, she needs to know that we live in an imperfect world, a world in which the response to a zero tolerance policy for border crossing separated thousands of children from their parents in cruel and inhumane ways.

As Jews, we must stand together and respond with one clear voice. Just as we aspire to live lives of righteousness, so too must we stand up in the face of moral emergency.

Congregation Habonim has joined more than 15,000 Jewish individuals across the country and well over 80 local and National Jewish organizations, synagogues and communities in signing a Declaration of a State of Moral Emergency. As the Declaration proclaims, United by the wisdom of our tradition, we stand with immigrants, refugees and asylum-seekers, with the children, and with their parents. We declare: Not here. Not now. Not in our name. This evening (Thursday, June 21) at 6pm in Foley Square, many in the community will come together as New York Jews for a Just and Humane Immigration Policy.
