A Message from Rabbi Naday Caine

I couldn't be more excited about the Rosenberg Scholar-in-Residence Weekend this coming April 3rd-5th. It is the first time in my life that I've been able to invite my mentor, Rabbi Bradley Shavit Artson, to spend time with me and my community. It promises to be a weekend of learning, provocative thought, and a centeredness in the heart of Conservative Judaism.

I first encountered Rabbi Artson when I was in my twenties and I flew to Camp Ramah in Ojai, California, for a convention of COEJL, the Coalition on the Environment and Jewish Life. Though the speakers were fine, the entire group came to full attention when Rabbi Artson began to speak. Everything he said combined his lived, personal experience with the urgency of the present moment and the depths of Jewish tradition. From that moment on, I had a model of what the litmus test of any Rabbinic presentation should be: those three combined. To this day, I try to make sure every one of my sermons on some level applies Torah to the issues of the present moment, and my goal is that if anyone that day has wandered into a synagogue for the first time in years, they would feel they experienced something compelling.

Over a decade later, I chose the Ziegler Rabbinical School because there was no question that I wanted to learn how to be a rabbi from Rabbi Artson. The care, respect, and personal example he continually showed me those years are debts I can never fully repay.

Rabbi Artson's Torah extends through many dimensions of our lives. The experiences of his autistic son, Jacob, and his own as his father, figure prominently in his teachings and in the urgency of inclusion in our institutions. Like me, his years of studying theology led him to the conclusion that Process Theology stands heads above any alternative, with its compelling vision of science and religion as fully integrated (not separate but equal), and equally urgent in our personal lives as in our ecological lives. His book *God of Becoming and Relationship: The Dynamic Nature of Process Theology* is a succinct and eloquent primer. His book *Gift of Soul, Gift of Wisdom* is my foundation when teaching Madrichim, as I did

for several years during summers at Camp Perlman in the Poconos during rabbinical school. I don't think I've met a Jewish educator who doesn't have copies of his Bedside Torah and his Everyday Torah by their desk or bedside; and his contributions to I Have Some Questions About God serve as profound voices in this book to help children and parents form their own reflections and conversations about God. I'm excited to have Rabbi Artson lead a discussion for parents during BIRS on the Sunday morning of his visit.

More recently, his teachings have focused on his experiences fighting cancer, and on the events following October 7th.

So please, mark your calendars to attend Rabbi Artson's presentations during the weekend of April 5th through 7th at Beth Israel as our guest in the honored role of Rosenberg Scholar-on-Residence. The Rosenberg Lecture Series is endowed through a generous contribution by Vic (z"l) & Val Rosenberg in memory of Cantor Alfred & Alice Rosenberg. We are grateful for the Rosenberg family's commitment to Beth Israel and to Jewish education.

President's Perspective Deborah Ball

Calling Ourselves to Hear and to Lean on One Another after October 7th

It has been five months since the horrific attack in which Hamas fighters murdered and brutalized innocent Israelis. Our shock and grief have not dissipated. We are angry, scared, and threatened. We fear for our people, both in Israel and here. The environments of our lives feel unsafe. We watch the news and are consumed by emotion and confusion.

There has perhaps not been a time that was more important than this one to be able to lean into our community, lean on one another. Yet for many of us, we might not feel able to. Knowing that we are having different responses has silenced some of our members. We are afraid of others' strong reactions and fear sharing our feelings. We cannot take in others' views and so we do not try to hear.

It saddens us to know that there are divides among us during this terrifying time. People want and need different things. What others want and need may anger others. We find that sometimes we cannot listen to or hear those differences.

An imperative of our tradition is the practice of compassion; another is to listen to understand. Still another is that we are more than a collection of individuals; we act and interact as a collective. We are

here for one another as well as for ourselves. So many of our rituals embody this very special orientation, from our customs around mourning that require us to be with others and to comfort others, to the very notion of the necessity of a minyan. Distinctive in these practices and their underlying values is a deep recognition that we need to be for others as well as for ourselves to be a community. To be a community means accepting, welcoming, and taking care with and of one another.

One way of doing so is to lean into the shared grief when another is bearing witness to a Jewish moral voice that is different from our own. So many of us have been doing this already, practicing great patience when a fellow congregant or rabbi voices things differently than we would ourselves. Some of us are living in chapter 3 of *Megillat Ester* when the decree is issued, "to massacre, kill, and exterminate all the Jews, young and old, children and women, on a single day." And some are living in chapter 9, when the Megillah reader rushes through (in one breath) the Jewish retaliation against Haman's people in order not to prolong nor advocate for such violence. Both are moral positions, and we are the stronger for holding space for one another's voices in these times of tragedy.

Judaism has always been made stronger by a pluralism of Jewish moral voices, and Beth Israel, too, has always been strengthened by the same.

This moment, as part of our history as a people, is demanding a great deal of us. May God grant us the strength and wisdom to lean into, not away from, one another. As leaders, we are here to listen and support us in constructing our sacred space as a place of mutual regard, respect, and collective action that can reflect our commonalities and also honor our differences.





Beth Israel is committed to enhancing the professional qualifications and experiences of its staff. This past fall, we encouraged Barbara McAnelly, our director of engagement and programming, to enroll in the Certificate in Jewish Leadership program offered by the Spertus Institute and Northwestern University. For several months, she participated in weekly Zoom sessions with a group of colleagues from around North America. Barb and her cohort completed the program in January.

According to Spertus's news release:

Spertus Institute is proud to recognize the latest community leaders to gain knowledge, skills, and resources vital to today's Jewish organizations.

Leaders of Jewish organizations confront the same challenges faced by any leader in the nonprofit sector. They also must address a range of difficult demands particular to Jewish communities, especially in times as trying as those we face today. [Barb and the other recipients of the Certificate in informative Q and A discussion. Jewish leadership] have stepped up [to] the challenge, gaining specialized training to address the unique challenges facing Jewish communities.

The [participants] completed four interactive components: Models of Jewish Leadership, Communication for Leaders, Leading People Through Change, and Collaboration and Power Sharing, as well as a personalized leadership assessment and a special workshop on Resilient Leadership. Together they learned to strengthen their own leadership styles, manage change, and inspire excellence.

Efrat Lachter Speaks at ISRAEL360 Lecture at Beth Israel

Despite the conflict with the big Detroit Lions football game, over 60 members attended Efrat Lachter's compelling lecture at Beth Israel on January 28 presented by the Israel360 committee.

Lachter is an investigative journalist and a war correspondent for Israel's Channel 12 News and a recipient of the 2022 Shimon Peres Center for Peace Award. She has directed and produced more than 200 documentary segments on topics including human trafficking in Sudan and Israel, modern-day slavery in Malawi, orphans in Ukraine, internal political corruption in Israel, and a women-and-children-only village in the Kurd-controlled area of Syria.

At Beth Israel Lachter talked about the problems created by the shocking October 7 attack by Hamas and showed two short documentaries — one about a woman who had to flee her Kibbutz and another about a woman hostage who had been released from Gaza. She talked about the situation in Gaza and in the north of Israel where people have had to evacuate from the area because Hezbollah is sending missiles deep into the country's civilian population.

As the first female war correspondent in her newsroom, much of her work has illuminated the lives of women in conflict zones, including Muslim countries such as Iraq, Syria and Afghanistan.

The Green Team is making headway installing LED fixtures throughout Beth Israel's buildings. DTE recently toured our buildings. According to Jerry, they replaced 32 screw-in bulbs with LEDs in the 2010 Building for free. That, of course, was the easy part. The remaining LED upgrades will require new fixtures, which are expensive to buy and to install. Following up on their free visit, DTE provided an eight-page "Small Business Assessment Report," which listed \$3,400 in LED-related rebates that we are eligible for. We estimate that an additional ten to twenty thousand dollars will be required for completion of the LED Project. We are awaiting a from a DTE-recommended estimate contractor, who can also handle the rebate application process. If you want to contribute directly to our LED Project, Beth Israel now has a Green Team Fund (you can select "Green Team Fund" as a drop-down in the "Type" box). As Green Team chairman, Michael Simon, likes to say, "Let There Be Light!"



The New Family Is Here and About to Move to Their New Home!

JCOR's third refugee family began their first day in the United States on the final day of January. Dad, Mom and their three boys ages 14, 10, and 8, originally from Syria, arrived exhausted but excited following their marathon 48-hour series of flights to Detroit Metro. "We're in America!" the eight-year-old exclaimed as he exited the airport clutching his mother's hand.

Two JCOR volunteers and a JFS staffer were at Metro to greet them. At the same time, three other JCOR volunteers were at the family's temporary quarters—a single room for five people, including *three* boys, one of whom had to bed down in a sleeping bag. Those three volunteers stocked the shelves and refrigerator with food and other supplies, including games, books, and other things to help the boys while away the time.

News Flash! As of press time, the family was hours away from signing a lease for permanent housing, and it looks like it will be in the Ann Arbor Public School district. With permanent housing, their lives will take a giant leap forward. With permanent housing they can enroll their boys in school, they will have a base from

which to launch their job search and begin JFS' ESL (English as a Second Language) program. Most importantly, they will be able to make a home.

Securing affordable housing within three weeks of arrival is a remarkable achievement in the Ann Arbor area's housing market, but JCOR's Housing & Welcome Team volunteers and JFS staff collaborated successfully to make it so!

The Seder at the JPOC Table: A Facilitated Discussion

Passover is a deeply resonant holiday for many Jewish People of Color. On Sunday, April 7, Ann Arbor-area JPOC and their families are invited to join a discussion on the topic. Event details follow.

The Haggadah, the Seder, and the songs of Pesach hold special meaning and promise for Jewish People of Color—be they descendants of America's enslaved people; descendants of Japanese families that were incarcerated in the western U.S. during World War II; Native/Indigenous Jews whose ancestors were bludgeoned and, in some cases, obliterated by encroaching Europeans; or Latin Jews whose families escaped hardship or persecution in Cuba or South or Central America.

Bryan Roby, associate professor of Judaic Studies and Middle Eastern Studies at U-M, will provide expert assistance as participants explore questions such as: How do Jewish People of Color express their histories in tandem with the traditional Passover story? How do their many and varied stories compound the celebration? How do JPOC incorporate their food traditions at the seder? Can the seder plate reflect the ancestors' stories? Can the Haggadah be adapted to incorporate the rapidly increasing racial and ethnic diversity of the contemporary Jewish community? What, to the African-American Jew, is Passover? How might "slavery" and "enslaved people" in Egypt vs the Western Hemisphere impact the discussion? The prayers? What resources are available to address these questions?

Why Are We Doing our Main Megillah Reading on Sunday Afternoon Instead of Saturday Night? An Adventure in Halakhah! by Rabbi Nadav Caine

The mitzvah of Purim (in addition to *mishloach* manot and matanot la'evyonim) is to hear the megillah being read, and this is understood to mean "at night and during the day." The mitzvah it is most like is the mitzvah of hearing the shofar. Like hearing the shofar, the mitzvah is not related to a particular service. The "hearing the megillah at night" is fulfilled any time from ma'ariv to dawn, while "hearing the megillah during the day," is fulfilled any time from dawn to sunset.

Hearing the megillah is meant to be inclusive, with as many people fulfilling the mitzvah as possible, and inclusive of children, thus fulfilling our missions of *l'dor vador* and a joyful Judaism. For this reason, on a normal weekday of Erev Purim, I consider it appropriate to move the nighttime reading a little early to coincide with a slightly early ma'ariv since ma'ariv officially starts the nighttime, and in this way more people can attend.

This year, however, Purim begins *motzei shabbat*, Saturday night, and **one is not permitted to do an early ma'ariv on Saturday night.** This means there is no way halakhically to start before 8:40 p.m. and still fulfill the mitzvah of the nighttime reading. Therefore, given that the next day is Sunday, and in order to continue the Beth Israel tradition of a full Hebrew megillah reading interspersed with some adult spiel, I moved the "reading with spiel" to Sunday at 6:00 p.m., thus concluding before sunset, to serve as our daytime reading, and I moved our "simple traditional reading without spiel" to Saturday night. To be clear, the daytime megillah reading is not required to be at *shacharit*. So we are now fully compliant with halakhah.

This also accomplished being a good neighbor to Rabbi Keller who intended to organize a reading Sunday morning at the JCC.

Therefore, this year's plan is fully kosher and accomplishes: 1) Conforming to the special limitations of a very late start on Saturday night; 2) Continuing the BIC tradition of a fun and inclusive reading, and therefore accomplishing maximal achievement of the mitzvah; 3) Being a good community neighbor.

Sounds like a great start to a celebratory holiday! And don't miss our "Barbie" themed Purim at 6:00 p.m. on Sunday for our daytime reading!
