RABBI'S MESSAGE

RABBI MARK DAVID FINKEL

“For *Pesah* had not been celebrated like this since the days of ... “ (II Kings 23:21)

Some of us cry at movies; some of us cry at the theater; some of us cry at the opera. Some of us cry at weddings; some of us cry at graduations; some of us cry at the birth of our children. Many of us cry at funerals.

There are times when we think that we are “holding it together” and then suddenly, we no longer can. Those who understand the mind far better than I do, can also explain it better than I can; but we know that certain stimuli make us happy or sad and others make us laugh or cry.

The above title comes from a verse from the *haftarah* of the second day of *Pesah*. My confession is that I tear up whenever that verse is chanted in the synagogue; and when I am the person chanting it, I get *farklemp* (choked up).

It goes back to the *Pesah* when I was in the 3rd grade. It was the *Pesah* during my Israeli cousin Yaffa's “grand tour” of the US to meet her American relatives. (Aby's been telling me that I have been talking a lot about my cousin Yaffa over the past six months.) Not that Yaffa was a Bible scholar: she was a secular Israeli; and I know that the two are not mutually exclusive. But Yaffa quoted the above verse and filled in the “...” with “since I celebrated it with our family as a child in Poland.”

At the time, most of us kept talking or doing what we were doing, but we paused long enough to look at my *Zayde* (grandfather, (and Yaffa's uncle)) who sat there quietly. My *Zayde* was not a talkative man, but we all figured at that moment that he was also thinking about the *Pesah* celebrations “in the old country.”

Ironically, it wasn't my *Zayde* who led our family *seder*. He sat at the head of the table with his 10 grandchildren, 7 of whom had taken away from our religious school a considerable repertoire of *seder* melodies. That repertoire grew during our USY years. Some traditional melodies, most with Hebrew words, some with English words, some soulful, some playful, some silly (*Afikomen* ‘Round the Mountain). *Zayde* indulged his *einiklekh* (grandchildren) ... as long as he chanted *Kiddush*, a demand made more by our parents than by *Zayde* himself.

How blessed we were that *Zayde* never believed that children should be seen, but not heard. Not that my voice does justice to the canon of our family's *seder* melodies, but I would like to share that blessing with you, my congregation, via the magic of a google shared drive (*Afikomen* ‘Round the Mountain is conspicuously absent. Sorry, but I challenge you to figure that one out for yourselves). And if you can't get the hang of any of these melodies and if you are desperate enough ... with the press of a button, I can magically sing at your *seder* too.

When you're Jewish, what's old always seems relevant and in particular, the Passover holiday doesn't let you forget. The plight of refugees today is illuminated when we sit each year and tell the story of our journey from slavery to freedom. With our Jewish empathy in tow, it's easy to make the connection that we were once them. Some would even say that we still are. From Ukraine to our southern border- and beyond, a world view in this time of refugee crises begs that we take their plight to heart in the same way we do ours. I hope you all do this at your Seder tables just as I will.

Egypt's Jews ventured out into the bleak desert with faith and it all somehow worked out; PBJC's Jews felt our way through the desolation of a pandemic, and we've reached a somewhat sustained endemic on the other side that for a while seemed like it needed that same kind of miracle to reach.

Egypt's Jews showed faith in Moses; the Jews of PBJC show faith in our community, clergy, and lay leadership, and continue to faithfully buy in to support a future they may not clearly see, but have faith in.

Egypt's Jews strived to recline at their meals because in ancient times only a free person reclined while eating, while slaves and servants stood; this Passover I recline as I see our planned path unfolding with a level of support mostly as we had envisioned it. Thank you all for coming together to celebrate PBJC in the same way we as a people come together to celebrate Passover- with hope, faith, and commitment.

I'm happy to report things are working well on the home front. We are moving in the right direction, and it would seem we don't really need any Red Sea to part for us to be solid. Our calendar has it that over the next few months we will be addressing many important issues in our synagogue- from nominating our lay leadership to setting our Budget to the future of our clergy.

The Nominating Committee is actively recruiting interested congregants. We are happy to consider any new congregants who would like to be considered for a role on the Chevra Board. Please consider stepping up and contributing your time to help make our shul what you want it to be. If interested, please contact Evan Zuckerman or me shortly as this slate is currently being decided upon. Our operating Budget for the 2023-24 fiscal year is also being put together (and thank you to all who have a hand in this painstaking process). Please look forward to a congregational vote on a new slate of leadership and our budget over the next few months.

The Clergy transition plan is in full motion and I offer you positive words as we look toward our all- important June vote regarding our future clergy leadership. Our Kitah Aleph parents and students learned the importance of “*hiddur mitzvah*”, while decorating the cover for the siddur that the children will be studying from in the years ahead. May the siddur be a constant source of Jewish knowledge throughout their lives. The students began the morning with singing *Hinei Mah Tov*, how wonderful it is for all to be together! The siddur presentation and brunch on Sunday, April 23rd, will be a wonderful milestone for our Aleph families.



Generations have greeted Passover with strenuous housecleaning to remove all traces of *chametz* or leaven – the substance that makes dough rise. According to our tradition, when the Hebrew slaves heard that Pharaoh would permit them to leave Egypt, they hurriedly packed before he changed his mind. Carrying dough for bread on their backs, they allowed it to bake in the desert sun. Later God commanded the people to remember their deliverance from Egypt each year by eating matzah and avoiding all *chametz*. Kitah Aleph students had the opportunity to bake their own matzah and learn the beautiful rituals and traditions as well. All students will receive *bedikat chametz* kits, supplies needed to ensure that all *chametz* has been removed from the home.



Kitah Gimel students had a special Pesach program by having a scavenger hunt searching for *chametz*, and then competing in the annual Charoset Wars. I am hoping that every student will be able to share what they have learned at your seder!

This academic year has been enjoyable and rewarding so far, filled with adventure and experiences that helped navigate our students’ religious and spiritual development. Every step that we have taken has been a blessing; thank you parents, for allowing us to share in their Jewish journey.

In fact, many believe that different perspectives are exactly the reason Judaism has survived for almost 6000 years. However, all our ancestors agreed on the importance of a holy community a '*kehilah kedusha*,' where everyone is respected, and every opinion is valued.

The goal of the fund is to provide financial aid to youth participating in Jewish activities, such as Kadima, USY, Camp Ramah, Israel trips, and other Jewish educational activities. Congregation Beth Shalom transferred the fund to Pine Brook Jewish Center, where it will continue to perpetuate Eliot's memory. May his memory be a blessing to your youth.

Eliot's brothers, Harvey and Bill, are current members of Pine Brook Jewish Center. Upon learning of the sudden and tragic loss of Aaron Melzer, a Pine Brook Jewish Center Religious School student, Congregation Beth Shalom honored the Melzer family by rededicating the fund as the Eliot Sakolsky Aaron Melzer Scholarship Fund. 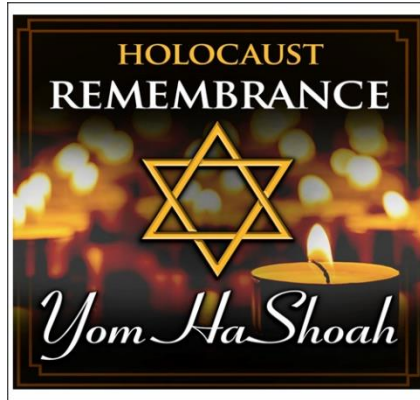
As the years pass, the memories of those who fell victim to the ultimate hate crime must not diminish. That's why we are encouraging every family in our congregation to light just one candle and place it in the window on the night of Monday, April 17, 2022. When the candle is lit, it will increase the awareness of the Holocaust and perpetuate our commitment to our people.

The number of Holocaust survivors is diminishing with each passing day. As we lose this precious link, those who deny the Holocaust ever happened gain strength. Sadly, over 20% of all high school students have no knowledge that the Holocaust ever occurred.

Yom HaShoah candles are a highly visible symbol for keeping the flame alive. Their color recalls the badges Jews were forced to wear in Nazi-occupied Europe, but their flame inspires hope that we can yet make our world a tolerant place to live.

The Yellow candle is a fitting and beautiful way to remember the six million in each of our homes. Please light the candle and, by doing so, take time to remember.

Light a Candle, Preserve a Memory!

In Judaism the home is the most important link in the transmission of our heritage from generation to generation. Many important events – Holidays and festivals, Shabbat, Hanukkah, some rituals – are celebrated at home with family and friends. The Yom HaShoah Yellow Candle program was conceived to promote home observance in remembrance of the Holocaust and those who perished. As hundreds of thousands of Yellow Candles are lit around the world on Yom HaShoah, the spirit and memory of those who perished will not be forgotten.

The Holocaust itself is far removed from other events in Jewish history. It was an event of pure evil. The intent of the Nazis, similar to the intent of Haman, was the complete destruction of the Jewish people.

We need to remember each person who perished in the Holocaust. Each was an individual, with goals and aspirations. Our tradition states that one who saves a life is as if he has saved the entire world.

We need to teach our children, without frightening them, about what occurred. It is important for each of us, as individuals, to take a moment to remember. We must NEVER FORGET!

Lighting the Yellow Candle

When lighting your Yom HaShoah Candle, make sure that you place it on a firm base in an area that is away from flammable items. If possible, the candle should be lit so that it can be seen from a window, like the Hanukkah Menorah. On a table is preferable, so that others can see it. We should light our Yom HaShoah Candle so that the world can see – so that they do not forget.

As you prepare to light the candle you may want to take time, with your family, to add an appropriate reading. Selections from “The Diary of Anne Frank” or “I Never Saw Another Butterfly” are good to use with children. Take a few minutes as a family together. Let your children take part in the reading, because we must help our children confront and cope with the parts of life that cause us pain, doubt and discomfort.

Read the meditation included with your candle, and then light the candle. After lighting, spend a moment in reflection.

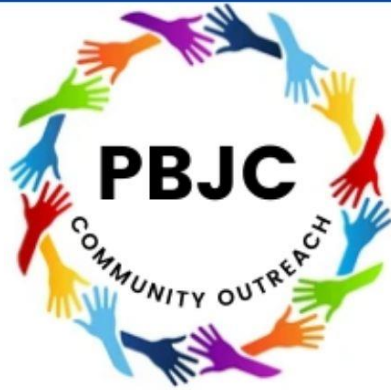

The Community Outreach Committee began almost 10 years ago with a simple mission: to provide living necessities to those with a defined psychiatric illness who are clients of the Mental Health Association of Essex and Morris Counties. This committee continues to thrive under the leadership of a Board of Directors comprised of dedicated young adults who receive guidance from Abby Edelman, Jamie Kideckel, and Ali Wise. The committee now provides resources for clothing of children living in shelters as well as supporting nourish.NJ.

Last year a second committee was formed - The Community Scholarship Committee of the Pine Brook Jewish Center. The mission of this committee is to provide scholarships to academically worthy students of Dover High School who have made a difference in their community. For the first year the committee, comprised of 21 members, provided one scholarship of \$2,400 and two scholarships each of \$400.
