# **CANTOR'S MESSAGE**

### **CANTOR MENACHEM TOREN**

As Moses and company were crossing the Red Sea, everyone was getting very thirsty after travelling so far through the desert. Of course, the Red Sea "walls" were saltwater so they couldn't drink from them. The Sons of Israel yelled at Moses, demanding fresh drinking water.

Moses stood for a moment helpless. But then, a fish peeked out from a wall and told Moses that he and his family could remove the salt from the water by passing it through their gills and then squirting the fresh water out of their mouths like little fountains that the Israelites could drink from.

However, they had a demand. The fish and their descendants wished to be present at every seder meal (which they somehow knew would be established to commemorate the Exodus). When Moses agreed to this, he also gave them their name, which remains how they are known to this very day, for he said to them, "Go Filter, Fish!"

The fish is usually a "must" in one form or another at the Seder dinner, however, not according to everyone. The Romanian Jews do not eat fish on Pesach because, in the old days, people transferred fish from place to place with a piece of bread soaked in alcohol (for preservation). However, because we don't transfer fish in that matter today, there is nothing to worry about...

There is so much to say about Pesach. The customs, the Haggadah, the rules, etc.

But this year, what I want to say, and it comes directly from my heart, is exactly what this holiday is about. It's about freedom! On Pesach, we mainly celebrate our freedom. Freedom, normally, is taken for granted, like the air around us, because we are free, and the air around us is abundant. But if the air was removed from our surroundings, we would freak out in a matter of seconds, so I do believe people who suddenly lose their freedom feel the same. As of now, 134 of our people are still held as hostages, for six months in conditions we cannot even imagine, hell on earth.

I am free, but likely I will not feel so free on Pesach, because I cannot stop thinking about our brothers and sisters that are in this terrible nightmare. We, the Jewish people, should feel responsible to each other, and especially, at the Seder, we all have to pray and to think about those of us who are in trouble.

I do hope that a miracle will happen before Pesach and we can really rejoice, as we should.



The success of our Hebrew High School, *B'yachad*, is dependent on the ability to not only learn about 'the ethics of our people,' but more importantly to build a community. When students trust and care about each other they feel safe to share their views and ideas in a classroom setting and a dialogue begins. The fear of being judged by one's peers dissipates, and discussions become lively and interactive. From the time of Hillel and Shammai, our tradition teaches that there was always room to examine, dissect and re-evaluate our laws. In fact, many believe that different perspectives are exactly the reason Judaism has survived for almost 6000 years. However, all our ancestors agreed on the importance of a holy community a '*kehilah kedusha*,' where everyone is respected, and every opinion is valued.

Eliot was the United Synagogue Youth (USY) leader at Congregation Beth Shalom in Pompton Lakes. He passed away at the age of thirty-one. A scholarship fund was established by Congregation Beth Shalom in Eliot's memory. The goal of the fund is to provide financial aid to youth participating in Jewish activities, such as Kadima, USY, Camp Ramah, Israel trips, and other Jewish educational activities. Congregation Beth Shalom transferred the fund to Pine Brook Jewish Center, where it will continue to perpetuate Eliot's memory. May his memory be a blessing to your youth.

Eliot's brothers, Harvey and Bill, are current members of Pine Brook Jewish Center. Upon learning of the sudden and tragic loss of Aaron Melzer, a Pine Brook Jewish Center Religious School student, Congregation Beth Shalom honored the Melzer family by rededicating the fund as the Eliot Sakolsky Aaron Melzer Scholarship Fund. 

## The Yellow Candle Program -- Sponsored by the Men's Club

In Judaism the home is the most important link in the transmission of our heritage from generation to generation. Many important events – Holidays and festivals, Shabbat, Hanukkah, some rituals – are celebrated at home with family and friends. The Yom HaShoah Yellow Candle program was conceived to promote home observance in remembrance of the Holocaust and those who perished. As hundreds of thousands of Yellow Candles are lit around the world on Yom HaShoah, the spirit and memory of those who perished will not be forgotten.

The Holocaust itself is far removed from other events in Jewish history. It was an event of pure evil. The intent of the Nazis, similar to the intent of Haman, was the complete destruction of the Jewish people.

We need to remember each person who perished in the Holocaust. Each was an individual, with goals and aspirations. Our tradition states that one who saves a life is as if he has saved the entire world.

We need to teach our children, without frightening them, about what occurred. It is important for each of us, as individuals, to take a moment to remember. We must NEVER FORGET!

### **Lighting the Yellow Candle**

When lighting your Yom HaShoah Candle, make sure that you place it on a firm base in an area that is away from flammable items. If possible, the candle should be lit so that it can be seen from a window, like the Hanukkah Menorah. On a table is preferable, so that others can see it. We should light our Yom HaShoah Candle so that the world can see – so that they do not forget.

As you prepare to light the candle you may want to take time, with your family, to add an appropriate reading. Selections from "The Diary of Anne Frank" or "I Never Saw Another Butterfly" are good to use with children. Take a few minutes as a family together. Let your children take part in the reading, because we must help our children confront and cope with the parts of life that cause us pain, doubt and discomfort.

Read the meditation included with your candle, and then light the candle. After lighting, spend a moment in reflection.

It's been almost 80 years since Nazi concentration camps were liberated and the Holocaust that claimed six million Jewish lives came to an end. To ensure that the six million did not die in vain and that the Holocaust never happens again, the PBJC will join Jews throughout North America and the world by participating in the *Yom HaShoah Yellow Candle Program*, a program sponsored by the Federation of Jewish Men's Clubs in cooperation with the United Synagogue of Conservative Judaism and the North American Federation of Temple Brotherhoods.

As the years pass, the memories of those who fell victim to the ultimate hate crime must not diminish. That's why we are encouraging every family in our congregation to light just one candle and place it in the window on the night of Sunday, May 5, 2024. When the candle is lit, it will increase the awareness of the Holocaust and perpetuate our commitment to our people.

The number of Holocaust survivors is diminishing with each passing day. As we lose this precious link, those who deny the Holocaust ever happened gain strength. Sadly, over 20% of all high school students have no knowledge that the Holocaust ever occurred.

Yom HaShoah candles are a highly visible symbol for keeping the flame alive. Their color recalls the badges Jews were forced to wear in Nazi-occupied Europe, but their flame inspires hope that we can yet make our world a tolerant place to live.

The Yellow candle is a fitting and beautiful way to remember the six million in each of our homes. Please light the candle and, by doing so, take time to remember.
