RABBI'S MESSAGE

RABBI MARK DAVID FINKEL

<u>Hanukkah</u> is 8 Nights Please Share Tuesday, December 20th with the Montville Jewish Community

My family still asks me what I would like for <u>Hanukkah</u>. I give them some vague non-answer, and they walk away probably feeling that they are dealing with Scrooge this holiday season. I should give their question some thought before they ask me, but I rarely do. Not that I don't want to take responsibility, but I have often thought that there should be a separate Rabbi's holiday for most of the Jewish holidays of the year. That way the Rabbi gets to celebrate with family and not worry about the communal celebration. Even when it is a 2-day holiday, my focus is on making sure that everything at the synagogue is prepared to the best of my ability; and for those who might say, "You would think that after all these years, he would have the holiday ready to go." That would be nice, but you can't buy "Rosh HaShanah in a Box" at Target, not even on Amazon.

However, <u>Hanukkah</u> is 8 nights, so it is rare for me to have a professional commitment on each of the 8 nights of <u>Hanukkah</u>; and maybe that's what it takes to celebrate a holiday with enough days that there is room for a communal celebration, other professional commitments related to the holiday, and time to celebrate uninterrupted with family, so without mapping out my schedule for the week of <u>Hanukkah</u>, let me make one <u>Hanukkah</u> request/wish:

Please join me and other members of the Montville Jewish Community
Tuesday, December 20th @ 5:30 PM
for the annual lighting of the <u>hanukkiah</u>
in front of the Montville Township building

As in years past, there will be food: *sufganiyot* (donuts), hot coffee and hot chocolate and music. Since it is outdoors, we can be less nervous about gathering with other people, and **we can make a statement that in spite of the growing number of acts of anti-Semitism in the United States, we are both the proud hosts and the honored guests of a** *Hanukkah* **celebration taking place on** *our* **very public property. We will also be joined there that evening by some of our Township elected leaders, so we can show our pride that evening if we have a larger crowd.**

One will find all the details in the *Candlestick* and in the weekly *Shabbat* announcements. I hope to see you then.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Wow! In early November our community got a scare. The FBI in Newark tweeted it had received "credible information of a broad threat to synagogues in New Jersey." The synagogue had to respond and, advised by the authorities and our own security consultant, we did all the right things in hiring extra security, canceling some synagogue events, and being sure to inform our congregants of what was happening.

My experience is that once a threat has passed and we feel safer again, we tend to pay less attention to learn the cause. If you hadn't heard, let me share; federal prosecutors say an 18-year-old Sayreville, New Jersey man was arrested (fortunately quickly) having sent a manifesto online with threats to attack a New Jersey synagogue based on his hatred of Jews. If this localized threat wasn't enough, toss in former US Presidents refusing to disavow the outspoken beliefs of professed anti-Semites and white supremacist-Holocaust deniers who they've dined with, and we really have a problem. No fooling around here; it's time to stop shrugging our shoulders. Antisemitism is manifesting itself in more blatant and direct ways than ever before!

My younger days had me pretty deaf to the plight of Jews suffering from antisemitism, especially those in other parts of the world like the Soviet Republic. I knew of and saw the threat, but I was insulated and didn't feel it the way I should have. I shied from bringing attention to my Jewish self or embracing my Jewish identity with pride and I remember feeling that tinge of embarrassment at the outward expression of antisemitism by myself or other Jews. I wonder if others feel as they grow older more confidence and strength in standing tall. I do, and I believe all Jews need to, because we see now that with each year bringing new records of antisemitic acts (2022 set to be the highest) and with celebrity and politicians indifferent to hatred and division, we are in danger of antisemitism being normalized in our own backyard! It doesn't matter which side of the aisle you lean; the threat is real!

To protect our community, the Pine Brook Center is currently spending our federal security grants to protect our congregants. We are in the process of spending \$200,000 in hardcore security for bullet-resistant glass for windows and doors, interior and exterior cameras, and room access restrictions. So that you can feel safe, you should all know that USCJ, the umbrella organization of the conservative movement, gives excellent reviews of our building for its current condition and for the things we are currently adding. PBJC is among the most secure synagogue facilities in our region.

My message is simple. Your continued membership and commitment, coming to our building, and engaging as active congregants is your vote of support and pride for all of the Jewish People. <u>Hanukkah</u>, our Festival of Lights, tells the story of a miracle and survival. It shines a special light of joy and dignity for who we are. Let's all celebrate this and all of the many events on our current busy calendar! With emphasis, I remind you that tickets are just becoming available for our major fundraising event, PBJC's Crystal Jubilee, to be held just a few months away, on Saturday, February 11, 2023. Please plan to attend on that night as a special occasion to celebrate our clergy and leadership and ultimately our own Jewish community in beautiful Scheinman Hall!

Happy Hanukkah and holiday season to all!



Shawn Yudkin December 10, 2022



In addition to their leadership in our Hebrew High program, Amanda, Hailey, Rachel, Zack, Ethan, and Matthew have been Madrichim for our Religious School, serving as assistant teachers in classes, tutoring students, and helping however needed. Ethan and Zack have read Torah during High Holy day services for the past five years, Hailey read High Holy Day Haftarah one year, and Amanda has assisted with High Holy Day Tot Shabbat services. On November 17th Paul Cirillo came to PBJC and spoke to us about "Living on the International Space Station." Paul is a wonderful speaker, and this was a terrific, fun, and educational topic. Paul shared gorgeous photos of space and the earth, videos of some of the astronauts in space demonstrating daily activities and taught us much about the ISS. Did you know:

- the ISS has been continually manned for over 22 years and is expected to be in use until 2030?
- originally there was a crew of 3, but today typically there are 6 or 7 people living / working on the ISS, typically for a 6-month visit?
- 2 ships are always docked at the ISS in case an emergency escape is necessary?
- the ISS is about 250 miles from earth and orbits at 17,500 miles per hour?
- the ISS is the length of a football field (including the end zones)?
- the ISS (if on earth) would weigh about 1 million pounds?
- there are 3 labs on the ISS doing hundreds of experiments, many related to curing diseases back on Earth?

Paul ended his discussion by explaining that the ISS is visible via plain sight from your backyard as it passes above and that you can look up the best times to see the ISS passing overhead on the website www.heavens-above.com.

In December we look forward to having Dr. Robert W. Butts join us to talk about "The Lasting Influence of the Jewish Musicians of the 1960s". For the first year the committee, comprised of 21 members, provided one scholarship of \$2,400 and two scholarships each of \$400.
