RABBI'S MESSAGE

A Letter from Jerusalem

I write this from Jerusalem. From the balcony of my hotel room, I see the Givat Ram campus of the Hebrew University of Jerusalem where Roz Lippa and I were students in the same program during the same academic year although we didn't know each other until I came to Pine Brook. I've been in this hotel room before. It is a little harder now to see the campus from my balcony today, in large part because Jerusalem has grown up; and the lower floors of office and apartment buildings just beginning to be built tell me that on my next visit, that view towards the Southwest that I especially love to see at sunset may look even busier.

So, I turn a few degrees due West, looking down Herzl Boulevard towards Mount Herzl, Yad VaShem, and way beyond that (I never could see from this end of Herzl because it's at a lower elevation in the Jerusalem hills) the Hadassah Hospital at Ein Kerem. Here also, for several years, the Boulevard has looked different. The light rail moves Jerusalemites smoothly up and down the Boulevard (and across the city) more efficiently, more quietly, without either the diesel smell or the driving acrobatics of the Egged drivers and their buses. These light rail vehicles don't even have the "Clang, Clang" of the trolleys about which Judy Garland sang of or that I heard on Beacon Street or Commonwealth Avenue in Boston. These vehicles have a softer, more civilized, "Ding, Ding."

So far today, I could not have asked for a better day in Jerusalem. For Liora it was "Take your father to school day." We met in front of her school. The day started with *Shaharit*, morning prayers. From the *Amidah*, I learned that the rainy season in Israel for which Jews worldwide have been praying since *Shemini Atzeret* has been slow in coming, so we (along with most congregations in Israel) added a "booster" prayer for rain. Word was that the intermediate weather forecasts indicate that this morning's extra prayers, hopefully, will not have been offered in vain.

I was aware of the booster prayers, but I had never heard them recited during a service until today. My only winter in Israel was a rainy (it rained at least part of every day that year from January 1-21) and a snowy one. Services were followed by morning Bible classes, studying chapters from Genesis as seen through a variety of medieval commentators including their biases reflecting the times and countries where they lived. Yes, I learned new things along with the real students, and it brushed off some dust from those topics that have accumulated dust (or plaque) in my brain over the years.

Liora's and my roles were reversed. This time she took me out for lunch in appreciation of our (especially my) good academic work during the morning (meaning that I didn't embarrass her in front of her class). Here also a realization of Jerusalem's growth. We had lunch in a Galeria-type urban mall with a variety of restaurants and a food court. I'm positive that mall was built on the once-upon-a-site of the old cookie factory where students in my day and other Jerusalemites on a tight budget would come to the factory store to buy the imperfect and broken cookies.

Most of you know that this past week has produced days that many *could* have asked for better. Words of last week's terror attacks still echo in conversations on the street and in the lead paragraphs of TV, radio, and newspapers; however, my family and my PBJC family told me to stay safe, so who am I to try to contradict them. If I could, I would like to make a deal with the world: I won't forget to notice the challenges of Jerusalem and Israel and its citizens; but I don't want the world to forget the beauty and what is well with this holy place and its inhabitants.

VICE PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

How did I get here? How did someone who hasn't been to high holiday services since the 90's wind up as a Vice President of a synagogue and in charge of our security committee? When I'm asked this question by friends and family that have known me for a long time, my default response is usually to make a joke out of it by saying "I opened my big mouth". It's partly true, but it's not the whole story. Some backstory...

As a child growing up in the New Jersey suburbs in the 1980s and 1990s I was aware of the concept of antisemitism. My family lived in a town that did not permit Jews to join the country club. I came to understand that such a thing was not that uncommon and there was another country club nearby that catered to the local Jewish population. Antisemitism felt like more of an inconvenience and not something I should be afraid of. Our family was not the most observant. After my younger brother's Bar Mitzvah in 1996 we no longer were members of a synagogue. As a result, I didn't attend a high holiday service for the next 23 years. I identified as Jewish culturally, highlighted by me joining a nationally Jewish fraternity in college, but that was the extent of my religious affiliation.

Fast forward to 2018 and I have a family of my own. My daughter was out of preschool and starting religious school and my son was enrolled in preschool at our local synagogue. Ever since the 2016 election the rise in antisemitism was something I was aware of, but not particularly concerned about. Then came October 27th and the mass shooting at the Tree of Life synagogue in Pittsburgh.

Suddenly the rise of antisemitism became real. If this happened in Pittsburgh, it could happen anywhere. With two children that spend a significant portion of their time in a synagogue and many friends in town living under the same circumstances I began asking questions. What kind of security does our synagogue have? Do we have a safety plan if someone tries to copycat what happened in Pittsburgh? The answers I received to these questions caused me great concern, and my wife and I contemplated whether we should continue to send our children to preschool and religious school at our synagogue. That's when a friend who served on the synagogue's Board of Trustees challenged me to take an active role in the synagogue leadership. At first, I resisted; no way was I going to join the Board of Trustees. I haven't been to a service in over 20 years! Ultimately, I relented and within a matter of weeks not only was I on the Board of Trustees, but I was now responsible for running the Security Committee, something I knew absolutely zero about. Oh, and we had just been awarded a 100K grant from the Department of Homeland Security and it was going to be my responsibility to determine how to use the money and select vendors to do the work. At that point the only thing I could do was lean in and figure it out. If I was so concerned for the safety of my children and the rest of our congregation, here was my chance to do something about it.

I'm proud to say that in the three and a half years that I have served on the Board of Trustees, Executive Committee and as Chair of Security, we have been awarded 300K in federal and state grants for security upgrades. I now know a lot more about cameras, locks, glass, doors and keycard access than everyone else that I know. As a father of two young children and with a job that frequently has me away from home, it hasn't been easy to attend all the meetings and do all the work necessary to ensure that our members and their children feel safe. Our family, including our children, count the friends we have made through our synagogue as among the closest friends we have. Some are practically family. I feel a responsibility to protect them.

Every day it seems there is another story about how antisemitism is becoming a growing threat. What once seemed like a fringe group of people to worry about has now become almost a mainstream issue with prominent figures in politics, sports and entertainment outwardly expressing, or at least tacitly condoning antisemitic dialogue and behavior. I wish it would go away, but it won't. It will probably get worse before it gets better, but at least I can confidently say that I didn't sit back and watch it happen. I acted and continue to act to make our synagogue safer. There is no such thing as a completely secure synagogue, but we must do everything we can to protect ourselves and lessen the possibility that something like what happened in Pittsburgh can happen here.

VICE PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE (continued)

This experience hasn't made me more observant. I go to high holiday services again with my family and attend synagogue sponsored social events, but I am fundamentally on the same level of observance that I was as a kid. Some things are what they are. What has changed is the pride I feel in helping to make our community safer and that we will not be made to feel afraid in the face of rising antisemitic rhetoric and violence. We remain vigilant and the work is never done.

This committee continues to thrive under the leadership of a Board of Directors comprised of dedicated young adults who receive guidance from Abby Edelman, Jamie Kideckel, and Ali Wise. The committee now provides resources for clothing of children living in shelters as well as supporting nourish.NJ.

Last year a second committee was formed - The Community Scholarship Committee of the Pine Brook Jewish Center. The mission of this committee is to provide scholarships to academically worthy students of Dover High School who have made a difference in their community. For the first year the committee, comprised of 21 members, provided one scholarship of \$2,400 and two scholarships each of \$400.
