### CANTOR'S MESSAGE

#### CANTOR MENACHEM TOREN

Greetings my friends,

In this Gregorian month, we are also entering the Hebrew month of Adar, which normally has in it one of my favorite holidays, Purim. But not this year; this year it will happen next month. This year we have 2 months of *Adar*, *Adar* I, followed by *Adar* II, and the reason for that is the fact that in this year's Hebrew (lunar) calendar, we will have 13 months and not 12 as usual.

So...Hebrew leap year vs the Gregorian leap year - why, how, and when?

In the case of the Gregorian calendar, the story is quite simple - it is based on a solar year, and the earth takes almost 365 days and a quarter to orbit the sun, so one day (February 29) is added to the calendar every 4 years. The Hebrew calendar is based on the moon, and here the story is more complicated. In the Hebrew calendar, another whole month is added in a leap year so that it has 13 months, and it does not occur every 4 years as in the Gregorian calendar. Sometimes it occurs every 2 years and sometimes every 3 years. The Hebrew leap year is determined by calculation and takes place in a fixed order in cycles of 19 years. In such a cycle of 19 years, there are 7 leap years, and they will be the 3rd year, the 6th year, the 8th, the 11th, the 14th, the 17th, and the 19th (and last) year in the cycle. This calculation was developed around the 4th century during the Talmud period.

The months of the Hebrew calendar contain either 29 days or 30 days, and not 30 or 31 days as in the Gregorian calendar. This is because the length of time between the appearance of the moon each cycle is about 29.5 days, and in the Hebrew calendar there are leap years due to the lack of coordination between a lunar year and a solar year (364 days in a lunar year and 365 days in a lunar year). As a result, each year there is a difference/discrepancy of 11 days between the lunar year and the solar year.

And why is it problematic? Because in such a situation the holidays will not fall in a fixed season, and there is a connection between the holiday and the agricultural season of the year. According to the Bible, Passover must be celebrated in the spring, *Shavuot*, which is the harvest festival, at the time when the wheat is harvested and the first fruits are gathered, while the holiday of *Sukkot*, which is the festival of *Asif*, ends the agricultural year.

The month that is added in a leap year is *Adar* A, and not *Adar* B, which is the original month that exists every year and in which the holiday of Purim falls. And why Adar? Very simple: because according to the ancient calendar, the month of Adar is the 12th and last month of the calendar.

Bonus: there are no leap years in the Muslim calendar, so the various holidays such as Ramadan occur each time in different seasons. Also, only with the Hebrew calendar, every lunar month is a complete cycle of the moon, and yet, fully synchronized with the Gregorian calendar.

To be honest about it, I never liked the leap year - not as a child, and not now, but for a different reason. As a child, entering the month of Adar symbolized the upcoming Purim in 2 weeks, and it made me excited about it, but not in a leap year...As an adult, especially after coming to America, entering the month of Adar, means that next month is Nissan, and on Nissan we celebrate Passover and the coveted spring that I am waiting for through the entire harsh eastern winter...

However, as an adult, I have learned the benefit of being patient. Hopefully, by next month we will celebrate Purim with joy, after our hostages who were abducted by Hamas will be released, and we will have a great reason to be joyful. This year, I am happy for the leap year because I am not ready for any celebration.

### **PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE**

Hello PBJC Community-

For this month's Candlestick article, I have decided to write about the history of anti-Semitism. This message stems from a philosophical discussion I had with my son Zack while he was home for his college winter break. Coming out of that conversation, I used the past couple of weeks to research the history of anti-Semitism and the effects social media has on hatred towards Jews today.

Anti-Semitism has a long and complex history in the United States. From colonial times to the present day, American society has grappled with manifestations of anti-Semitic attitudes and actions. By examining the evolution of anti-Semitism over time, our society can gain insights into the persistence and changing nature of this phenomenon in the U.S.

During the Colonial Period, despite the promise of religious freedom, Jewish settlers in the American colonies faced discrimination and hostility from European colonizers, who often held anti-Semitic beliefs. In fact, various colonies imposed legal restrictions on Jews, limiting their rights to own property, participate in civic life, and practice their faith freely. The 19th century saw large waves of Jewish immigrants arriving in the United States, fleeing persecution, and seeking economic opportunities. However, they encountered anti-Semitic sentiments among nativist groups who viewed them as threats to American identity and culture. Anti-Semitic stereotypes became prevalent in American society, fueled by conspiracy theories and pseudo-scientific notions of racial superiority.

The 1930s witnessed the emergence of anti-Semitic organizations such as the German American Bund, which promoted Nazi ideology and targeted Jewish communities in the United States. Despite the atrocities committed against Jews in Europe, the United States implemented restrictive immigration policies, turning away Jewish refugees fleeing persecution.

More recently, there has been a disturbing rise in antisemitic incidents linked to the Israeli-Hamas conflict, including physical assaults, online harassment, and discriminatory policies. Social media platforms have become battlegrounds for spreading hateful rhetoric and misinformation, amplifying the impact of antisemitic narratives.

Today, the internet has become a breeding ground for anti-Semitic rhetoric, with social media platforms facilitating the spread of hate speech and conspiracy theories targeting Jews. The anonymity and reach afforded by platforms like Facebook, "X" (Twitter), and YouTube allow individuals and groups to disseminate hateful content with ease, reaching millions of users in a matter of seconds. Antisemitic tropes and stereotypes, such as Jewish control of media, finance, and global affairs, are often perpetuated and normalized through viral posts, memes, and videos, fueling prejudice and animosity towards Jewish communities.

While social media offers unprecedented connectivity and communication, it also presents significant challenges, one of which is the spread of hate speech and bigotry. Moreover, social media algorithms, designed to maximize engagement and user retention, inadvertently contribute to the proliferation of antisemitism. These algorithms prioritize content based on user preferences and past interactions, creating echo chambers where individuals are exposed to increasingly extreme and divisive viewpoints. As a result, users susceptible to antisemitic messaging may find themselves inundated with hateful content, further reinforcing their biases, and fostering a sense of belonging within online hate communities.

Furthermore, social media platforms are the culprit for online harassment and targeted attacks against Jewish individuals and organizations. Cyberbullying and threats of violence have become all too common, causing physical harm to victims and perpetuating a culture of fear and intimidation. Jewish public figures, journalists, and activists are particularly vulnerable to online abuse, facing relentless harassment and smear campaigns simply for expressing their views or identity.

Despite these challenges, it is essential to recognize that social media also offers opportunities for positive change and resistance against antisemitism. Jewish advocacy organizations, grassroots activists, and allies have leveraged social media to raise awareness. Through education campaigns and advocacy efforts, individuals are mobilizing online to challenge antisemitic narratives and promote empathy, understanding, and mutual respect.

My son Zack is a proud Jew who wears his Star of David necklace freely. We should all be proud to be Jewish, but at the same time, we must exercise common sense and vigilance during times of strife. My wife Randi and I are happy with the Jewish values we have instilled upon our children, and it is important that each of us infuses these same values across all generations. The time is now to combat misinformation and build solidarity across our communities throughout the United States and the world.

100% Goal Target: December 31, 2023



The success of our Hebrew High School, *B'yachad*, is dependent on the ability to not only learn about 'the ethics of our people,' but more importantly to build a community. When students trust and care about each other they feel safe to share their views and ideas in a classroom setting and a dialogue begins. The fear of being judged by one's peers dissipates, and discussions become lively and interactive. From the time of Hillel and Shammai, our tradition teaches that there was always room to examine, dissect and re-evaluate our laws. This committee continues to thrive under the leadership of a Board of Directors comprised of dedicated young adults who receive guidance from Abby Edelman, Jamie Kideckel, and Ali Wise. The committee now provides resources for clothing of children living in shelters as well as supporting nourish.NJ.

Last year a second committee was formed - The Community Scholarship Committee of the Pine Brook Jewish Center. The mission of this committee is to provide scholarships to academically worthy students of Dover High School who have made a difference in their community. For the first year the committee, comprised of 21 members, provided one scholarship of \$2,400 and two scholarships each of \$400.


