RABBI'S MESSAGE

RABBI MARK DAVID FINKEL

For Those Who Like to Note Jewish Holidays When They Come Early or Late ...

There are many among us who often speak about the Jewish holidays coming "early" or "late." That usually means in relation to the Gregorian-secular calendar, and it usually refers to the holidays of *Rosh HaShanah*, *Yom Kippur*, *Hanukkah*, and *Pesah* (Passover). Among those who note the arrival of Jewish holidays in this manner (and even if you're not), let me suggest an upcoming holiday to include in that perspective and a possible advantage in doing so.

Tu B'Shevat, the New Year festival for trees Is coming up on the evening of January 16 and on January 17. It was the holiday, for those of a certain age, when we bought "stamps" towards the purchase of "planting" a tree in Israel. Some of us may have gotten a carob (bokser) pod and a little box of raisins in religious school to mark the occasion.

I mention this because January 16-17 is a relatively "early" date to celebrate this holiday. This should not come as a surprise, since people have already told me that *Rosh HaShanah*, *Yom Kippur*, *Sukkot*, *and <u>H</u>anukkah have already come "early" in 5782; however, I believe that this holiday, more than those others, really may make a difference in our perspective of life and time by noting that it comes early. Huh?*

In Israel, *Tu B'Shevat* is often a day when students go on field trips to physically plant those trees for which we in the diaspora contribute money. Even adults take time out of their schedules to plant trees on *Tu B'Shevat*. I planted trees on the *Tu B'shevat* that I spent in Israel. Many of us are familiar that there is a Jewish mystical Kabbalistic tradition of conducting a special *Tu B'Shevat seder* for the occasion, as we have done in our congregation.

But the reason that I believe celebrating it "early" is significant is because *Tu B'Shevat* signifies the coming of Spring: it marks the blossoming of the almond trees in Israel: Israel's earliest sign of the arrival of Spring. We understand that it is difficult for us to appreciate the coming of Spring while we are sliding on the ice and shoveling snow, but think of it this way: the almond trees in Israel have a two week jump on Punxsutawney Phil and the other groundhogs. Furthermore, when those almond trees blossom, there is no question that Spring is coming: no one needs to check if the almond tree "sees its shadow".

For those who hope that Omicron will be gone by Spring: the Jewish message is "Spring is coming!" and the almond blossoms as the *Tu B'Shevat* song says:

Tziporim may-ROSH Kol gag, m'vas-ROTE et BO heh-HAG

" ... birds on the top of every roof herald the coming of this holiday."

Spring is coming. The spike will recede, and we will get a piece of "normal" back with a new-found strength ... and since *Purim* is coming *late* this year (not a typo), maybe even we, in the colder climates, will have experienced enough Spring to celebrate *Purim* with joy.

Stay safe. Stay strong. That is the message of our people.

The success of our Hebrew High School, *B'yachad*, is dependent on the ability to not only learn about 'the ethics of our people,' but more importantly to build a community. When students trust and care about each other they feel safe to share their views and ideas in a classroom setting and a dialogue begins. The fear of being judged by one's peers dissipates, and discussions become lively and interactive. From the time of Hillel and Shammai, our tradition teaches that there was always room to examine, dissect and re-evaluate our laws. In fact, many believe that different perspectives are exactly the reason Judaism has survived for almost 6000 years. However, all our ancestors agreed on the importance of a holy community a '*kehilah kedusha*,' where everyone is respected, and every opinion is valued.

A scholarship fund was established by Congregation Beth Shalom in Eliot's memory. The goal of the fund is to provide financial aid to youth participating in Jewish activities, such as Kadima, USY, Camp Ramah, Israel trips, and other Jewish educational activities.

Congregation Beth Shalom has transferred the fund to Pine Brook Jewish Center, where it will continue to perpetuate Eliot's memory. May his memory be a blessing to your youth.

Eliot's brothers, Harvey and Bill, are current members of Pine Brook Jewish Center. Pissarro was an "outsider" in 19th Century Paris— he was a Jewish émigré from St. Thomas, a political radical, and he absolutely rejected the academic art establishment. He has been called the father figure and peacemaker of the Impressionists because he was the eldest, had the least quarrelsome temperament, and he took new artists under his wing and gave them advice and encouragement. Although he painted a variety of subjects, he is mostly known for his luminous portrayal of the natural world, which inspired not only the young artists of the 19th Century avant-garde, but which continues to enthrall art lovers.
