CANTOR'S MESSAGE

CANTOR MENACHEM TOREN

Greetings my dear friends,

As we are entering the year 2023, I am going to reveal to you a shocking fact. This fact will not even affect your grandchildren or your great-grandchildren, so don't get upset yet...

So here it goes...

In the year 3031 there will be no <u>Hanukkah</u>, and no <u>Hanukkah</u> celebration. We will not light the <u>Hanukkiah</u> at home or the Town Hall or do anything associated with <u>Hanukkah</u>. How is it even possible? And who has the right to cancel this holiday and why?

Of course, no one can cancel the holiday, the answer lies in the difference between the Hebrew calendar and the Gregorian calendar. The Gregorian calendar relies on the cycle of earth around the sun, and therefore also the seasons. One year is 365 days, and every four years it is 366 days.

On the other hand, the Hebrew calendar relies on the moon cycle, which has variances, with 12 months, each averaging approximately 29.53 days.

Since our major holidays must fall in certain seasons (*Pesach*, *Shavuot*, *Sukkot*) there must be a way to make sure that our holidays fall within certain seasons. If the Gregorian calendar is used, the seasons would shift and *Pesach*, for example, could fall in the winter or the summer. The solution is that every few years another month (Adar "B") is added, and the Hebrew calendar has 13 months in that year.

This is a good solution but not perfect if you are also using the Gregorian calendar in conjunction with the Hebrew holidays, because once every 216 years the Hebrew calendar is lagging one day behind the Gregorian calendar. <u>Hanukkah</u>, which is celebrated between the 25th and 32nd/33rd of *Kislev*, normally falls somewhere around the 28th of November and the 27th of December, but because of that lag I mentioned before, in the year 6792 on the Hebrew calendar, the 25th of *Kislev* (first day of <u>Hanukkah</u>) will fall on January 1st 3032, so in the year 3031 <u>Hanukkah</u> will not appear on that calendar at all.

It is a "curse," but it is also a "blessing," because in the year 3032 <u>H</u>anukkah will appear twice on the Gregorian calendar, and <u>H</u>anukkah will be celebrated twice!

Of course, it doesn't matter, because <u>Hanukkah</u> will be celebrated once every year as long as we live because we use the Hebrew calendar, and those who are orthodox may not even notice the change that year. Growing up orthodox in Israel and surrounded with only the use of the Hebrew calendar, I am now appreciative of the Gregorian calendar, as I can wish my friends a "happy and healthy new year" twice every year. Also, truth be told, I also enjoy celebrating other holidays that are not Jewish holidays, like Thanksgiving and New Year, and why not?

Now let me wish you all, my dear extended family, a Happy New Year, a wonderful year, a year of peace, health, and above all well-being and contentment.

Jake Willner January 28, 2023



On December 23, 2009, Jake Dylan Willner entered the world and changed our lives forever with his wit and personality. Our first born, he was the best gift we could have asked for during the holiday season. He enjoyed his first full year of independence and then became a big brother to Abby, and four years later again to Zoe.

He handles being surrounded by sisters with skill and patience, and most times, with careful diplomacy. It isn't easy to be first at everything, but Jake is always happy to tell his sisters why his way is the best way!

Jake is a 7th grader at Lazar Middle School; he has a natural academic gift that has shown itself in his honors classes as well as outside school.

Jake started at Camp Westmont when he was eight years old; it was there he discovered his love of music. He has become an avid guitar player and song writer. Rarely does he share his gift with others. But, when we are fortunate enough to hear him play, his talent is evident.

We could not be more proud that he has chosen to use his skills as a way to raise money and awareness for his mitzvah project. Jake has written and recorded an original song. This song focuses on the struggles of school age children in relation to mental health and gun violence; two issues that unfortunately now affect our lives every day. As a kid growing up in their time, all too often Jake has been troubled by active shooting drills, stories on tv about school shootings, and concerns about why such horrific things can happen to regular kids. This was his opportunity to do something about it.

Proceeds from the streaming of his new song will be donated to the Sandy Hook Promise Foundation, which funds education on mental health and the signs of adolescent struggle. The hope is that the next school shooting can be prevented if we all just give a little of ourselves.

To say we are proud of Jake is an understatement. He is thoughtful and has unlimited potential. Jake, we are so excited and cannot wait to see you called to the Torah as a Bar Mitzvah. This is only the beginning of a great life journey.

HARVEY JAFFE B'YACHAD MEMORIAL FUND

Harvey Jaffe, *Hershey*, was the driving force behind *B'yachad*. He helped make our dream come alive by leading a vibrant community of learners who come together post their B'Nai Mitzvah! This is what Hershey had to say about it:

The success of our Hebrew High School, *B'yachad*, is dependent on the ability to not only learn about 'the ethics of our people,' but more importantly to build a community. When students trust and care about each other they feel safe to share their views and ideas in a classroom setting and a dialogue begins. The fear of being judged by one's peers dissipates, and discussions become lively and interactive. From the time of Hillel and Shammai, our tradition teaches that there was always room to examine, dissect and re-evaluate our laws. In fact, many believe that different perspectives are exactly the reason Judaism has survived for almost 6000 years. However, all our ancestors agreed on the importance of a holy community a '*kehilah kedusha*,' where everyone is respected, and every opinion is valued.

The reason I come back to B'yachad cannot be put into words. I cannot describe how much fun it is; it is something that needs to be experienced to understand. Hershey is a magnificent teacher who does an incredible job engaging with all the students and I strongly recommend that everyone attend B'yachad.

The reason I keep coming back to B'yachad is because I want to keep learning deeply about Judaism and all its many different features. Also, I love Hershey's sense of humor and the way he handles things are funny. Finally, I like the things we talk about and hanging with friends. B'yachad is the best place to be on a Thursday night, Mrs. Sheydwasser, Hershey, and everyone in it are the best.

B'yachad has given me the opportunity to grow closer with my peers. I've learned beyond the basics of responsibility, right from wrong and a series of life lessons. The friendship, trust and creativity in the room allows me to connect individually with each person. I am proud to be a part of B'yachad and I am proud to speak freely there without hesitation.

I still come to B'yachad because of the environment and because I know I will learn something I may not anywhere else. Hershey is someone I know I can tell anything to and ask anything without worrying about it leaving the conversation. I love learning about my Jewish roots and about what my religion stands for in relation to the past, the present and what will happen in the future.

Funds were collected initially after his untimely passing, however, his legacy still lives on. Hershey's family has decided to put this money and all future donations towards scholarships for students interested in enrolling in *B'Yachad*, along with funding off-site excursions that have always been highlights of our program. A scholarship fund was established by Congregation Beth Shalom in Eliot's memory. The goal of the fund is to provide financial aid to youth participating in Jewish activities, such as Kadima, USY, Camp Ramah, Israel trips, and other Jewish educational activities.

Congregation Beth Shalom has transferred the fund to Pine Brook Jewish Center, where it will continue to perpetuate Eliot's memory. May his memory be a blessing to your youth.

Eliot's brothers, Harvey and Bill, are current members of Pine Brook Jewish Center. Upon learning of the sudden and tragic loss of Aaron Melzer, a Pine Brook Jewish Center Religious School student, Congregation Beth Shalom honored the Melzer family by rededicating the fund as the Eliot Sakolsky Aaron Melzer Scholarship Fund.

Aaron is the son of Margo and Jason Melzer, and the older brother of triplets, Anna, Brielle, and Brian. Aaron was a Religious School Student at Pine Brook Jewish Center, beginning at the age of two in its Nursery School. Aaron was a kind, loving, thoughtful and empathetic young man who was looking forward to his Bar Mitzvah. It was Aaron's dream to travel to Israel, but he never did, as a result of his sudden passing at the age of eleven. This committee continues to thrive under the leadership of a Board of Directors comprised of dedicated young adults who receive guidance from Abby Edelman, Jamie Kideckel, and Ali Wise. The committee now provides resources for clothing of children living in shelters as well as supporting nourish.NJ.

Last year a second committee was formed - The Community Scholarship Committee of the Pine Brook Jewish Center. The mission of this committee is to provide scholarships to academically worthy students of Dover High School who have made a difference in their community. For the first year the committee, comprised of 21 members, provided one scholarship of \$2,400 and two scholarships each of \$400.
