# RABBI'S MESSAGE

**RABBI MARK DAVID FINKEL** 

"Unpacking:" Ahm Yisra'el Chai !: The Peoplehood of Israel LIVE!

To Those Who Love Us, Those Who Hate Us,

and Those Who In Their Curiosity Will Never Stop Trying to Define Us:

**Ahm:** Who are we? Who knows? Perhaps, only G-d knows. Some of our detractors tell us that we are privileged white people, which should probably make us a race. Our history tells us that three+ millennia ago we were probably people of color who were enslaved by another people of color. In the 20th century a madman and his countrymen and countless others under his spell tried to annihilate us because we were the wrong race. Whoopi Goldberg got it half right: Her perspective cannot see that a great deal of anti-Semitism is racism, if for no other reason than those who sought our destruction saw us as a race apart. I believe she also accidentally got it right because there has been much anti-Semitism not because of race: it may have been about who we may or may not have been accused of killing 2,000 years ago, or whether we were accused of being capitalists who controlled the world's economy, or we were accused of being communists who sought to undermine the world's economy, or that we were accused of poisoning wells, or that we were accused of making *matzah* out of the blood of children, or that we were accused of spreading the bubonic plague or COVID-19. (Conspiracy theories are nothing new.)

On the other hand, we are still searching for our ten lost tribes, and we can often be rather tribal. Perhaps less so these days, but we still ask the question, "Does someone *look* Jewish?"

Some say Jews have a unique culture. So, what ingredients go into making a culture?

Some say Judaism is a **Religion**: Most world civilization books credit us with, if not discovering monotheism, then discovering, and maintaining the oldest sustained monotheism on the face of the earth. Ahhh, but what about Jewish atheists? We generally include them as Jews, **so we should not define ourselves as** *only a* **religion**; however, let it be said that much of our Bible impresses upon us that we have *no more than* one G-d, and we should not worship a *false* god, so Jewish atheists are in, as are Jew-Bu(ddhist)'s on the Upper West Side and other places, but Jews for Jesus are out.

Language: We have our own language, actually, languages. Let's start with Hebrew: a majority of the Jewish people speak Hebrew in their everyday lives (Do the math: World's population of Jews minus Jews living outside Israel, and that is a conservative estimate (Much of my family speaks Hebrew, but we are not Israeli citizens, and there are many more Hebrew speakers like us around the world)). For those who will point to Jews who cannot read, write, or understand Hebrew, I tell the story of a Jewish woman whom I met in a hospital while on her deathbed who had "given up" her Judaism to marry an Italian-Catholic man. Her son, a practicing Catholic and knowing that "she was once Jewish," asked me to say a prayer for her. I asked her, even in her weakened condition, for her Hebrew name. Her son quickly apologized to me, saying that his mother left that long ago and hardly remembers anything anymore. He was dumbfounded when his mother in a forced whisper told me her Hebrew name and those of her parents. He said that he had never heard those names before; and when I said the Shema ... we saw a smile on her face. Perhaps not as dramatic as that, but I have lost count of the number of congregants, members of their families, and complete strangers who claim to know no Hebrew, but want to say the Shema with me before they die. I said "languages." Yiddish, Aramaic, Ladino have all been Jewish vernacular, so yes, we are not defined by a language, but languages do define us. And when we speak of Jewish languages, in 1887 Ludwik Lejzer Zamenhof, a Polish Jew invented Esperanto in the 1870's and '80's as an international language in the hope of fostering world peace and understanding. Curiously, HaTikvah was

also created in the 1870's (lyrics) and 1880's (music). For a future trip to Israel: Zamenhof Street in Tel Aviv is one of the intersecting streets in Dizengoff Square/Circle.

No first grader today could say their ABC 's had the Jews not developed our *Aleph Bet*. The Greeks would not have had their *alpha or beta, alpha* males would be known as something else, Sony would not have had its Betamax, fraternities and sororities would be nameless (or letter-less), and 3.14159265359 (for more, read the sidewalk at the Liberty Science Center) would need to be called something else, had those people called Hebrews or Israelites, or Jews never invented the letter "*Pay*," ancestor of *Pi*.

I realize that we live in a digital age, but I am quite sure that the Bible (ours and 50% of the Christian version) is still the best-selling book of all time. It defined literature millennia before *The Canterbury Tales*. Moses and Miriam's song (Exodus 15:1-18), Deborah's song (Judges 5:2-31) and *Éshet Hayil* (A Women of Valor: Proverbs 31:10-31), not to mention the Book of *Psalms* (but I will mention it anyway), have more printed copies than any Taylor Swift song. Those Hebrew poems defined poetry before *Beowulf*. The book of *Psalms* was the first book printed in what is today the United States (1640 in Cambridge, Massachusetts; another "stop" on my "Massachusetts' Firsts" tour, if I become a tour guide upon my retirement ©)

Neither are we defined by a cuisine. Hopefully, most of us realize that *Ashkenazic* cuisine is only a portion of what Jews have traditionally eaten, and that only goes back a few centuries (We could call it: Jewish nouvelle cuisine, so to speak).

A culture contains its distinctive arts, music, and dance. Jewish arts vary by time and place. Like the complex people that we are, the rules sometimes change and contradict each other (e.g., portraying a human image or listening to a woman sing), so Jewish art goes beyond a single culture.

So, what is the Hebrew word **Ahm**? A people? To quote Lina Lamont in *Singin' in the Rain*, "I ain't people." Alert: a personal bias: To borrow from my teacher Mordecai Kaplan, in the eyes of those who love us as well as in the eyes of our detractors (and worse), we are "those people," said in a complimentary *or* an insulting tone of voice. Four millennia of distinctiveness has, allowed us to raise the Hebrew **Ahm** from a people to a "peoplehood" (just as when neighbors as they become more established, become a neighborhood) who are connected beyond a culture, but by a "civilization", a constellation of cultures, containing the knowledge and wisdom of the ages, passed along from one generation to the next, by that distinctive people.

As Tevye would say, "Sounds crazy, no?" But I believe that it is a key ingredient in the "secret sauce" that defines what has kept us and keeps us going whenever and wherever we have lived: together or scattered throughout the world, in good times and in bad.

**Yisra'el**: From the time our ancestor Jacob wrestled with the angel, until today, wrestling has been a Jewish sport, spiritual wrestling, if not physical wrestling. We wrestle with each other, we wrestle with the world, and G-d knows, each one of us wrestles with ourselves. I believe that G-d also knows that we wrestle with G-d. Observing not ten, but 613 commandments and *Tikkun Olam*: "repairing the world" are not easy jobs, so more often than not we are not afraid to wrestle above our weight class in our mission to get the tasks done; and how do we go about doing all that? It would be an understatement to say, "Whoever said, 'Two Jews, three opinions' was prone to understatement." We are a stiff-necked people. Jacob did not walk away from his victory over the angel unscathed: he walked away with a limp, defining how kosher butchers sell their wares to this day.

The Rabbis of the Talmud spoke of disputes and disagreement which are for the sake of heaven, and which are not for the sake of heaven. The challenge is that usually we do not know which disputes and disagreements are for the sake of heaven and which are not, except in 20/20 hindsight. We have caused schisms, dissention, and baseless hatreds, for which Jews are somewhat poorer and we have not walked away unscathed; but, I


believe, that those disputes and disagreements have also been part of the "secret sauce" that has forced Jews to make many difficult decisions over the millennia on how to survive, live, and thrive.

Chai: Many of us know of tales of. climbing a mountain to ask a wise man for "the meaning of life." Let me ask an easier question: what is the meaning of *Chai*, the Hebrew word for life? In the days of the Rabbis of the Talmud, Judaism was fascinated by the Greek concept of a separation between body and soul. The Rabbis felt that Judaism needed to compete with Greek philosophy, lest we be discarded on the garbage heap of time. So, the Rabbis took the notion of nefesh, which up until that time was the human cardio-pulmonary system (that which makes us tick) and transformed it into a soul that G-d gifts to each human to perceive the world, to think and to feel; and upon our passing, it returns to G-d in heaven under the shelter of G-d's protective wing. Chaim, "life" was tied to the soul; and if our bodies were mortal, our souls blessed us with immortality: we have finite years on earth and infinite time in heaven. I suspect, however, that when most of us say I'Chaim, we are not thinking about immortality; we are in the moment celebrating with family and friends. To life means this life, at least for now; and the afterlife about which we can prove little, we will figure it out when we get there, with a little help from our friends and family. We do not deny immortality; it is just that we have more developed opinions about the life that we are working on right now on earth. So, when we say Ahm Yisra'el Chai: The Peoplehood of Israel Lives! we speak to the longevity of the people of Israel; and in spite of the challenges, our people has developed a civilization which has brought civilization to the world; and if immortality is in our future, we will humbly accept it as G-d's gift.

When we sing and scream *Ahm Yisra'el Chai* sometimes at the top of our lungs (our *nefesh*), sometimes sounding crazed, it is a call to the world. In the 1970's those three Hebrew words were graffitied on (and erased from) Rome's Arch of Titus, built in celebration of the destruction of Jerusalem. In 1964 *LOOK* magazine had an article "The Vanishing American Jew." Three years later in the wake of the Six Days War, American Jews ventured out into what has thus far become the golden period of Jewish life in America. We are still here; and *LOOK* magazine is not. Abraham, our ancestor answered with the word *Hineni!* "I am here!" These words are a reminder to those who love us, to those who hate us, and to those who in their curiosity will never stop trying to define us.



However, all our ancestors agreed on the importance of a holy community a '*kehilah kedusha*,' where everyone is respected, and every opinion is valued.

Eliot was the United Synagogue Youth (USY) leader at Congregation Beth Shalom in Pompton Lakes. He passed away at the age of thirty-one. A scholarship fund was established by Congregation Beth Shalom in Eliot's memory. The goal of the fund is to provide financial aid to youth participating in Jewish activities, such as Kadima, USY, Camp Ramah, Israel trips, and other Jewish educational activities. Congregation Beth Shalom transferred the fund to Pine Brook Jewish Center, where it will continue to perpetuate Eliot's memory. May his memory be a blessing to your youth.

Eliot's brothers, Harvey and Bill, are current members of Pine Brook Jewish Center. Upon learning of the sudden and tragic loss of Aaron Melzer, a Pine Brook Jewish Center Religious School student, Congregation Beth Shalom honored the Melzer family by rededicating the fund as the Eliot Sakolsky Aaron Melzer Scholarship Fund. Aaron was the son of Margo and Jason Melzer, and the older brother of triplets, Anna, Brielle, and Brian. Aaron was a Religious School Student at Pine Brook Jewish Center, beginning at the age of two in its Nursery School. Aaron was a kind, loving, thoughtful and empathetic young man who was looking forward to his Bar Mitzvah. It was Aaron's dream to travel to Israel, but he never did, as a result of his sudden passing at the age of eleven. The Melzer family shares the Sakolsky family's mission to offer financial assistance to Religious School students so that they can further their Jewish studies at home and abroad.

In memory of Eliot Sakolsky and Aaron Melzer, this fund will continue to financially assist Jewish youth to obtain a meaningful Jewish education and to fulfill their own individual dreams. Please note that recipients of this scholarship must be members of Pine Brook Jewish Center and students in high school or college. The Community Outreach Committee began almost 10 years ago with a simple mission: to provide living necessities to those with a defined psychiatric illness who are clients of the Mental Health Association of Essex and Morris Counties. This committee continues to thrive under the leadership of a Board of Directors comprised of dedicated young adults who receive guidance from Abby Edelman, Jamie Kideckel, and Ali Wise. The committee now provides resources for clothing of children living in shelters as well as supporting nourish.NJ.

Last year a second committee was formed - The Community Scholarship Committee of the Pine Brook Jewish Center. The mission of this committee is to provide scholarships to academically worthy students of Dover High School who have made a difference in their community. For the first year the committee, comprised of 21 members, provided one scholarship of \$2,400 and two scholarships each of \$400.
