CANTOR'S MESSAGE

CANTOR MENACHEM TOREN

Greetings my dear friends,

In this month, we will mourn the destruction of our two holy temples. Both were destroyed on the same day of the month of Av, the ninth. My guess is that non-religious people don't make a big thing about this (it is also a fast day), even though I think everyone should due to the REASON that our temples were destroyed.

Both temples stood still for a very long time. The first temple stood 410 years, and the second temple stood 586/420 years (historians say 586, the Talmud said 420). As far as I know, no institute of that magnitude today functions for that long. According to our history, both temples were destroyed for the same reason, which is "hate without reason." (I am not sure that even hate with a GOOD reason is a good thing ...)

There is a story I would like to share with you; a story that is actually told in elementary schools in Israel, that demonstrates this type of hate, or lack of compassion. This story is from the Talmud, and it is called "*Kamzza* and *Bar Kamzza*". The story is about a wealthy man, who had a big party, and he sent his servant to invite his very good friend *Kamzza*. The servant mistakenly invited instead *Bar Kamzza*, who actually had a big quarrel with that man, and they had hated each other for a long time. *Bar Kamzza*, who got the invitation, thought that that man wanted to make peace with him, and this is why he invited him; so, he went to the party. Upon his arrival, the wealthy man noticed him and wanted to chase him out of his party.

Bar Kamzza was so embarrassed, but he didn't want to leave, and offered to pay the man for his own meal. But the man refused. Again, he tried, and offered to pay for the whole party, as long as he could stay and not be embarrassed. But even this offer was refused, and the man chased him out of the restaurant, embarrassing him in front of all the guests. *Bar Kamzza* was furious, especially since there were some of the religious leaders at that party. However, none of them intervened, so he decided to take revenge.

Bar Kamzza sent a message to the Roman emperor and claimed that the Jewish people were rebelling, and that he had proof. He suggested that the emperor send a sacrifice to the holy temple. He claimed that the Jews would refuse the sacrifice coming from the emperor. The emperor decided to try this and sent a calf as a sacrifice. The emperor knew that only an animal without any blemishes could be brought as a sacrifice, so he made sure that he sent a perfect animal with *Bar Kamzza*. However, *Bar Kamzza* put a small blemish in the calf, one that was difficult to see without close inspection. And of course, once the priests noticed the blemish, they refused to accept it. The emperor got furious, and we all know the results.

This story has (at least it had on me) a very strong impact, especially since we know how children can sometimes be very nasty to each other, and the gravity of the results that come from hate really help to deliver the message of how important it is to have compassion.

Whether you have deep pain, small pain, or no pain at all in your heart, because it all happened so long ago, I am asking you, on the day of the ninth of Av (this year July 27), to stop for a minute and think about the importance of compassion and how terrible is hate.

As I have said many times before, and will probably say in the future, G-d helps us to do the right thing by the way that we feel when we feel compassion to others, when we help others. We feel good when we love, and when we hate, get angry, etc., we don't feel good. This has always been a good moral compass, at least for me.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

School is out and summer has arrived. For those of you in need of some short, summer reading, I have prepared my first of a series of 24 PBJC Monthly Candlestick articles. But, before sharing some thoughts, I first wanted to take this opportunity to thank Michael Weinstein, our outgoing President, the outgoing executive committee, and our outgoing Chevra Board of trustees for their time, dedication, and service to the PBJC over the past couple of years. The outgoing lay leadership team was installed at a time when we were still dealing with the Covid pandemic and searching for ways to keep membership engagement strong at the Pine Brook Jewish Center. Successfully pivoting us from in-person, to virtual, and now back to in-person, with the assistance of our Clergy and the office, I am pleased to share that we have successfully stabilized our membership base and have increased our in-person engagement across many different facets of the Pine Brook Jewish Center, including fundraising and events, the ECC, Religious School, as well as during our weekly services.

As we embark upon this next chapter at the PBJC, with new lay leadership having just been installed two weeks ago, I can honestly state that I am extremely excited for what the future will hold here at the synagogue. I have high expectations and will be putting goals in place to make the Pine Book Jewish Center a thriving place once again that not only offers a place for prayer, study, spiritual guidance, and healing, but a dwelling that also offers a true sense of community. My vision for the PBJC is not simply about fundraising and specific events, rather gatherings through programming, community outreach, social action, and simple get-togethers.

As we continue to think about building upon membership engagement and strengthening the ties between the congregation and the synagogue, I must acknowledge that we also have a lot of wood to chop as there will be significant changes that will require the assistance of not only leadership, but the congregation as a whole. With Rabbi Finkel announcing his retirement last Fall, we are well on our way with the clergy transition. To that point, I wanted to take a moment to thank Jonathan Cohen and Barry Weinreb, the members of the Ritual Committee, as well as the Clergy Transition Sub-Committee for all their efforts to date in assisting with the plan to restructure the PBJC pulpit to a single clergy model upon Rabbi Finkel's retirement. Although subject to final congregational vote, I am pleased to share that at last month's Chevra meeting, the Board of Trustees voted in favor of Ritual and the CTC's motion of Cantor Toren being offered the opportunity to become PBJC's next Rabbi. Stay tuned as additional details of this formal transition will be forthcoming soon to the broader congregation.

Let's talk about coincidence – having started the same year as Rabbi Finkel, and after serving for 16 years as our Religious School Director, Mary Sheydwasser has formally announced that she will be stepping down from her role as the PBJC's Religious School Director in May 2024. While we were all saddened to hear this news, the good news is that Mary has expressed a sincere interest in maintaining an active involvement with the PBJC in some capacity and we are currently discussing ways to utilize her knowledge, skillset, commitment to our kids, and service to our synagogue in the future. At the same time, she will be instrumental in working alongside the lay leadership as we look to begin a formal search for a new education director here at the PBJC shortly.

So, you may all be thinking how we are going to accomplish what I have set forth in what I will call PBJC 2.0. The answer is simple – kind of. I am pleased to share that with the assistance and buy-in of our new Board of Trustees, I have reinstated a committee system across all aspects of the synagogue effective July 1st. What does that mean, you may be asking. It means that the onus will be on each of our member-based committees to make this place what our membership wants. Bringing ideas and recommendations back to the various committees will naturally reinvigorate the full involvement that was lost during the pandemic. To that point, it is important for me to note that our membership need not serve as a Board of Trustee member to be involved in a committee that may be important to you. I implore you to get involved and foster ideas and suggestions that may pique the interest of our membership base to draw them back into this building. To the extent you are looking to get more involved in a committee and want more information, please do not hesitate to contact Michelle Zuckerman, Sandy Gonzalez, Melanie Lewis, and/or me to express your interest, and we will be sure to get you involved.

I look forward to this new chapter. Onward and upward!

Harvey Jaffe, *Hershey*, was the driving force behind *B'yachad*. He helped make our dream come alive by leading a vibrant community of learners who come together post their B'Nai Mitzvah! This is what Hershey had to say about it:

The success of our Hebrew High School, *B'yachad*, is dependent on the ability to not only learn about 'the ethics of our people,' but more importantly to build a community. When students trust and care about each other they feel safe to share their views and ideas in a classroom setting and a dialogue begins. The fear of being judged by one's peers dissipates, and discussions become lively and interactive. From the time of Hillel and Shammai, our tradition teaches that there was always room to examine, dissect and re-evaluate our laws. In fact, many believe that different perspectives are exactly the reason Judaism has survived for almost 6000 years. However, all our ancestors agreed on the importance of a holy community a '*kehilah kedusha*,' where everyone is respected, and every opinion is valued.

Eliot was the United Synagogue Youth (USY) leader at Congregation Beth Shalom in Pompton Lakes. He passed away at the age of thirty-one. A scholarship fund was established by Congregation Beth Shalom in Eliot's memory. The goal of the fund is to provide financial aid to youth participating in Jewish activities, such as Kadima, USY, Camp Ramah, Israel trips, and other Jewish educational activities. Congregation Beth Shalom transferred the fund to Pine Brook Jewish Center, where it will continue to perpetuate Eliot's memory. May his memory be a blessing to your youth.

Eliot's brothers, Harvey and Bill, are current members of Pine Brook Jewish Center. Upon learning of the sudden and tragic loss of Aaron Melzer, a Pine Brook Jewish Center Religious School student, Congregation Beth Shalom honored the Melzer family by rededicating the fund as the Eliot Sakolsky Aaron Melzer Scholarship Fund. Aaron was the son of Margo and Jason Melzer, and the older brother of triplets, Anna, Brielle, and Brian. Aaron was a Religious School Student at Pine Brook Jewish Center, beginning at the age of two in its Nursery School. Aaron was a kind, loving, thoughtful and empathetic young man who was looking forward to his Bar Mitzvah. It was Aaron's dream to travel to Israel, but he never did, as a result of his sudden passing at the age of eleven. The Melzer family shares the Sakolsky family's mission to offer financial assistance to Religious School students so that they can further their Jewish studies at home and abroad.

In memory of Eliot Sakolsky and Aaron Melzer, this fund will continue to financially assist Jewish youth to obtain a meaningful Jewish education and to fulfill their own individual dreams. 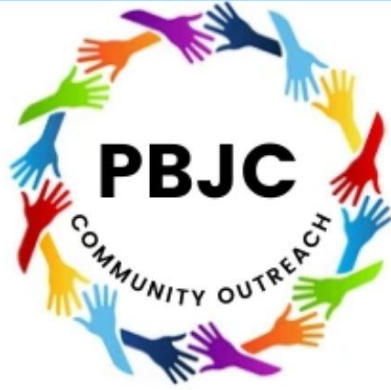
COMMUNITY OUTREACH AND COMMUNITY SCHOLARSHIP COMMITTEES

The Community Outreach Committee began almost 10 years ago with a simple mission: to provide living necessities to those with a defined psychiatric illness who are clients of the Mental Health Association of Essex and Morris Counties. This committee continues to thrive under the leadership of a Board of Directors comprised of dedicated young adults who receive guidance from Abby Edelman, Jamie Kideckel, and Ali Wise. The committee now provides resources for clothing of children living in shelters as well as supporting nourish.NJ.

Last year a second committee was formed - The Community Scholarship Committee of the Pine Brook Jewish Center. The mission of this committee is to provide scholarships to academically worthy students of Dover High School who have made a difference in their community. For the first year the committee, comprised of 21 members, provided one scholarship of \$2,400 and two scholarships each of \$400.
