## RABBI'S MESSAGE

#### **RABBI MARK DAVID FINKEL**

#### My Cousin Marcia - 21st Century Tools to Study a 3,500-Year-Old Text

At Kiddish recently, I had a discussion with someone who marveled at the ability of our congregants who can come to the Torah reading desk and, seemingly, read any Torah portion or any *haftarah* portion. He shared with me that when he was studying to become Bar Mitzvah, his Rabbi assigned him a tutor who gave him a record (it was 1961, and he couldn't recall whether it was a "78" or a "33" rpm) and said, "go learn it." He understood that after vinyl, came cassettes, to CD's, to voice files, but the marvel was how he thought that these members of PBJC are able to chant *every* Torah portion and *every haftarah* by learning to sing *one haftarah* from a record.

Let me share a story about my cousin, Marcia. In a nutshell, Marcia learned to play piano before she really learned to read [English]. After my aunt and uncle saw how Marcia would sit down and peck on other people's piano keyboards, someone had told my aunt and uncle that Marcia at 4 or 5 years old had superior musical ability. My aunt and uncle bought a piano and found a teacher who used a method of color coding the notes so Marcia could read sheet music around the time she was learning to read monosyllables of English.

...and Marcia learned how to play piano, in fact, anything that had a keyboard: she played the organ, and the accordion also. Family members regularly went to Marcia 's recitals and marveled at her musical talents. We also marveled at Marcia's strength: more than once someone would say, "I think that accordion weighs more than Marcia does."

The story doesn't end at Carnegie Hall or even Boston's Symphony Hall. Marcia became a nurse; but whenever she played the piano, her parents, her grandparents, and all family members within earshot "qvelled" – (Yiddish for: felt pride and joy beyond belief). I don't believe that any of Marcia 's children and now, grandchildren, play musical instruments; however, Marcia's son Matthew is a brilliant mathematician. Perhaps it is that same gene, showing itself in a different way.

I tell this story to make people aware of new technology in learning to read Torah or chanting *haftarah*. Not that long ago, we (PBJC) used some software called *Trope Trainer* with our *B'nai Mitzvah* students, and it was a useful learning tool. Recently, the Cantors Assembly, the professional organization of Conservative Cantors bought the rights to *Trope Trainer*, calling it *Trope Trainer* v.2. However, in its toolbox are two interesting tools: #1: the ability to print any Torah reading or *haftarah* on sheet music; thus, any person of any age who knows how to read music can apply the melody written on the staff to the words of the Torah or *haftarah*. (Lest I mislead anyone: one still needs to learn a Torah reading *well enough* to chant it without such learning tools. Reading from the Torah needs to be FROM THE TORAH. (The Cantor or I will gladly show you the difference.)

"So what?" you may ask. Much of the above *Kiddush* conversation revolved around the question: "How do those talented people on our *bimah* know when the melody goes up or down on any *haftarah* except the one on the record? The answer is: "The ones who learn from a record *can't*, but those who *can* read sheet music, *can* know the *haftarah* melody of any *haftarah*. But what about those who can't read sheet music?

And so, tool #2 is a color coding of the Torah and *haftarah* text. Hopefully, people have listened and noticed that in every Torah reading and every *haftarah*, there are certain short pieces of melody, about three or four words long, whose melody is repeated again and again and again. If one knows when to repeat each of those short pieces of melody, then it is no mystery how to sing the words of the Torah or *haftarah*. This tool highlights each of those short pieces of melody with its own color: so, all the yellow-highlighted phrases have the same melody, all the pink-highlighted phrases have the same melody, and all the turquoise-highlighted phrases...you guessed it: have the same melody. Truth be told about 60% of Torah and *haftarah* have the most common 3 phrases of melody; about 80% of Torah and *haftarah* have the most common 6 phrases of melody; and with color highlighting the student knows exactly when and where each of those melodies are chanted as well as the less frequent phrases of melody that make up the other 20%. This is a case of "Give a man a fish and you feed him for a day. Teach him how to fish and you feed him for a lifetime."

I pass this along for others who may be mystified by how Torah readers and *haftarah* chanters know the melody, sometimes, seemingly without effort. So, if you have been shy to ask up until now, "could I learn to read the Torah or chant *haftarah*?" you may have the potential to become as good a Torah reader or *haftarah* chanter as my cousin Marcia played the piano. As long as you know your colors, you have the potential to show your true colors.

The committee now provides resources for clothing of children living in shelters as well as supporting nourish.NJ.

Last year a second committee was formed - The Community Scholarship Committee of the Pine Brook Jewish Center. The mission of this committee is to provide scholarships to academically worthy students of Dover High School who have made a difference in their community. For the first year the committee, comprised of 21 members, provided one scholarship of \$2,400 and two scholarships each of \$400.
