CANTOR'S MESSAGE

CANTOR MENACHEM TOREN

The passenger in the taxi was touching the shoulder of the driver to signal him to stop, but the driver got scared, yelled, lost control of the vehicle, almost ran into a bus, and stopped one inch from a pedestrian. After a minute of rumbling silence, the driver approached the passenger and said, "please never do that again, I almost fainted." The passenger, also in a state of a shock, apologized, "I couldn't imagine that just touching your shoulder would cause such a big mess." The driver replied, "I was a hearse driver for the past 25 years, until today, nobody approached me from the back seat..."

If you are laughing now, it means you were surprised. The easiest way to notice this is with babies. As soon as they learn how to laugh, it doesn't take much to trigger this reflex, just a sudden show of a silly or weird face, will trigger the laughter mechanism in the baby.

This is what all young parents look forward to seeing, probably the second most joyful moment after delivering the baby...the first laugh. From that moment until the rest of the baby's life, he/she will continue to chase this wonderful, soul-tingling sensation of laughter, that is really (almost in all cases) associated with joy. We all want that, right?

For the observant Jew, it doesn't take too much to have a good life. He or she just needs to follow the rules of the Torah and our great rabbis, and everything is covered. Our rabbis knew the importance of laughter for our well-being, and therefore the Jew is obligated to be happy, and to chase laughter.

On Passover, we are obligated to drink 4 cups of wine, In a relatively short period of time. This will force even the toughest person to chill, relax and even laugh. On Shabbat, we are obligated to have festive meals and are very strongly encouraged to sing Shabbat songs around the table. On Purim, it goes to the extreme, by the command to start to be happy as soon as the month of *Adar* begins, and culminates on *Purim*, when we put a costume on, which makes others laugh, and also makes us laugh. We are also commanded to have a very festive meal on *Purim* and, of course, to drink alcohol to the extreme while reading the *Megillah*. We are commanded to go to such an extreme, that we shouldn't be able to tell the difference between *Haman* and *Mordecai*...

On *Purim*, we are commanded to give *Mishloach Manot* (some goodies in a bag...but at a minimum of at list two items for one individual), to one another, which strengthens our relationship with each other, and we are also commanded to give money and support to the needy. This means that, even if we are not naturally funny or we don't know how to enjoy humor, or if we don't typically give to others, we become better people and we are assured to have a better life just by observing the Torah.

Obviously, this holiday is among my favorites. Since you know me, you know that I don't need a command to try to be funny, and I'm not the person that needs encouragement to laugh or give. Nevertheless, I am thankful for this holiday because as happy as I normally am, usually my joy is at a peak during this holiday. Furthermore, I start to feel that spring is coming and that another favorite holiday is approaching - Passover. I am looking forward to Passover this year because Hadas's sister and her family are going to stay with us. Many happy moments are expected then.

As Jews, we are obligated to chase joy and happiness, because this is good for us. As Jews, in every generation we suffered, and we continue to suffer. Without our humor, and without the "forced on us" joy, laughter, and the obligation to care for one another, I am sure that we wouldn't survive until this day.

I wish you all, Happy *Purim*. I hope you enjoy the programs we prepared for you. And I thank you personally for all the endless support of our very important synagogue community. Happy Purim!

There seems to be no rhyme or reason to the day-to-day, but we learn to be ready for anything.

On Days of Joy- It would be difficult to overstate how wonderful our Crystal Jubilee Event was. It had it all- great participation at a beautiful and top-flight affair and a long overdue honoring of our own Rabbi Finkel and Cantor Toren for their long tenure and outstanding commitment to our community. Thank you to our clergy; thank you to those who worked hard to make it happen and thank you to our congregation for your willingness to support and celebrate together. We look forward to having more frequent community celebrations and fundraisers in the future.

On Days of Hate- It's hard to have any words for neo-Nazi and white supremacist support for an extremist day so blatantly and disgustingly labeled. Who thinks like this? It feels so unacceptable- that it emphasized an increase in antisemitic propaganda, that we had to be sure to be vigilant, and that the media should even give it so much play. At shul we upped our security and on the home front, we stepped out hesitantly with vigilance and watched the news. As President, I believe it is my responsibility to remind our community to stay strong, never forget to be aware, and never to think we are exempt. Some would say that too much is written on the topic of anti-Jewish sentiment, but I remind our community to stay strong and never forget to be aware of our surroundings. The threats have never been so real in our suburban New Jersey backyard. We should always stand strong as Jews, but also never forget to live a life without bias against others. Fight the hate so you can live the joy- and do it with pride and resolve!

Back at the ranch, PBJC's transitional plan is unfolding as planned as the Ritual Committee and our now fully formed Clergy Transition Committee is overseeing PBJC's efforts to manage the move to a single-clergy model upon the retirement of Rabbi Finkel in 2024. There is active mentoring going on between Rabbi Finkel and Cantor Toren to help prepare the Cantor for new and different responsibilities. Furthermore, Cantor Toren has been serving in various settings in the role of Rabbi rather than Cantor, allowing our congregants to experience the services as they might be conducted after Rabbi Finkel retires. Please note the ongoing dates this is happening so you can attend services and use this opportunity to experience Menachem Toren as your prospective spiritual leader. Your presence informs you so you can register your vote in June of this year. Let us also not forget that as this all happens, Rabbi Finkel is our spiritual leader until his retirement and we are indebted to him for his willingness to assist in this process, act as mentor, and put our future on a pedestal with his grace and compromise.

February was a short but exciting month here at the PBJC ECC (Early Childhood Center!). Winter just flies by when you are busy doing all the fun, creative and educational activities that can be found right here in our building. The children have been discussing whether or not they thought the groundhog saw its shadow, they continue to work on their winter counting books and they continue to discuss the letter or color of the week.

As we hope you have heard by now, PBJC ECC is thriving. We have expanded our already vibrant and stimulating preschool program to accommodate the needs of parents who require longer hours. Children ages 18 months to 5 years old can enroll in the Giggle Zone, an expanded care option (hours available from 7:30 a.m. to 6:00 p.m.) to complement our current preschool classes.

Registration is now open for the 2023-24 school year and our summer day camp. We will be offering classes for 18-month-olds (Intro) though Pre - K 4's. Additionally, we provide enrichment classes including music, gym, art appreciation and science. We also will be offering optional after school programs such as cooking, sports, movement and more!

Summer 2023 will be here before we know it. Planning for PBJC Day camp is in full swing! Applications for summer 2023, for children ages 18 months - 5 years old are available NOW. This year and going forward, PBJC Day Camp will be offered 5 days a week. Registration forms will be available through the ECC office and online. At PBJC Day camp we offer an 8-week program highlighted by fabulous weekly themes and programming that includes water play, arts and crafts, music, games, sports, special events and more!

Over the last (almost!) thirteen years, Gabs has continued to defy expectations. She has proven herself to be a thoughtful, empathetic, and caring human who cracks a whip-smart joke as easily as she offers a helping hand to those in need. She's patient and kind to her little brother, Henry, and always there for her friends and family. She's a dedicated, self-starter student at Lazar Middle School. Gabrielle loves tennis, rock climbing, and sometimes Pilates...when her mom makes her

For Gabrielle's mitzvah project, Gabrielle collected money from friends and family to donate to the American Brain Tumor Association, ABTA. The success of our Hebrew High School, *B'yachad*, is dependent on the ability to not only learn about 'the ethics of our people,' but more importantly to build a community. When students trust and care about each other they feel safe to share their views and ideas in a classroom setting and a dialogue begins. The fear of being judged by one's peers dissipates, and discussions become lively and interactive. From the time of Hillel and Shammai, our tradition teaches that there was always room to examine, dissect and re-evaluate our laws. In fact, many believe that different perspectives are exactly the reason Judaism has survived for almost 6000 years. However, all our ancestors agreed on the importance of a holy community a '*kehilah kedusha*,' where everyone is respected, and every opinion is valued.

Funds were collected initially after his untimely passing, however, his legacy still lives on. We hope you enjoyed the second and final part of **Marc Chagall: Painting Poetry** which Janet Mandel of ArtTalks presented on February 15th. It was such a treat once again to have several of our long distance members join us for this Zoom event. Chagall was born in 1887 in a shtetl near Vitebsk (then the Pale of Settlement, a western region of the Russian Empire; today known as Belarus). At varying times he called St. Petersburg, Paris, Berlin, Moscow and New York his home. Chagall was a pioneer of modernism but did not belong to one art movement or style. He incorporated elements of cubism, fauvism, symbolism, surrealism, and futurism into his paintings, etchings, book illustrations, stained-glass windows, ceramics, tapestries, stage sets and costumes — all infused with poetry. He is best known for his paintings, which are punctuated with dreamy reveries of life in his native village of Vitebsk, as well as his stained glass windows. Chagall worked until his death in 1985 at 97 years old. Arguably the world's pre-eminent Jewish artist, Chagall left us a rich legacy of unforgettable art.

The Community Outreach Committee began almost 10 years ago with a simple mission: to provide living necessities to those with a defined psychiatric illness who are clients of the Mental Health Association of Essex and Morris Counties. This committee continues to thrive under the leadership of a Board of Directors comprised of dedicated young adults who receive guidance from Abby Edelman, Jamie Kideckel, and Ali Wise. The committee now provides resources for clothing of children living in shelters as well as supporting nourish.NJ.

Last year a second committee was formed - The Community Scholarship Committee of the Pine Brook Jewish Center. The mission of this committee is to provide scholarships to academically worthy students of Dover High School who have made a difference in their community. For the first year the committee, comprised of 21 members, provided one scholarship of \$2,400 and two scholarships each of \$400.
