### **RABBI'S MESSAGE**

#### Remembering Rabbi Asher Krief z"l

Montville has changed a great deal in the past 50 years. In the 1970's multiple farms were still visible throughout our town. Some of the highways that bring us into Montville and take us out of town were still relatively new, or under construction, and in the case of I-287, still a road to nowhere going North. The school population was smaller, as were our school buildings. Neither the library nor the Municipal Building that we have today were yet built.

The Pine Brook Jewish Center was on Changebridge Road but not at #174, it was at #356, and the Pine Brook Jewish Center was in *Pine Brook*. In the mid-1970's PBJC welcomed a new Rabbi to town, Rabbi Asher Krief, who served as our Rabbi until just after the turn of the century. For most of those years, Rabbi Krief served as the sole spiritual leader to our Jewish community; Cantor Toren joined Rabbi Krief in Rabbi Krief's concluding years. Rabbi Krief's tenure as Rabbi saw many changes not only in Montville Township, but in the Jewish community also, and in the relationship between the two.

During Rabbi Krief's years as Rabbi, the PBJC community saw that it was growing larger. Its center was no longer in Pine Brook; the center had moved north along Changebridge Road, and Rabbi Krief guided the community in its move northward in 1982.

Rabbi Krief helped the Jewish community move physically, and more importantly, move spiritually from its home at #356 Changebridge Road (now the Sandol Presbyterian Church) to our current home at #174 Changebridge Road. He helped us feel at home in our current sanctuary which bears his name. As the spiritual leader of the Jewish community, he made himself and the Jewish community visible in interfaith activities both in the Montville clergy association and in the planning of our annual interfaith Thanksgiving services.

The symbolism of the beautiful stained-glass windows was a message to the Jewish community *inside* the sanctuary, and the outside of the new modern sanctuary was a message to all passers-by throughout the Montville community, *"Heneni:* We are here." To that end, Rabbi Krief campaigned vigorously so that *Rosh HaShanah* and *Yom Kippur* would be given the same respect as Christmas and Easter: the Montville schools would be closed, and many community events would no longer take place on those three holy days. We now take for granted the changes in Montville during his tenure.

It is a Jewish custom to mark *sh'loshim*, the conclusion of the first 30 days of mourning with a time of reflection to remember the person and our relationship with him. On Monday evening November 20th Pine Brook Jewish Center will mark the closing of those 30 days with an evening of reflection and prayer, remembering our Rabbi who was the steward of our community through those changes from the 20th to the 21st centuries.

It will appropriately take place in the Rabbi Krief Sanctuary at PBJC at 7:00 PM, and it is somewhat ironic that it will take place the night before the Greater Montville Interfaith Thanksgiving Service.

We invite you to come, tell stories, and listen. Some of us will share what it was like in Jewish Montville not that long ago, and some of us will listen and learn. All of us will be able to honor and appreciate our Rabbi who made a big difference in our community.

### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Hello PBJC Community-

On October 7th, 2023, armed Hamas terrorists tore down large parts of the Gaza security fence using tractors, rocket-propelled grenades and explosives, and invaded southern Israel. Simultaneously, Hamas terrorists in Gaza fired thousands of rockets toward Israel. Some 1,500 terrorists successfully broke through the fence in vehicles and by foot. Some used motorized paragliders to fly over the fence, and others attempted to invade through the sea.

The terrorists split up and made their way to a number of Israeli towns and IDF bases surrounding Gaza. That is when the massacre began. They invaded the towns, shooting everything in sight. They broke into civilian homes, shooting, burning, raping, and beheading. Over 1,300 Israeli civilians were murdered, and over 200 were abducted.

If there ever is a time to come together as a Jewish community, that time is now. Each and every one of us has some tie to Israel, be it having traveled there at some point during your life, having a friend who is Israeli, having family there, or simply aspiring to visit at some point during your lifetime. What happened on October 7<sup>th</sup> is just plain evil. The hatred towards Jews by Hamas is unacceptable and has led not only to a war in the State of Israel, but also a sharp rise in antisemitism across the world. Hatred towards Jews is unacceptable, but a sad reality of what has begun in many areas across the United States and what may come down the pike in the near future.

The Israel-Hamas conflict has reverberated across the United States and the world, impacting the Jewish communities in various ways. Here are some of the key effects from my perspective:

- Emotional Stress Many Jewish Americans feel a deep connection to Israel, whether through familial roots or religious beliefs. Consequently, witnessing conflict in the land they hold dear can lead to emotional stress and anxiety.
- Intercommunity Relations The Israel-Hamas conflict can strain relations between Jewish and non-Jewish communities in the United States. In certain instances, there have been reports of tensions and misunderstandings between different ethnic and religious groups. These challenges emphasize the importance of open and respectful dialogue to bridge divides and promote understanding.
- Antisemitism Concerns One concerning consequence of the Israel-Hamas conflict is the rise of antisemitism in the United States. Anti-Jewish sentiments and incidents, including vandalism and verbal abuse, sometimes increase during times of escalated conflict in the Middle East. These incidents are deeply troubling and highlight the need for greater awareness and security measures.
- Impact on Jewish Youth The conflict has also left its mark on the younger generation of Jewish Americans. Many Jewish youth, whether through involvement in Jewish organizations or social media exposure, engage in discussions about the conflict. These conversations can be informative and educational but also emotionally charged.

We should all be proud to be Jewish, but during these turbulent times, we must also be careful and vigilant. While there have been no signs of antisemitism in our local community, we never know when hatred may rear its ugly head. But rest assured that the PBJC will do everything in our power to protect our Jewish community and reject any hatred towards Jews.

I pledge to you that your lay leadership, clergy, and staff are in constant contact with town officials, law enforcement, and our public school system to protect our Jewish community from antisemitism and hate in our town and surrounding areas. Stay safe, be vigilant, and let's stick together!





Harvey Jaffe, *Hershey*, was the driving force behind *B'yachad*. He helped make our dream come alive by leading a vibrant community of learners who come together post their B'Nai Mitzvah! This is what Hershey had to say about it:

The success of our Hebrew High School, *B'yachad*, is dependent on the ability to not only learn about 'the ethics of our people,' but more importantly to build a community. When students trust and care about each other they feel safe to share their views and ideas in a classroom setting and a dialogue begins. The fear of being judged by one's peers dissipates, and discussions become lively and interactive. From the time of Hillel and Shammai, our tradition teaches that there was always room to examine, dissect and re-evaluate our laws. In fact, many believe that different perspectives are exactly the reason Judaism has survived for almost 6000 years. However, all our ancestors agreed on the importance of a holy community a '*kehilah kedusha*,' where everyone is respected, and every opinion is valued.

The reason I come back to B'yachad cannot be put into words. I cannot describe how much fun it is; it is something that needs to be experienced to understand. Funds were collected initially after his untimely passing, however, his legacy still lives on. Eliot was the United Synagogue Youth (USY) leader at Congregation Beth Shalom in Pompton Lakes. He passed away at the age of thirty-one. A scholarship fund was established by Congregation Beth Shalom in Eliot's memory. The goal of the fund is to provide financial aid to youth participating in Jewish activities, such as Kadima, USY, Camp Ramah, Israel trips, and other Jewish educational activities. Congregation Beth Shalom transferred the fund to Pine Brook Jewish Center, where it will continue to perpetuate Eliot's memory. May his memory be a blessing to your youth.

Eliot's brothers, Harvey and Bill, are current members of Pine Brook Jewish Center. Upon learning of the sudden and tragic loss of Aaron Melzer, a Pine Brook Jewish Center Religious School student, Congregation Beth Shalom honored the Melzer family by rededicating the fund as the Eliot Sakolsky Aaron Melzer Scholarship Fund. Aaron was the son of Margo and Jason Melzer, and the older brother of triplets, Anna, Brielle, and Brian. Aaron was a Religious School Student at Pine Brook Jewish Center, beginning at the age of two in its Nursery School. Aaron was a kind, loving, thoughtful and empathetic young man who was looking forward to his Bar Mitzvah. It was Aaron's dream to travel to Israel, but he never did, as a result of his sudden passing at the age of eleven. The Melzer family shares the Sakolsky family's mission to offer financial assistance to Religious School students so that they can further their Jewish studies at home and abroad.

In memory of Eliot Sakolsky and Aaron Melzer, this fund will continue to financially assist Jewish youth to obtain a meaningful Jewish education and to fulfill their own individual dreams. The Community Outreach Committee began almost 10 years ago with a simple mission: to provide living necessities to those with a defined psychiatric illness who are clients of the Mental Health Association of Essex and Morris Counties. This committee continues to thrive under the leadership of a Board of Directors comprised of dedicated young adults who receive guidance from Abby Edelman, Jamie Kideckel, and Ali Wise. The committee now provides resources for clothing of children living in shelters as well as supporting nourish.NJ.

Last year a second committee was formed - The Community Scholarship Committee of the Pine Brook Jewish Center. The mission of this committee is to provide scholarships to academically worthy students of Dover High School who have made a difference in their community. For the first year the committee, comprised of 21 members, provided one scholarship of \$2,400 and two scholarships each of \$400.

On **Saturday, November 18<sup>th</sup>**, immediately following Shabbat services, PBJC will host **Guy Leibovitz** for a special "Lunch and Learn" program during *Kiddush*. Guy is a tour guide and Israeli educator. He has been a licensed tour guide in the land of Israel since the year 2000. As a child his family moved to the desert city of Eilat. After he graduated high school, he joined the IDF in one of their special forces' units. After his service, he travelled the world and then returned to Tel-Aviv University to study software engineering, but soon realized that this was not his passion. His love of Israel and its history was something he wanted to share with others.

Today, Guy is a tour guide licensed by the Israeli Tourism Office, who is an expert in both the history and archaeology of Israel. He has been chosen by the Israeli government to host some of its most important and influential visitors, including the world's largest donors to Birthright, dignitaries from all over the world, and celebrity guests including, most recently, Brett Favre. He also travels the United States educating both Jews and non-Jews on Israel. He is married, has two beautiful kids, and lives in Kibbutz Harel, located between Jerusalem and Tel Aviv, not far from the place where David killed Goliath.

Guy will talk to us about the attack of October 7 and how Hamas managed to execute it against what is one of the most advanced and formidable military powerhouses, with one of the most capable and sophisticated intelligence operations in the world. He will additionally speak about: Hamas' history; prior peace efforts and Hamas' role in undermining these efforts; Hamas and their influence on the new generation of Palestinians and how that might impact any peace efforts moving forward; Hamas' objectives with the attack; the importance of public opinion, and how Hamas has succeeded in influencing the minds of millions around the world; the status of the war in Gaza...what's going well, and surprises along the way; and how you can help.


