CANTOR'S MESSAGE

CANTOR MENACHEM TOREN

Meaningless! Meaningless!" says the Teacher.
"Utterly meaningless!
Everything is meaningless."

What do people gain from all their labors at which they toil under the sun?

Generations come and generations go, but the earth remains forever.

The sun rises and the sun sets, and hurries back to where it rises.

The wind blows to the south and turns to the north; round and round it goes, ever returning on its course.

All streams flow into the sea, yet the sea is never full.

To the place the streams come from, there they return again.

All things are wearisome, more than one can say. The eye never has enough of seeing, nor the ear its fill of hearing.

What has been will be again, what has been done will be done again; there is nothing new under the sun.

Greetings My Dear Friends,

If what you saw above is not familiar, it comes from King Salomon, the son of King David (book of Ecclesiastes, beginning of chapter one).

If there is one book that I would recommend as the best possible reading (other than the complete Bible, of course), it would be the Book of Ecclesiastes (and technically it's a scroll). It is a very short reading in comparison to anything modern, and can be finished in less than 45 minutes, when read slowly.

This scroll is so special because what you read is the actual essence of the wisdom Salomon collected all his life. He was known to be the wisest, wealthiest and had 1,000 wives (so he definitely knew a lot about relationships...), and in his old age, he tells us what's important in life and what is vain. At the beginning, one may notice some heresy, but this is reversed later. *Kohelet* (Ecclesiastes) later shows us how ultimately, it is best to revere God, believe in God and know that all that happens, should happen. However, vanity is not all bad! (Surprised? Read the scroll!)

CANTOR'S MESSAGE

CONTINUED

On Shabbat Chol <u>Hamoed</u> (Shabbat when it is not the beginning of a holiday) we read this scroll. Not all Jews read it on Sukkot, it is mostly the Ashkenazim and The Yemenite.

There are several reasons why it is read for this holiday; the two primary ones are:

- 1. The dedication of the first Temple by King Salomon was on these days of Sukkot.
- 2. At that time of the year, right after the harvest, people felt so full of themselves, and were so satisfied with what they had. If they did well, they may have wanted more and more. Reading the wise words of Kohelet can help put us in perspective what's important and what is not so important. It can teach us that all materialistic things should be nothing but tools to achieve a higher purpose. Further, if we have those "good and beautiful materialistic things" we should embrace them and enjoy them, but never forget where they came from, or that they can always go away.

Matthew Perry wrote in his new autobiography, "Julia Roberts was my girlfriend, I made \$1,000,000 a week, I had the view of the entire Los Angeles from my house, but I was miserable."

There are twelve very short chapters in the scroll. We read one chapter every year. However, I suggest that you read it all, and it is very easy. Sit on the couch, take your laptop or tablet, and type in the search engine "Ecclesiastes for reading." Or you can go directly to this link: https://www.biblestudytools.com/ecclesiastes/.

Pour a drink, cut a sweet fruit, clear out other thoughts, and start reading...you will thank me later.

Shana Tova Umetukah! Now, with Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur behind us, the fall season brings with it a series of joyous and spiritually meaningful festivals. Two of the most prominent among them are Sukkot and Simhat Torah. These festivals not only hold deep religious significance but also emphasize the importance of community and unity among the Jewish people.

Sukkot, often referred to as the Feast of Tabernacles, is a week-long festival following the High Holy Days. It is a time when Jewish families and communities come together to commemorate the biblical story of the Israelites' journey through the desert and their reliance on divine providence. At the heart of Sukkot is the construction of a sukkah, a temporary hut or booth made of natural materials like branches and leaves where families gather to eat their meals, pray, and even sleep, as a symbol of the temporariness of life and the protection provided by G-d during challenging times. This cyclical nature of the Torah readings symbolizes the eternal and unbroken connection between the Jewish people and their sacred texts. This year, PBJC will be hosting a special Simhat Torah service in conjunction with the Religious School on Sunday morning, October 8th at 9:00am. All are invited to attend our Simhat Torah celebration.

The importance of community during *Sukkot* and *Simhat Torah* extends beyond the rituals and festivities. These festivals also remind Jewish people of their responsibility to support and uplift one another. In today's fast-paced and often disconnected world, the emphasis on community during *Sukkot* and *Simhat Torah* serves as a valuable lesson for people of all backgrounds. It reminds us that in times of joy and hardship, the support and love of our communities are essential. Just as the *sukkah* offers shelter and the Torah offers guidance, our communities provide a sense of belonging and strength.

Speaking of community, please stay tuned to upcoming events through the Candlestick, our weekly emails, and viewing the calendar on the PBJC website as our committees are working hard in putting together a slate of activities. Our PBJC Membership Welcome Brunch is scheduled for Sunday, October 15th at 10:00 AM. Please come in and socialize with old friends and even make some new friends while eating your bagel and lox. 
Appeal #1: Kol Nidre Appeal - \$100,000

I would like to welcome our new families into our community! We now have 37 students enrolled in our primary (K-2) program, and 13 children in our Challah Day Program; **these children are our future, BRUCHIM HABAIM!** Please do not hesitate to contact me if you are interested in enrolling your child in any of our programs!

You are all aware that *Tefillah*, prayer, is a core element of our curriculum. We *daven*, pray together, and reinforce what the students' study in the classroom. We end our Sunday sessions with *Havdallah*, a service that separates Shabbat from the hustle and bustle of our routine everyday activities. We use this opportunity to wish each other "*Shavuah Tov*", a greeting for a good week ahead. To enhance our program, we are bringing in different melodies and encouraging our students to pursue their own spiritual journey.

We welcome parental input and participation as you are the essential partners in the process of Jewish education. We encourage you to discuss what your child learned in school and consider adding more Jewish customs and practices to your normal routine. The fear of being judged by one's peers dissipates, and discussions become lively and interactive. From the time of Hillel and Shammai, our tradition teaches that there was always room to examine, dissect and re-evaluate our laws. In fact, many believe that different perspectives are exactly the reason Judaism has survived for almost 6000 years. However, all our ancestors agreed on the importance of a holy community a '*kehilah kedusha*,' where everyone is respected, and every opinion is valued.

Eliot was the United Synagogue Youth (USY) leader at Congregation Beth Shalom in Pompton Lakes. He passed away at the age of thirty-one. A scholarship fund was established by Congregation Beth Shalom in Eliot's memory. The goal of the fund is to provide financial aid to youth participating in Jewish activities, such as Kadima, USY, Camp Ramah, Israel trips, and other Jewish educational activities. Congregation Beth Shalom transferred the fund to Pine Brook Jewish Center, where it will continue to perpetuate Eliot's memory. May his memory be a blessing to your youth.

Eliot's brothers, Harvey and Bill, are current members of Pine Brook Jewish Center. Upon learning of the sudden and tragic loss of Aaron Melzer, a Pine Brook Jewish Center Religious School student, Congregation Beth Shalom honored the Melzer family by rededicating the fund as the Eliot Sakolsky Aaron Melzer Scholarship Fund. Aaron was the son of Margo and Jason Melzer, and the older brother of triplets, Anna, Brielle, and Brian. 
