#### **Chanukah Miracles Hold Out Lessons for Challenging Times**

This is an incredibly challenging time for our Jewish community worldwide. A multi-front battle rages in Israel in the wake of one of the most horrific pogroms inflicted on our people since the Shoah. At the same time, Jews across the world face a multi-front war of antisemitism, under the guise of anti-Zionism (and often a bit more blatant), occurring on college campuses and even on the streets.

This worries us because this seems like an old and dangerous story retelling itself. But rather than reading it in a Jewish history book or in our tradition's ancient texts, we see it first-hand in news stories or even through personal experience.

The relative security we have enjoyed during the post-Holocaust decades, particularly in America, has been called into question. For many, this may elicit feelings of vulnerability and fear for the future.

We must acknowledge these complex feelings and understand that the comfort and camaraderie of Jewish community is crucial during these tenuous times. We must ask ourselves how we can be more involved in our local synagogue where our peers understand what we are going through as we confront these shared challenges. We must also acknowledge that we are a people with a long history and we have been here before.

In fact, most of our holidays are celebrations of perseverance; of our people overcoming existential challenges and miraculously defeating whatever we faced with great triumph. Indeed, during the Passover Seder we recite: "-in every generation – - some enemy has risen up to destroy us – That – but G-d saves us from their hands..."

This month we celebrate the joyous holiday of Chanukah, the Festival of Lights. It is actually a

celebration of two miracles that occurred more than 2,000 years ago. The first miracle is a great military victory over a dangerous army that sought to destroy our people. The second miracle is that of the menorah, which had just a little bit of oil. It was running on fumes but it still burned bright in the face of depletion and vast darkness.

The symbolism of this holiday and its lessons of faith and perseverance are quite relevant to our current times. They can bring a sense of hope and some security in the face of all we confront today.

The Maccabees had nowhere near the military capabilities of the IDF (Israel Defense Forces) but they still defeated an incredibly powerful foe. The development of Israel's modern fighting force in less than a century is a miracle in itself, and we can have faith that our foes will be defeated on the battlefield as they always have been.

But the second miracle, that of finding the light of faith in dark times, is just as important for our survival. As a community, it feels as if we are being worn down by constant confrontation with hatred and malice, and it seems that our tanks of faith and optimism are nearly empty. However, we all possess – deep down – the strength and fortitude to not only persevere, but to shine as brightly as we do.

We must appreciate that the candles of the menorah are never alone. Even on the first night two candles shine brightly. So many people of goodwill and good conscience are standing together, shoulder to shoulder, in this fight against darkness.

It has been so encouraging these past many weeks receiving phone calls and gestures of support from our neighbors. Seeing Israeli flags on Maple Avenue in

Rockville Centre has given me a sense of hope in the awareness that we are not alone.

We know we have always had enemies (who have always been defeated), but perhaps the miracle this Chanukah is appreciating the friends and allies we have, who take on significant risk to stand up for what is right. A powerful symbol of this holiday is that eight little candles can dispel the darkness of an entire room. Light radiates out exponentially.

May this holiday season reinforce our faith that light has always overcome darkness and always will. We have seen this all throughout our history. May we have faith in the power of the Israeli military to keep us safe with G-d's help. And may we have faith in the power of our light, and the light of our neighbors, to dispel the darkness we see all around us. There is a popular slogan in Israel that has been the battle cry during this current fight – *yachad ne'natzeach – together* we will prevail.

A happy Chanukah to all and may our lights and those around us continue to shine bright! *Am Yisrael Chai!* The Jewish people will always persevere!

The other day I saw a post on Facebook that offered a new perspective on the famous "First they came..." poem by Martin Niemöler that immediately grabbed me. We need more non-Jews to stand up to the hate. More non-Jews to not fall for the propaganda that leads to justification of violence against Jews.

At the end of "The Lorax," after almost everything is ruined, the Lorax flies away leaving a pile of rocks that spells out "UNLESS". The storyteller realizes that it means unless we start to care.

He then gives the boy he is telling the story to a seed to replant the great forest that was destroyed and says "Unless someone like you cares an awful lot, nothing is going to get better. It's not." It is time for our non-Jewish neighbors to takes the seeds and end antisemitism.



# Theater and Religion — Our Most Basic Instincts

Last August, more than 20 members of CBS-BD met up on Broadway to attend Jewish comedian Alex Edelman's hit Broadway show "Just For Us." The story is about Alex's experience attending a meeting of white nationalists.

We laughed, we cried, we noshed. It was a delicious evening in every way and a joy for me to organize an outing merging the two worlds I inhabit as a cantor and theater producer; a 'Produsinger,' if you will!

I feel confident this was the first CBS-BD Broadway event of many to come. For me, my two callings go together like bagels and a schmear and I'm surprised there aren't more of us out there. After all, what has been the most basic impulses of humanity since the beginning of time? Theater and Religion.

We are wired to imagine, write, and share stories in community, and also to experience our lives in connection to a greater and unimaginable divine force. In many ways, theater can be a religious experience and religious rituals in turn have many aspects that are built on the same pillars of theater.

I think it is no accident that we call a storyboard in television writing the "Bible" and that we keep a ghost light shining in all dark theaters the same way we keep an eternal flame in our synagogues high above the ark. One time, at a different temple, I was tasked with changing out the battery of a then-flickering eternal flame and it felt like a scene in a comedy…but I digress.

On stage, the work I'm most drawn to perform and produce is the kind that stirs humor, thought, and conversation. Another way to say it – and I wouldn't describe it like this unless I was among fellow yids – is work that inspires midrash!

The first show I ever produced was, ironically, "A Christmas Carol." It was a London transplant to New York City and its religion was Dickens.

My next project coming up this spring is a new musical called "Suffs." It tells the story of the impassioned suffragists – "Suffs" as they called themselves. They literally risked their lives to challenge the status quo and fought for the 19th Amendment which granted women the right to vote. (Let's all go!)

It's not a "Jewish" show per se, but...really, it is. In fact, the playbill quotes Pirkei Avot: "You are not obligated to complete the work, but neither are you free to abandon it." In the meantime, two shows currently on Broadway right now that I can't recommend enough are "Harmony" and "A Prayer for the French Republic." Please look them up because I'm running out of room here!

## **Vigilant and Secure at CBS-BD**



Rockville Centre Police Sgt. Peter Pellegrino conducted a timely presentation and interactive discussion on situation awareness and security for CBS-BD members Thursday, November 2. Sergeant Pellegrino is a trainer with the village police force. He assured the group that our building has good security in place and made note of the use of the electronic key fobs members carry for access. Having a security guard during services is another plus. He recommended a second security guard to patrol the grounds as this is where problems start.

The Rockville Centre police, for their part, patrol around the building during the week and on Shabbat. They also sometimes leave an empty patrol car in the parking lot as a deterrent.

Sergeant Pellegrino also discussed how to respond in an active shooter scenario – when to "run, hide, fight." Members should know the nearest exit to any room in our building in case an emergency exit is required. Once safe they should call or text 911. When police arrive cooperate with them so they can pin down the intruder.

There were several takeaways from Sergeant Pellegrino's presentation we can adopt: creating a crisis response plan to manage emergencies, including emails and texts to members; assuring members are aware of nearest building exits, and having the
