The Gerer Rebbe began class by asking his students about a classmate who wasn't there that day. "How's Moshe Chaim doing?" The students didn't know. "What?" asked the Rebbe. "You don't know? You pray under the same roof. You study together. How can you tell me you don't know how Moshe Chaim is, whether he needs help or advice or comforting? How can that be?"

If the Gerer Rebbe (the first) were a contemporary rabbi the story would have no meaning. Today, unless we are friendly with someone in our congregation, the odds of us knowing if she or he is ill, or in need of help, are very slim. Of course, we would willingly help if asked, as evident by how quickly TBA volunteers sign up to help through our *Lotsa Helping Hands* group. However, the reality is that we are meaningfully involved in the life of only a relatively small group of people. But when we think about the Golden Age of the Jewish communities at the time of the Gerer Rebbe, almost 200 years ago, we tend to assume that they were all involved in each other's lives.

And here is the big problem. If even at the time when all Jews belonged to the synagogue and attended Services every Shabbat (most men daily), it was still easy for members of the community to be overlooked, what should we expect today when our congregants rarely pray together or learn together?

A synagogue that describes itself as "one big family" is either a true miracle, or simply overstretches the euphemism. Hundreds of families cannot form one big family. But ten families can live in a way that genuinely feels and acts like an extended one. This is the idea behind a *havurah*. Rabbi Harold Schulweis, a pillar of the Conservative Jewish Movement, successfully established *havurot* in his synagogue many years ago. He did it when he realized that the primary task on the agenda of the synagogue is not rituals and theology, but what he called "the humanization and personalization of the temple". To experience true belonging is an imperative prerequisite for the cultivation of religious and moral sensibilities.

At TBA we talk a lot about the importance of tearing down the boundaries between Jews and synagogues. We work hard to make it easy for people to **join** our Temple; now we are going to work even harder to help them to **belong**. The formation of *havurot* is an important step to achieve this goal. A *havurah* is a small group of Temple members who come together to socialize, to learn and enjoy Jewish living with their families. They celebrate Jewish Holidays together, eat together, study together, and worship together. For many, the *havurah* really turns into an extended family. The beauty of the *havurah* is that it offers the synagogue member a community small enough to enable personal relationships to develop, and to express their Jewishness their own way.

I believe that when the *havurah* endeavor with initiative works, our synagogue itself will gradually be transformed into a "*Havurah* of *Havurot*", a Jewish assembly in which *havurot* meet for worship, study and celebration, not as isolated men and women.

When the Gerer Rebbe asked about Moshe Chaim, not everyone at the temple knew how he was doing. But rest assured that members of his *havurah* were taking care of all his needs, like extended families do.

## **Temple Beth Am Book Club Selections 2014-2015**

**November 3**: **JOY COMES IN THE MORNING** – Jonathan Rosen - Deborah Green is a woman of passionate contradictions--a rabbi who craves goodness and surety while wrestling with her own desires and with the sorrow and pain she sees around her. Her life changes when she visits the hospital room of Henry Friedman, an older man who has attempted suicide. His parents were murdered in the Holocaust when he was a child, and all his life he's struggled with difficult questions. Deborah's encounter with Henry and his family draws her into a world of tragedy, frailty, love, and, finally, hope. [Paperback: 400 pages]

January 5: MY 15 GRANDMOTHERS – Genie Milgrom – The author takes the reader through an exciting maze of intrigue, where literally every stone that is turned yields a new twist in the author's personal journey. Having been brought up in a Roman Catholic family in Cuba and descending from Spanish ancestry did not ensure that her life would be lived within that realm. In response to strong feelings and an affinity towards Judaism, her search for her family's past took on a deeper significance as she researched her maternal lineage and discovered and documented her Pre-Inquisition Spanish roots to Fifteenth Century Spain and Portugal where they lived first as Jews, then as Crypto Jews and finally as Roman Catholics. She was able to unravel the web of lies and deceit that her family had spun in order to survive the Spanish Inquisition. They lived with one foot in each world as they converted to Catholicism openly while secretly practicing their own religion underground. [Paperback: 164 pages]

March 2: THE MUSEUM OF EXTRAORDINARY THINGS – Alice Hoffman - the story of an electric and impassioned love between two vastly different souls in New York during the volatile first decades of the twentieth century. Coralie Sardie is the daughter of the sinister impresario behind The Museum of Extraordinary Things, a Coney Island boardwalk freak show that thrills the masses. Coralie appears as the Mermaid in her father's "museum". One night Coralie stumbles upon a striking young man taking pictures of moonlit trees in the woods off the Hudson River. The dashing photographer is Eddie Cohen, a Russian immigrant who has run away from his father's Lower East Side Orthodox community and his job as a tailor's apprentice. When Eddie photographs the devastation on the streets of New York following the infamous Triangle Shirtwaist Factory fire, he becomes embroiled in the suspicious mystery behind a young woman's disappearance and ignites the heart of Coralie. [Hardcover: 384 pages]

April 27: WONDER OF WONDERS: A CULTURAL HISTORY OF FIDDLER ON THE ROOF — Alisa Solomon - An eye-opening history of the Broadway musical that changed the world. In the half-century since its premiere, *Fiddler on the Roof* has had an astonishing global impact. Award-winning drama critic, Alisa Solomon, traces how and why the story of Tevye the milkman, the creation of the great Yiddish writer Sholem-Aleichem, was reborn as blockbuster entertainment and a cultural touchstone. It is a story of the theater, following Tevye from his humble appearance on the New York Yiddish stage, through his adoption by leftist dramatists as a symbol of oppression, to his Broadway debut in one of the last big book musicals, and his ultimate destination—a major Hollywood picture. Solomon reveals how the show spoke to the deepest conflicts and desires of its time: the fraying of tradition, generational tension, the loss of roots. Audiences everywhere found in *Fiddler* immediate resonance and a usable past, whether in Warsaw, where it unlocked the taboo subject of Jewish history, or in Tokyo, where the producer asked how Americans could understand a story that is "so Japanese." [Hard cover: 448 pages]



Reservations for dinner before our Selichot program & Service are due by September 12<sup>th</sup>. Registration for free babysitting must be in by September 15<sup>th</sup>. **Tickets:** If you have renewed your Voluntary Financial Commitment for the 2014-2015 fiscal year (making you an "official" member), your tickets will be mailed to you shortly. As a benefit of your membership, you can purchase tickets for your immediate family at a discounted price of \$110 which includes Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur (\$60 if attending a single Service). #### Shalom!

Please remember our children's safety – <u>do NOT stop</u> by the Temple entrance to drop off your child, but rather drive to a parking spot, park, and walk your child into the Temple. Besides the safety issue – this is a really nice way to start your days! Every Sunday morning starts off with JAMTY Café providing bagel breakfasts for a nominal fee, which tastes great and also benefits our youth programming at TBA. The Café opens @ 9:00am and serves students until 9:25am, and parents throughout the morning. Classes run from 9:30am – 11:40am, when we all gather for prayer, song, and community at our rousing *Kehillah*, which concludes at noon. Parents are welcome to join us- we only ask that <u>no students are taken out of Kehillah early</u> as this disrupts the mood that we all work so hard to create- thanks! Sunday students are dismissed directly from the Sanctuary following *Kehillah* – first the younger ones are picked up at their seats, and then we dismiss the older students, ensuring that the safety of all is primary.

Tuesday Religious School classes start on September  $9^{th}$ . For those new student families, please note that we serve pizza and healthy snacks from 4:30pm - 4:50pm to give our students that extra bit of fuel they need to keep active and alert. Tuesday classes run from 5:00pm - 6:30pm, with students being picked up from the classrooms. Again, as on Sundays, we ask that you do not pick your children up early unless absolutely necessary (in which case please inform the Director or teacher ahead of time). Sunday classes start on September  $7^{th}$ , for  $K - 2^{nd}$  grade only, to give them a calmer first day.

Shalom Chai, our (no longer) new community Jewish High School will welcome students on September 9<sup>th</sup>, at 6:30pm. We welcome all Jewish teens attending 8<sup>th</sup> - 12<sup>th</sup> grades for both formal and informal education. Our program blends classroom learning, service learning (doing Social Action), and plenty of teen interaction. We are excited about this program and hope that you are, too. Please give me a call, drop me an email, or visit the Temple website if you would like more info on Shalom Chai. ## A Season for Life-Learning Skills...



How lucky we are that Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur fall at the beginning of our school year! As our children start fresh in their new grade or class, they relish in their new beginnings and feel the chance to start all over again. It is their opportunity to reflect on a New Year and a new beginning.

Rosh Hashanah combines both solemn and joyful elements. Another name for Rosh Hashanah is Yom Hadin, the Day of Judgment. This is a time when each of us is judged for both good and bad deeds done during the past year. We also celebrate the arrival of a new year and the blessings it will hopefully contain.

Yom Kippur, the day of Atonement, is the holiday that concludes the Days of Awe; a period of ten days that begins at Rosh Hashanah. This is a time for personal introspection and reflection of our behavior.

The book of Jonah is read on the afternoon of Yom Kippur. The story of Jonah includes themes of personal responsibility and repentance. The prophet Jonah after much reluctance goes to the city of Nineveh to tell the people of their impending destruction because of their sins and transgressions. After hearing Jonah's prophecy, the people repent and God forgives them.

The message of this story is empowering. Even small children learn that mistakes can be repaired; that there is always an opportunity to change and that they have this power to heal through forgiving others. How can we share this deep philosophical idea with our children? First we can ask our children, "What have you done wrong in the past"? "Say you're sorry to those you have hurt," and ask God to forgive you."

#### Modeling: The Best Way to Teach

Don't be afraid to share your own feelings with your children, too. By modeling t'shuvah, you're not only teaching them a lesson, you are deepening your own relationships. Let your children know when you feel sad or hurt and why. Say, "Mommy's feeling sad today because a friend at work said a mean thing about my project and that hurt my feelings." Knowing how you feel will help them understand how our actions affect others. Try to talk about feelings, happy or sad, angry or mad!

The beginning of the school year is a perfect time to talk about Rosh Hashanah and new beginnings. Things you can do as a family!

- Write down each of your family's wishes for a sweet year. Read these at the table on Rosh Hashanah.
- Commit, as a family, to follow the steps of t'shuvah by recognizing and saying sorry for wrong behavior, as well as making a vow to not do that again!
- Follow the customs for the New Year! Eat sweet foods as a symbol of our desire for a sweet year! Dip apple in honey for a sweet year!
- Attend children's High Holy Days Services so children have the opportunity to hear the shofar and prayers!
- Attend Tashlich Service at the beach on the afternoon of Rosh Hashanah, as we go to a body of water, say a prayer, and empty our pockets into the ocean to symbolically cast away our sins.
