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How are Halloween and the Jewish Wedding Ceremony Connected?

In the weeks leading to October 31st I'm often asked how appropriate it is for Jews to celebrate Halloween, considering its Pagan origin. There is still a debate among scholars about the genesis of this festival, yet many believe that it came from the Celtic festival of Samhain, which marks the end of the summer and the beginning of the winter, the darker part of the year. Samhain was seen as a time when the door to the Otherworld opened for the souls of the dead, and other beings such as fairies, to come into our world.

Regardless of the nature of the spirit's visit, whether friendly or harmful, this belief clearly goes against biblical law.

The Pagan origin of Halloween is for itself a reason for Jews not to participate in the celebrations. The Torah marks a clear theological, ethical and practical path for Jews to follow, and instructs us not to "walk in the paths" of others.

Another dilemma is the association of Halloween with witches and ghosts. Judaism has continuously opposed witchcraft or attempted communication with the dead since biblical times. Monotheism is the antithesis of magic. No hocus-pocus tricks can manipulate God to get unnatural results.

So if Judaism stands in such conflict with Halloween, why would my own children dress up and roam the streets with their friends collecting an insane amount of candy (that will magically disappear minutes after they go to bed)?

To answer that question, I turn to the Jewish wedding ceremony. No matter how traditional or liberal a Jewish couple is, the ceremony always concludes with the breaking of the glass. The rabbi often explains the custom as a way to remind us that happiness is never complete (either because of the loss of loved ones, or in more traditional settings, the destruction of the Temple). It is indeed a beautiful and meaningful tradition, only that the rabbi's explanation is historically inaccurate.

Smashing of glasses didn't begin with Judaism, and the reason behind it is closer to Halloween than to the Torah. In the Middle Ages people believed that demons attack us when we are less prepared, especially during happy occasions. Therefore, the smashing of glass was intended to trick the demons into believing that a catastrophe rather than a celebration was taking place. The demons would then leave the couple alone and do them no harm. In Germany, during the Middle Ages, the marriage glass was thrown against a special stone which was commonly embedded in the outside wall of the synagogue.

Given its etiology, should we abolish the ritual of breaking the glass? No rabbi of any denomination would dare to consider such a thing. It may have started with superstitions and Pagan ideas, but hundreds of years later it has evolved into something completely different. At the same token, it is undeniable that Halloween in its inception and first stages of evolution was offensive to Judaism. But the way it is celebrated in America these days is completely stripped of true belief in witchcraft and worshipping of the dead. If you are participating in Halloween activities, no need to worry about pagan beliefs, just remember to include a lesson on safety and the "wonderful" effects of consuming too much sugar during an evening of fun and mischief.

Silos. Great for farms and nuclear warheads. Not so good for organizations. And definitely not "Kulanu".

Silos are excellent tools for keeping things separate from each other. They can be actual – like a grain silo on a farm. Or they can be virtual. If you watched "The Newsroom" this season, you know about the Red Team – the group of reporters that was purposely kept in the dark about a potential breaking story so that they could critique it without preconceived notions. That's an example of a virtual silo. The problem is that we sometimes build virtual silos inadvertently. We create artificial or unnecessary divisions.

Why is that a bad thing? Well, since silos keep things out as well as in, they obstruct communication. And as we learned from Firesign Theatre, you can't be two places at once, so silos can be obstacles to participation. Case in point: here at Temple Beth Am, we've traditionally distinguished between Caring Community and Social Action. Why? It's true they serve different functions. Our Caring Community is dedicated to helping members of our TBA family who are ill, who need a ride to Temple or to a doctor's appointment, who are grieving a loss, or who are otherwise in need of a friendly hand. The Social Action Committee focuses on the larger community. Their activities include food collections, Family Promise, and helping non-TBA members access resources for themselves and their families. So the two groups have different missions, but they are both dedicated to helping people. If *you* have the desire to help others, though, wouldn't it be easier to have just *one* place to look to find volunteer opportunities? Of course! And the TBAers involved in Caring Community and Social Action agree with you. That's why they've started to work together to break out of their silos.

That's not the only silo we've inadvertently constructed, though. Let's look at the wonderful programs TBA offers for young children and their parents. Did you know that you can hear renowned professionals talk about a variety of childrening issues right here at TBA? This year we will be hosting Dr. Iris Kiner, Ginny Luther, and the Mental Health Specialists of the Palm Beaches. (Check our website for dates and details.) How about Kids' Shabbat with Mr. Brett, sponsored by PJ Library? It's a fabulous Friday Night Service created especially for children through grade 2. Did you think these programs are in the silo labeled "TBA Preschool"? Well, they're not! They're for everyone, yet many of our young families are missing out because they think these programs are only for our Preschool families.

Maybe we create silos because it feels easier to put things in categories. Then we can make quick decisions: *This is for me so I need to pay attention, or This is not for me so I can ignore it.* I completely understand that approach. Our lives are complicated so we look to simplify them. But then we miss out on personal opportunities. On an organizational level silos also cause us to miss opportunities for synergies, where the result of combining efforts is greater than those efforts could achieve individually. So to paraphrase Ronald Reagan, let's tear down these walls! That's what *Kulanu* is all about.

Speaking of *Kulanu*, here are some highlights of how TBA has been coming together in service to our congregation and community since the last Scribe:

- We had a wonderful Welcome and Welcome Back Open House on August 25. Literally dozens of TBA members and staff worked together to create a fun event. About 250 people attended. It was a great time to catch up with old friends and greet our newest members.
- The High Holy Days, from Selichot through Break-the-Fast, were beautiful, inspirational and spiritual. This year we waived babysitting fees and continued our Youth High Holy Day program for children grades K through 6 so that everyone, children and adults alike, could enjoy the holidays in a meaningful way. (Although many members helped make the holiday celebrations run smoothly, I MUST thank Debbie Baseman for working tirelessly for weeks to ensure that everything was perfect.)
- This year we also continued to offer free tickets to our Early Rosh Hashanah and Kol Nidre Services, as well as afternoon Yom Kippur Services. Because of this effort, more than 200 people from the larger Jewish community were able to celebrate the High Holy Days this year. We also saw lots of new faces at our Kids' High Holy Day Services.
- We welcomed all to our Services with a beautiful packet of materials to set the mood for the New Year.
- The 30th Anniversary Committee has begun to prepare a fitting celebration for this milestone. Look for flyers in this *Scribe* (pages 8 and 9) to find out how you can sponsor and participate in this once-in-a-lifetime event!

When Hal Baseman asked us recently if we would chair the Temple's Caring Community Committee, we told him we would be happy to do so. So what exactly does this committee do? The following are some thoughts that we spoke about at the Rosh Hashanah Service recently. We've had such a great response we thought we would share them in the *Scribe* also, so those of you who have not yet had the chance to volunteer will know how you can sign up, and why it is so important that we get as many of you involved as possible.

The goal of Caring Community is to provide the support necessary to our members who are in need of our assistance, specifically in the areas of providing meals or groceries, rides to synagogue & doctor's appointments, visits or calls to those who are sick or homebound, and attending shiva service.

You might be thinking I don't have time to do all of those things. And that's okay, most of us don't. What we are asking is that you choose at least one of these things that you chould do, and commit an hour or two – one meal, one ride, one phone call – whatever you can do.

There are people in this congregation that may not come to Service because they're not able to drive and don't have a ride. So, in the same way that our Temple is removing financial barriers, we must also remove the other barriers that may prevent someone from attending Service.

You've heard a lot recently about Kulanu, which means together. If we all work together, we can make sure that no one goes without a meal or groceries, misses Service just because they don't have a ride, or spent time in the hospital and would really have loved a visit or a call from a friend. But we can only help out when we know that help is needed. If you know someone that you think might be in need, please let us know.

One of our Temple members recently had a surgical procedure, and I'd like to share with you part of her response to those who helped out with meals: "I am beyond words to explain how grateful I am - you completely surprised me when you offered to set up the dinners for me as I never had a community in my life before who was so loving and caring - I am overwhelmed by the kindness and generosity."

What we hope to do is build a Temple-wide network of volunteers. In addition to Caring Community, there are many other ways to help through the Social Action Committee as well, including volunteering for the Food Pantry, helping host Family Promise families at Oceanview, tutoring, helping out in the Preschool, and more.

When there is a need, we'll email our volunteers, and you simply choose the opportunity that fits your schedule. We would love nothing more than to have each of our Temple members help in some way. We truly appreciate your support. What better way to show our "KULANU" spirit than helping those around us who need our help!



The Temple Beth Am Book Club is an informal group that meets four times during the season. We meet on Mondays at 10:30am at the Temple and usually go out for lunch afterwards. The schedule for this coming season is as follows:

November 4th: *The Golden Willow* by Harry Bernstein January 13th: *The Rabbi's Wife* by Shirley Schwartz March 10th: *The Last Jew* by Noah Gordon May 5th: *The Jerusalem Maiden* by Thalia Carner

The Golden Willow is the last book in a trilogy written by Harry Bernstein, starting when he was 94 years old. He wrote these books after his wife died as a tribute to her. It's a beautiful story of a 70 year romance and the story of how Harry came to write these 3 books. It is interesting as a biography and for the story itself.

The Rabbi's Wife by Shirley Schwartz has achieved magic by writing a work of true scholarship that is so readable. She helps us to see what has been for so long invisible – the unheralded role of the rebbitzen in making the American synagogue tick. She introduces us to unforgettable characters, and enables us to see the progress that women have made in this country over the last century. Most interestingly, she shows us marriages that were true partnerships in every sense of the word.

The Last Jew by Noah Gordon is thought provoking and interesting dealing with the Inquisition. It is basically a survival story of Yonah, the main character. Yonah was smart and talented. Equally important, his family background provided him with a sense of obligation to do his best, taking care of himself and those around him. As interesting as Yonah is, the individuals around him are also remarkable in that they are so human and are formed and reformed by the circumstances they find themselves in. Good historical fiction.

The Jerusalem Maiden by Thalia Carner is a coming of age novel exploring the role that religion, faith and family has on one girl's hopes and dreams for her own future. Esther struggles not only with what her family and culture expected but her own personal beliefs in God and how they could bring so much heartache as well as joy. The author's rich details subtly place the reader on the scene. This book is beautiful and will provide many opportunities for personal reflection.

RITUAL COMMITTEE JEWISH PRACTICES AND TRADITIONS EXPLORED AND EXPLAINED

In the last installment we discussed some basics of the Jewish calendar. This month's installment of the ritual education series addresses why we hold Shabbat Services and the practices of covering the eyes and bowing during Shabbat Services.

The reason that we celebrate Shabbat Services once per week stems from the fact that God created the world in six days and rested on the seventh. The reason Shabbat worship is Friday from sunset to Saturday at sunset is more secular than theological. The biblical basis for observing the Sabbath is found in Exodus 20:8 – 10: "Remember the Sabbath day and keep it holy. Six days shall you labor and do all your work, but the seventh day is a Sabbath day of the Lord, you shall do no work on it...And God rested on the seventh day..." In the Decalogue (Ten Commandments), which is reported in the Book of Deuteronomy (5:12-15) the Sabbath is referred to as a day of rest of servants as well as masters, and as a day commemorating the Israelites redemption from Egyptian bondage. In the Book of Exodus (31:16-17) it states, "And the children of Israel shall keep the Sabbath throughout the generations for a perpetual covenant...for in six days the Lord made the heaven and earth and on the seventh He ceased from work and rested.

Shabbat begins at sundown on Friday, yet the bible speaks of the seventh day and not the night. The reason for this is that in the Jewish calendar all "days" begin at nightfall of the evening before the actual day. The time of the cycle lasts on average for 24.5 hours. This is important as we begin the New Year. It has become custom to usher in Shabbat early. In fact, candles are traditionally lit eighteen minutes before sunset which is about forty minutes before nightfall. The number 18, which is a very important number for Jews, represents *Life!*

QUESTION OF THE MONTH: Why do we cover our eyes and bow during Services?

Most of the over fifty individual questions submitted by over two dozen congregants focused on the specific rituals we observe during the Shabbat Services. Specifically asked why do we cover our eyes during the Sh'ma and why do we bow during Services? The simple answer is that we cover our eyes so that the intensity of our Sh'ma experience is greater and we bow to show respect. Let us explore these practices in greater detail.

Why do we cover our eyes when we say the Sh'ma?

The Torah commands us to read three paragraphs of the Torah twice every day, once in the morning and once in the evening. These paragraphs are called Sh'ma - the beginning word of the first verse.

The most significant part of the Sh'ma is the first verse which reads *Hear Israel, the Lord is our God the Lord is one*. This proclamation affirms our belief in a single, all powerful, infinite God. It is the basic premise of Judaism. Because of its importance, we must be sure that we pay attention to the words and their meaning as we say them.

The Talmud tells us that Rabbi Yehudah Hanassi, who lived in the second century, would cover his eyes while he would recite the first verse of the Sh'ma to ensure that nothing around him would disturb his concentration. Since then, the practice has been adopted by all Jewish communities through the world.

In Judaism, preference is always given to the right side. Kabbalah explains that the right represents kindness while the left represents judgment. Because of this, we usually do Mitzvahs with our right hand. Therefore, when we cover our eyes while saying the Sh'ma, we cover our eyes with our right hand.

Why do we bow during Services?

The idea that body movement can express devotion to God appears in the Book of Psalms: "All my limbs shall say 'Who is like You, O Lord?" (35:10) In Midrash Tehillim, an 11th century exegetical text, the rabbis interpret "all my limbs" quite literally.

Bowing is a complex area of ritual practice. There are a number of various parts of the Service where one can bow and should bow. When to bow varies dependent upon the practices of the local community and the how to bow varies dependent upon the specific prayer and holiday involved. For example, during the High Holy Days there are specific physical bowing practices that represent the importance of these days.

During the course of the Shabbat Service, bowing occurs during the Amidah, the Avot (Blessing of Ancestors), and the Hoda'ah (Blessing of Thanksgiving). In addition, there may be additional times that the Hazzen (leader) or the Rabbi may bow for the congregation or as part of the Priestly practice or ritual.

Bowing implies deference and respect. Physically bending the knee and bowing is a visible way of showing reverence for something which is much greater than one's self. During the Shabbat Service, the bow occurs during the Bar'chu; with the word "Bar'chu" (by the Hazzen) or "Baruch" (by the congregation) we bow from the waist. With the word "Et" all rise from the bow to prepare to stand at attention for the word "Adonai". As Jews we stand straight at attention when reciting Gods name, "Adonai".

During the Torah Service, as we take the Torah from the Ark, we bow at the words "gadlu ladonai". In some congregations, as the Torah is carried around, congregants may bow from the waist as a sign of respect. During Aleinu when the word "vaanachnu" is said we stand erect, at the word "kor'im" bend at the knees, and at the word "umishtachavim" we bow deeply from the waist, remaining that way through the word "umodim" then rising up straight and tall.


