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FIRST NIGHT OF CHANUKAH IS THANKSGIVING EVE

Not all of you are old enough to remember the last time the first day of Chanukah coincided with Thanksgiving back in 1861. But even those of you who still remember the good old days, you couldn't really have eaten latkes with your turkey, since Thanksgiving had not been established until 1863. This year is our rare opportunity for a double celebration. Yes, it will happen again,

but not all of us will be in good enough shape to celebrate Chanukah and Thanksgiving together some 77,798 years from now.

Seventeen years ago, my predecessor at Temple Beth Am, Rabbi Phil Aronson, approached the clergy of the two churches across the road from us, Saint Peter Catholic Church and JupiterFirst Church, suggesting the idea of an interfaith service on the Wednesday before Thanksgiving. They liked it, and the service has been constantly growing in attendance and quality, as more than 1,000 people have come in the past few years.

When the clergy first met to plan the service they agreed on rotating the location and the preacher. Each year the service is hosted by one of the three congregations and the clergy take turns addressing the assembly. They also agreed that the prayers and readings throughout the service should not reflect any particular theology of religious practice. Expressing gratitude, after all, is a virtue that all of us hold in the highest regard, and that should be the general theme.

It all made perfect sense to me and I never thought that any of us would ever bend the rules, certainly not me – until this year. Chanukah, without a doubt, falls into the category of a particular religious practice. It has no place in an interfaith service, but again – who wants to wait 77,798 years until the next time? And to make things even better, this year, we at Temple Beth Am host the service.

I invited my friends and colleagues, Father Don and Dr. Johnson to discuss the service. When I asked them about starting it by lighting the Menorah together, they were as excited as I was.

On Wednesday, November 27th, for the first time in history, more than 1,000 people will be able to say: "A priest, a minister and a rabbi stood on the *bimah* of the synagogue on Thanksgiving eve, that happened to be also the first night of Chanukah..." and they will not be telling a joke. You should be one of these people.

BOOK CLUB

The Temple Beth Am Book Club is an informal group that meets four times during the season. We meet on Mondays at 10:30am at the Temple and usually go out for lunch afterwards. The schedule for this coming season is as follows:

November 4th: The Golden Willow by Harry Bernstein January 13th: The Rabbi's Wife by Shirley Schwartz

March 10th: The Last Jew by Noah Gordon May 5th: The Jerusalem Maiden by Thalia Carner

The Golden Willow is the last book in a trilogy written by Harry Bernstein, starting when he was 94 years old. He wrote these books after his wife died as a tribute to her. It's a beautiful story of a 70 year romance and the story of how Harry came to write these 3 books. It is interesting as a biography and for the story itself.

The Rabbi's Wife by Shirley Schwartz has achieved magic by writing a work of true scholarship that is so readable. She helps us to see what has been invisible for so long – the unheralded role of the rebbitzen in making the American synagogue tick. She introduces us to unforgettable characters, and enables us to see the progress that women have made in this country over the last century. Most interestingly, she shows us marriages that were true partnerships in every sense of the word.

The Last Jew by Noah Gordon is thought provoking and interesting dealing with the Inquisition. It is basically a survival story of Yonah, the main character. Yonah was smart and talented. Equally important, his family background provided him with a sense of obligation to do his best, taking care of himself and those around him. As interesting as Yonah is, the individuals around him are also remarkable in that they are so human and are formed and reformed by the circumstances they find themselves in. Good historical fiction.

The Jerusalem Maiden by Thalia Carner is a coming of age novel exploring the role that religion, faith and family has on one girl's hopes and dreams for her own future. Esther struggles not only with what her family and culture expected but her own personal beliefs in God and how they could bring so much heartache as well as joy. The author's rich details subtly place the reader on the scene. This book is beautiful and will provide many opportunities for personal reflection.

TEMPLE BETH AM FOOD PANTRY

What's for dinner? What restaurant are we going to on Saturday? Did you make a reservation? These questions or similar conversations occur daily among our members. We are also constantly aware, through the internet or publications of statistics, about hunger throughout the country and locally.

Many of us take in this information with a sense of almost disbelief that this condition can exist in an area and country where basics like adequate food seem to be a given. It is not unusual to take in these facts and proceed to the next page or task with nothing more than a tug at the heart and maybe a small sense of frustration about just taking in this knowledge and not doing anything to help improve these conditions.

Last year Rabbi Alon included in one of his sermons a moving talk about hunger and living on food stamps for a week. Our response was to form the **Temple Beth Am Food Pantry** as a mechanism to try to reduce hunger and it's indignities in our local area. It is hard to go to school or work and accomplish many basic tasks if you and your family are going hungry!

We discovered sources of food and suppliers and incorporated them into the Temple Beth Am network: Bakers, Organic Farmers, Egg Farmers, and the Palm Beach Food Bank became our regular year around food lifeline.

Our Pantry discovered a great need for food at the Jupiter Head Start program-where working families leave their young children so they can go to work. Often their income can't cover their basic necessities. Our pantry at this point has been able to provide various fresh and canned goods weekly to approximately 70 Head Start families. Our pantry also has been able to provide food and assistance to various Temple and community families that are experiencing difficulty. We believe that our effort is helping in the everyday ongoing fight against the terrible problem of HUNGER! Our assistance is even more important in these times as government funding for the Head Start program has been cut back and there is an effort to reduce the food stamp program. Think about how you would feel if you HAD to fast on a continuous basis.

The purpose of this communication is to inform every person of our Food Pantry and help all Temple members answer this question: What can I do to help in this continuing effort to reduce HUNGER? The answer is simple and straight forward - <u>Volunteer</u> (on a continuing schedule of your making) to:

- *Help in the delivery and distribution of food and other items.
- *Look for and try to develop additional sources of food and family items.
- *Continue to bring canned and other staple food and family items. These items can be dropped in the marked bin in the Temple lobby.

Your help in this continuing fight to reduce Hunger will benefit others and also make you feel GOOD!

RITUAL COMMITTEE JEWISH PRACTICES AND TRADITIONS EXPLORED AND EXPLAINED

There are three holidays that may not be familiar to all. They are Sukkot, Shemini Atzeret and Simchat Torah. Tishrei, the seventh month, has five traditional holidays: Rosh Hashanah, Yom Kippur, Sukkot, Shemini Atzeret and Simchat Torah; no other Jewish calendar month has as many.

SUKKOT

Sukkot or Feast of Tabernacles is the third of the three pilgrimage festivals. Sukkot means huts and refers to the temporary dwellings that the Israelites lived in when they were in the wilderness for forty years under God's protection. Sukkot also celebrates the autumn harvest or ingathering. The instructions for Sukkot are given in Leviticus 23:33-43 and Deuteronomy 16:13-17. The holiday commences on the fifteenth day of Tishrei and is celebrated for seven days. A key passage in Leviticus is the instruction that "...In huts you are to dwell for seven days, all citizens of Israel are to dwell in huts in order that future generations may know that in huts I had the Children of Israel stay when I brought them out of Egypt." In addition, the description of what would become the *Lulav* is presented. From Leviticus, "you are to take for yourselves the fruit of beautiful trees, branches of palms, and boughs of thick tree foliage and willows of the brook". In addition to dwelling in the "hut" the other mitzvah which pertains to Sukkot is the lulav and etrog. There are 4 elements involved and all must be present to properly fulfill it. The four elements are *etrog*, *lulav*, (palm branch), *hadas* (avot tree branch), *aravah* (willows of the brook). A *bracha* (blessing) is said on the four species everyday of Sukkot. The set of elements is called the *abra minium*. The best place to say the benedictions with the *abra minium* is in the sukkah. To say the benediction hold the *lulav* in the right hand with the spine facing you, face east and say:

Blessed are You, Lord our God, King of the Universe, who has sanctified us with His commandments and commanded us regarding taking the lulay.

Pick up the *etrog* in your left hand. Bring the *lulav* and *etrog* together—you've done the mitzvah! The custom is to wave the *arba minim* in all six directions—south, north, east, up, down and west. The waving is symbolic of Jewish unity and is one of the central themes of Sukkot.

SHEMINI ATZERET

The two days of the holiday of Shemini Atzeret/Simchat Torah constitute a major holiday. In Israel the holidays are celebrated as one day. Shemini Atzeret, meaning "the eighth day of assembly" is celebrated immediately following Sukkot. It is written: "On the eighth day you should hold a solemn gathering; you shall not work at your occupation" (Numbers 29:35). Shemini Atzeret marks the beginning of the rainy season following the harvest in Israel.

Before the start of the Musaf Amidah, the Rabbi or Chazan (Rabbi, Cantor or Congregational Leader) in traditional services announces aloud: "Mashiv haruach umorid hageshem" ("He causes the wind to blow and the rain to fall"). From this prayer forward, until the first day of Passover, those words are inserted into the second blessing of the Amidah. The prayer for rain, *Tefilat Geshem*, is the only ritual that is unique to Shemini Atzeret. Ashkenazi Jews recite the Memorial Prayer, *Yizkor*, on Shemini Atzeret.

A festive meal is eaten in the sukkah. The challah is dipped in salt. Until this day, on all the holidays of this month, the *challah* is traditionally dipped in honey; this is symbolic of our desire to secure a sweet verdict for the upcoming New Year. The judgment, however, was finalized on Hoshana Rabbah, the day before Shemini Atzeret, so there's no reason for the honey any more.

SIMCHAT TORAH

Simchat Torah meaning "Rejoicing with/of the Torah," is a celebration marking the conclusion of the annual cycle of public Torah readings, and the beginning of a new cycle. Simchat Torah is a component of the Biblical Jewish holiday of Shemini Atzeret ("Eighth Day of Assembly"), which follows immediately after the festival of Sukkot.

As part of the celebration, the Torah scrolls are taken from the Ark and carried or danced around the synagogue seven times. This *hakafot* is completed both on the eve and morning of Simchat Torah. The Torah service is the focal point of the Simchat Torah celebration. A Rabbi, Cantor or member of the congregation opens the Torah and reads the last section of the fifth and final book of the Torah, *D'varim* (Deuteronomy). A second person then opens another Torah scroll and reads the opening section of the first book of the Torah, *B'reishit* (Genesis). The selection from *D'varim* tells of the death and legacy of Moses, the prophet and leader of the Jewish people. The reading from *B'reishit*, the very first words of the Torah, recounts the story of God's creation of the world. This practice represents the cyclical nature of the relationship between the Jewish people and the reading of the Torah.

In many synagogues on Simchat Torah, each member of the congregation is called to the Torah for an *aliyah*, or going up, which refers to the honor of ascending the *bimah* to recite the blessing before and after the Torah is read. Other synagogues may call all children who have not yet reached the age of bar or bat mitzvah to the Torah. Before the entire congregation, with a *tallit* spread above their heads, the children receive a special blessing from the Rabbi. In Reform synagogues, Simchat Torah also is a time when children just entering religious school are blessed. This custom is called consecration.

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
