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A few days after Maya's Bat Mitzvah someone made a comment about the futile nature of events like that. "Months of planning, coordinating, hard work by so many, and then: poof! It is all over." In a way it is true. I went into the Temple the next day to get something I had forgotten, and except for the empty tent outside there was no evidence of the previous day's celebration. The sanctuary was clean and ready for the following Shabbat and the Social Hall was restored to its original setup. However, the physical emptiness was hardly a reflection of our hearts. Our perspective of life, family, friendship and community, has forever changed.

The famous Israeli author, Amos Oz, wrote in one of his essays that "the nature of all the dreams in the world is that they are wonderful, perfect, and spectacular just as long as they remain a dream, a vision, a fantasy. A dream-come-true has become somewhat worn, somewhat shabby and it may also have become somewhat of a disappointment." In our personal and professional lives we lived through endless examples that proved Oz's observation right. But the Shabbat of Maya's Bat Mitzvah was the exact opposite. While we never had a specific vision for that day, all we wanted was for it to feel Jewish and be spiritual and fun. We were blessed to have all the above, and also so much more. And this "more" was not going away in 5 hours or 5 years - it will stay with us forever.

What is this "more"?

First is the magical mixture of fear and happiness when realizing that your daughter has really crossed the threshold into adulthood. At some point, the Reform Movement tried to do away with B'nei Mitzvah and replace them with Confirmation at the age of 16. It didn't last and we went back to our ancient tradition that brilliantly understood the need for a rite of passage at the age of 13. Not only do our children need it, but we, parents, need it as well. Our children's B'nei Mitzvah mark our own new position on the generational ladder as a new generation is climbing up, and ultimately will take our place. We are really happy for them, yet at the same time a bit anxious. And here comes the other brilliant insight of Judaism: we don't face anything alone. We have our community to share with us at all stages of life and as a result our happiness is elevated even higher (and in times of need our sadness assuaged).

Schadenfreude, delight in another person's misfortune, is a German word that entered the English language. But a word that describes happiness in another's good fortune does not exist. One can speculate on the meaning of it, but what we saw during Maya's Bat Mitzvah was hundreds of people who were happy for us and with us. There isn't a better feeling than that. Having so many of you come together, pray, sing, dance and celebrate with us, made us feel infinite love and happiness. You, our wonderful community, truly made our *simcha* just that – an amazingly joyful Jewish celebration that we will cherish for life.

When we have written before that "It takes a Village to Raise a Child," and TBA is our village, in hind sight we should have used the word *Shtetl* instead. We had the full experience of the *shtetl*, the ultimate Jewish community. We are humbled by and grateful for our community's support: it has been incredible in the planning and executing stages. So many have stepped up and offered help with anything from catering, through Town permits, to rolling napkins and so much more. We honestly couldn't have done it without you. Thank you to all who have been with us in body and in spirit, and thank you for all the cards, the emails, the gifts, the well wishes and the love. From our home to yours, we wish such blessings on each one of you.

Board Update

The Board, Rabbi, staff, and leadership are working on the Temple's Strategic Plan. After getting input from congregants via focus groups, town hall meetings, and other suggestions, they distilled our core purpose or mission to this concise statement: *Making Judaism Accessible... so future generations can kvell about their Jewish grandchildren*.

In other words, our purpose is the perpetuation of our tradition and culture. What this means to me is that Judaism will not dim on our watch. More importantly, we will make it easier for our children and grandchildren to keep Judaism from dimming on their watch. This is about making the lives of our children easier. Isn't that what life is all about, what we strive to do? Who can argue such a purpose? Now comes the hard part. How can we achieve this objective? To do this we need to know what the principles are that define us as a congregation and a community. Synagogues all have common principles and objectives. By definition these include being a house of worship, providing education, and a place for celebrating holidays and social gathering. But what else is there about us that defines us beyond the ordinary?

With the help of **Rabbi Alon**, Board VP **Brian Cohn** and his team took the initiative to organize congregational input over the past few years into five concise principles which are important to us and essential for meeting our core objective. These can be listed as the **Temple Beth Am Values: The principles that differentiate Temple Beth Am:**

- **Kulanu**, *Together*. We nurture an engaged Jewish community whose members care for each other, care for the Jewish people and Israel, and gladly invest their time, money and passion.
- Chesed, *Kindness*. How we treat all.
- **Tikkun Olam,** *Social Responsibility*. Accepting our need to repair the world around us through social action and acts of tzedakah.
- Acceptance, We accept all. Our community includes those born into Judaism and those who chose Judaism, the young and the old, families considered traditional and interfaith, those who are single and those who are married, those who are GLBT—all Jews and those who love them. We welcome and serve without exception.
- **Giving Voice,** *We express our values*. We are responsible and privileged to communicate these values to all. We respect this honor. We empower all to communicate these values. Temple Beth Am will be known by these values.

In August, the Board, Rabbi, senior staff, and some key volunteers met to prioritize goal objectives, define strategies, and work on planning and implementing strategic objectives. Teams were formed to address *Volunteerism, Connectedness, Bar/Bat Mitzvah experience, Ritual,* and *Facility* goal strategies. At Board meetings we will spend significant time focusing on the plan. We encourage congregants to attend meetings and get more involved. If you want to get more involved, let us know.

HIGH HOLY DAYS 2013





RITUAL COMMITTEE JEWISH PRACTICES AND TRADITIONS EXPLORED AND EXPLAINED

Shalom and welcome to a new series of articles that will be featured in the *Scribe* each month written by the Ritual Committee working with the Rabbi to educate the congregation on the various practices and traditions of our faith. We understand that there are many who want to learn more about the Service and how to celebrate the various holidays and lifecycle events. We aim to provide this in the spirit of KULANU, a warm and welcoming congregation.

Each article will contain various sections. The first area is a description of a particular component of the weekly Friday Night Service. For example, this might include the components of the Service, detail information on one or more of the prayers, etc. The second area will explore specific practices associated with a holiday that falls within the month of publication or in the alternative a lifecycle practice. The third component will be the answer to the question of the month. Every month there will be a question of the month.

So let's get right into this and what better way to start than at the New Year!

The Jewish calendar: NEW YEAR!!

The Jewish calendar is based on three astronomical phenomena: the rotation of the Earth about its axis (a day); the revolution of the moon about the Earth (a month); and the revolution of the Earth about the sun (a year). These three phenomena are independent of each other, so there is no direct correlation between them. On average, the moon revolves around the Earth in about $29\frac{1}{2}$ days. The Earth revolves around the sun in about $365\frac{1}{4}$ days, that is, about 12.4 lunar months.

The Jewish calendar, however, coordinates all three of these astronomical phenomena. Months are either 29 or 30 days, corresponding to the 29½-day lunar cycle. Years are either 12 or 13 months, corresponding to the 12.4 month solar cycle.

The lunar month on the Jewish calendar begins when the first sliver of moon becomes visible after the dark of the moon. The problem with strictly lunar calendars is that there are approximately 12.4 lunar months in every solar year, so a 12-month lunar calendar is about 11 days shorter than a solar year and a 13-month lunar is about 19 days longer than a solar year. The months drift around the seasons on such a calendar; on a 12-month lunar calendar, the month of Nissan, which is supposed to occur in the spring, would occur 11 days earlier in the season each year, eventually occurring in the winter, the fall, the summer, and then the spring again. On a 13-month lunar calendar, the same thing would happen in the other direction, and faster.

To compensate for this drift, the Jewish calendar uses a 12-month lunar calendar with an extra month occasionally added. The month of Nissan occurs 11 days earlier each year for two or three years, and then jumps forward 30 days, balancing out the drift. A year with 13 months is referred to in Hebrew as Shanah Me'uberet literally: a pregnant year. In the fourth century, Hillel II established a fixed calendar based on mathematical and astronomical calculations. This calendar, still in use, standardized the length of months and the addition of months over the course of a 19 year cycle, so that the lunar calendar realigns with the solar years. Adar I is added in the 3rd, 6th, 8th, 11th, 14th, 17th and 19th years of the cycle. The current cycle began in Jewish year 5758 (the year that began October 2, 1997).

The "first month" of the Jewish calendar is the month of Nissan, in the spring, when Passover occurs. However, the Jewish New Year begins in Tishri, the seventh month, and that is when the year number is increased. This concept of different starting points for a year is not as strange as it might seem at first glance. Tishri was the beginning of the New Year in ancient Palestine because it came when the crops from the "previous" year were harvested. However it was not the most important month. The bible refers to Tishri as the seventh month and the first month is stated to be Nissan, the month in which Passover the Festival of Freedom occurs.

So as we enter the year 5774 on 1 Tishrei, which is Wednesday September 4, 2013, let's all come together in the spirit of KULANU and join together as a community in celebration and peace.

The Golden Willow is the last book in a trilogy written by Harry Bernstein, starting when he was 94 years old. He wrote these books after his wife died as a tribute to her. It's a beautiful story of a 70 year romance and the story of how Harry came to write these 3 books. It is interesting as a biography and for the story itself.

The Rabbi's Wife by Shirley Schwartz has achieved magic by writing a work of true scholarship that is so readable. She helps us to see what has been for so long invisible – the unheralded role of the rebbitzen in making the American synagogue tick. She introduces us to unforgettable characters, and enables us to see the progress that women have made in this country over the last century. Most interestingly, she shows us marriages that were true partnerships in every sense of the word.

The Last Jew by Noah Gordon is thought provoking and interesting dealing with the Inquisition. It is basically a survival story of Yonah, the main character. Yonah was smart and talented. Equally important, his family background provided him with a sense of obligation to do his best, taking care of himself and those around him. As interesting as Yonah is, the individuals around him are also remarkable in that they are so human and are formed and reformed by the circumstances they find themselves in. Good historical fiction.

The Jerusalem Maiden by Thalia Carner is a coming of age novel exploring the role that religion, faith and family has on one girl's hopes and dreams for her own future. Esther struggles not only with what her family and culture expected but her own personal beliefs in God and how they could bring so much heartache as well as joy. The author's rich details subtly place the reader on the scene. This book is beautiful and will provide many opportunities for personal reflection.

RELIGIOUS SCHOOL

Very shortly, classes will resume and we will be getting back into that Religious School rhythm... especially with Brett Tancer's help! Summer was great, but this is the time of year that I wait for... It was wonderful seeing so many smiling faces at our summer pool party and at our Welcome & Welcome Back TBA Open House (be sure to check out the pix on our TBA Facebook page). Now that our school is almost back in session, please be sure that all your paperwork has been turned in and that you have started to receive communications from the teachers. This is vital – we NEED your input & feedback. Please keep the teachers informed as to how your child's learning is progressing – we are partners in your children's growth as Jewish young men & women!

Please remember our children's safety – do NOT stop by the Temple entrance to drop off your child (or to pick them up as there is NO PARKING in front of the building), but rather drive to a parking spot, park, and walk your child into the Temple. Besides the safety issue – this is a really nice way to start your days! Every Sunday morning starts off with JAMTY Café providing bagel breakfasts for a nominal fee, which tastes great and also benefits our youth programming at TBA. The Café opens at 9:00am and serves students until 9:25am, and parents throughout the morning. Classes run from 9:30am – 11:30am, when we all gather for prayer, song, and community at our rousing *Kehillah*, which concludes at noon. Parents are welcome to join us- we only ask that no students are taken out of *Kehillah* early as this disrupts the mood that we all work so hard to create- thanks! Sunday students are dismissed directly from the Sanctuary following *Kehillah* – first the younger ones are picked up at their seats, and then we dismiss the older students, ensuring that the safety of all is primary.

Sunday Religious School classes start on September 8^{th} , for $K-2^{nd}$ grade only, to give them a calmer first day.

Tuesday Religious School classes for $3^{rd} - 6^{th}$ grade starts on September 10^{th} . For those new student families, please note that we serve pizza and healthy snacks from 4:30 pm - 4:50 pm to give our students that extra bit of fuel they need to keep active and alert. Tuesday classes run from 5:00 pm - 6:30 pm, with students being picked up from the classrooms. Again, as on Sundays, we ask that you do not pick your children up early unless absolutely necessary (in which case please inform the Director or teacher ahead of time).

Shalom Chai, our (no longer) new community Hebrew High School will welcome students on Tuesday, September 17th, at 6:30pm. We welcome all Jewish teens attending 7th - 12th grades for both formal and informal education. Our program blends classroom learning, service learning (doing Social Action), and plenty of teen interaction. We are excited about this program and hope that you are too. Please give me a call, drop me an email, or visit the Temple website if you would like more info on **Shalom Chai**. Classes run from 6:30pm – 8:30pm and the evening even includes a light dinner break! 7th graders attend both **Shalom Chai** on Tuesday evenings and **Shabbat Morning Services** on Saturday mornings, supporting their classmates as they transition to adulthood.

We will not hold classes on Sunday, September 15th, giving everyone an extra day of rest to reflect (after *Yom Kippur*). Those who wish to help erect this year's *Sukkah* are invited to join the fun - the Men's Club will once again lead us in our Sukkah building, starting at 8:00am on the 15th.

Lastly, please feel comfortable to contact me anytime to discuss our Religious School – together (*kulanu*), we can make this the best experience for our children.





Have a tzedakah box in some visible place and encourage regular donations. Make choosing a charity a family decision.

As we notice desirable changes, we are encouraged to become the kind of people we'd like to be, and to appreciate the goodness in others. 

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
