# EXPRESS YOURSELF IN YIDDISH by Rabbi Alon Levkovitz



The other day I met with a man who was telling me about his mother who had just died a short time before. I could sense the love and appreciation he had for her, not only by what he said, but also by the unmistakable warmth in his voice that is saved for occasions when love mixes with grief. But there was another remarkable thing in this conversation: The son used long sentences with affectionate adjectives to faithfully describe his mother, but sensed that he fell short. In his mind, he was not able to describe her true character and virtues. It all changed when he used some Yiddish words.

The first word he mentioned was a *Gutte Neshuma*. I grew up with this phrase but haven't heard it in years. Literarily, it means "a good soul", but of course it goes much deeper than that. We meet many good people in our lifetime, but a Gutte Neshuma is a class of its own. These rare people spread around sparkles of inner beauty and pure goodness that makes you feel as if you are in the presence of angels.

Then he used the more familiar word, Mensch. He first asked me (as many have done before him) if it is appropriate to use it for a woman. The answer is "yes". Mensch in German (from which Yiddish is derived) means "a person", and therefore, is gender neutral. It is usually translated as "a good person" but doing so is like describing Michael Jordan as "a good athlete". This beautiful word, if not a concept, refers to a person who can be relied upon to act with honor and integrity. Someone who is kind, considerate, and possesses "responsibility fused with compassion, a sense that one's own personal needs and desires are limited by the needs and desires of other people. A mensch acts with self-restraint and humility, always sensitive to the feelings and thoughts of others".

*Kvel* was the next word my new friend used. He used it to describe the strong bond between his mother and his son (her grandson). The word is used when we feel proud and delighted to the point of tears. It goes together with *Nachas*, the joy you feel over the achievements of someone close to us, because we are so connected with that person, that it's as if the accomplishment is ours. While the words I mentioned above all have positive connotations, we must remember that the lives of our ancestors in Eastern Europe, who used Yiddish as their main language, were not so wonderful. As a result, we have a plethora of words, like *tzuris* (troubles), krechtzen (to moan and groan), *kvetch* (to complain), and my favorite, schlep. As an adjective, schlep often refers to a stupid or clumsy person; as a noun, it describes an annoyingly long journey; and as a verb, it has two main meanings: 1. to travel from one place to another when you really would prefer not to, as in "I schlepped all the way to China for this?!?" 2. to drag or lug (oneself or an object) with difficulty or reluctance, as in "Why would you want me to schlep all of that stuff?"

We are approaching the most popular season for personal resolutions. Having more Yiddishkeit (Jewishness) in your life may not be a bad one. A fun and meaningful way to do it is to learn and use some new words of the most remarkable language— Yiddish.

# Interview by Danna Cohen, Executive Director

#### Myles and Korky Cooley; Lisa and Akhil Chhabra with daughters Maya and Nora



**Danna:** Can you tell us a little about your family?

**Myles:** Korky and I moved to West Palm Beach in 1974 and joined Temple Israel, the only reform synagogue in the area, in the early 80s. After our oldest daughter, Jill, began kindergarten in religious school, Korky became more interested in Judaism and converted a few years later. Jill and Lisa were both named, became b'not mitzvah (at Masada) and confirmed at that temple.

Lisa: I grew up in Palm Beach Gardens and attended Temple Israel in WPB as a child. Akhil grew up in Atlanta, where we met in graduate school. We had an "In-Jew" (Indian/Jewish) wedding in 2011 under a chuppah decorated with bright Indian fabrics. We have two daughters (Maya, 4 and Nora, 1) whom we have chosen to raise in the Jewish faith, and are so happy that they found TBA so close to our new home in Jupiter.

**Danna:** It is so wonderful to see three generations all under one roof, and engaged in synagogue life. What role does the synagogue play in your life?

**Myles:** A synagogue is important to us because of the continuity of

prayers, rituals, and songs that link the generations. It's a joy to watch our grandchild learning about Jewish holidays, values, and music in The One School. The values of "acts of loving kindness" and "righteousness" (doing the right thing) are so important for children to learn so that they practice these throughout their lives.

Lisa: We decided to join the synagogue because in such a short time, TBA had already given us so much. We participated in the Toddler Enrichment Program, enrolled our daughter in the preschool, attended the many family events offered, and made lifelong friends. We are an interfaith couple who have chosen to raise our daughters Jewish. We want them to grow up with good morals and values and a strong sense of who they are. TBA is a place where they can learn the history and traditions of Judaism, be accepted for who they are, and feel comfortable in their own skin.

**Danna:** When you think of your kids/ grandkids, what are you hoping they get from not just their synagogue but their connection to Judaism? What do you see when you look ahead?

Lisa: We just had our youngest daughter's Hebrew naming at Temple Beth Am. When we look ahead, we envision both daughters attending religious school, having their Bat Mitzvahs, and growing up in the Temple community with friends they made when they were young. It gives us comfort knowing that our family will have a group of people who have seen them through so many important milestones in their life.

**Danna:** What is your favorite thing about TBA?

Lisa: Our favorite thing about Temple Beth Am is the sense of community that it provides. We always feel welcome and comfortable. We appreciate the diversity of the congregation and the fact that there are activities/opportunities for our whole family. We love that our children are able to learn from their wonderful teachers, including Rabbi Alon, Marcy, and Brett. We love that they participate in Shabbat every Friday at school and come home singing Jewish songs and talking about the Jewish holidays and customs. We love that TBA has become a safe and comfortable place for our children and we are excited to watch them grow up in the community of TBA.

Myles: We've been members of Temple Beth Am for about four years. We love the contemporary Jewish music that Brett and Marcy arrange and sing. Their camaraderie with Rabbi Alon is obvious. Rabbi's sermons and classes are always informative, and his sense of humor contributes to informal and relaxed Services. Congregants we've met are very unpretentious.

# **Danna:** Myles, what made you join the Temple Beth Am Board?





### **UNWRAPPED GIFTS**

During the holiday season we made our lists, wrapped our gifts, and were excited for our loved ones to receive them. However, do you know what gift is free, can be given every day, and means the most to your children? The gift of your time!

With today's demanding schedules, it can be challenging to find special time to share with your children. Perhaps some of these ideas will be feasible:

- A wake-up call: Before you leave for work or start your day, wake up your children and spend just a few minutes alone with them. Talk about what's going on that day. Then, give at least one reason why you are proud of them. It's a great way to start a day.
- It's a date: Try to schedule a date with your children on a regular basis. No matter what activity you choose, big or small, you can always laugh and enjoy each other.
- Family game night: Fill an evening with fun and learning by adding a game night to your family's routine.
- "Love you" affirmations: Plenty of hugs, kisses, notes, and pats on the back. Knowing that you are loved for no other reason than "because you are you" can help your children be strong when the going gets tough.

- Admitting mistakes: Most children don't do this easily; some adults don't either. Everyone makes mistakes and no one is perfect. Perfection is not a reasonable goal. When you make a mistake, you have an opportunity to model valuable learning.
- Keeping a sense of humor: Some people are naturally funny, but everyone can laugh. Laughing is always good soup for the soul, can break a tense moment and gives a new perspective that allows everyone to get back on track.
- **Compassion:** Institute a family project representing an act of passion for mankind or our environment. This helps your child recognize the hardships in our world and that he/she can make a difference.
- **Perseverance:** When you see your child trying a little harder when a task gets challenging, let him/her know you noticed. "Wow, that's hard, but you are really working on it." Perhaps make a suggestion that could lead to a new approach and a more successful outcome. Your child will learn that perseverance is worth it!

• Self-esteem: A good self-concept is not built in a day. A strong selfconcept is based on unconditional love and countless true accomplishments. Spend time with your children with activities they can do well. Give praise for successes whether big or little. Tell your children what you like about them and ask what they like about themselves. All of this will build a positive sense of self and the confidence to stand confidently as your child walks through life.






