HISTORY REPEATING ITSELF

In the middle of the month, we will be celebrating the festival of Purim, which means that 31 days later, it's time for Passover. There is little in common between the ways these two festivals are observed. Passover is a well-orchestrated and mostly civil Seder around a beautifully set table versus a hectic Megillah reading on Purim with groggers (noise makers), costumes, and too much alcohol. A flat, tasteless matzah is the symbol of Passover foods, contrasted with the delicious hamantaschen filled with poppy seeds (or your favorite filling) that we eat on Purim.

But when we compare the biblical sources of these festivals (the story of Passover is told in the Book of Exodus and the Book of Esther tells the story of Purim), we notice many intriguing similarities.

The obvious resemblance is that a person at a top position in the kingdom, the Pharaoh in Egypt and Haman in Persia, is planning a genocide against the Jews (or the Israelites as they were called in Egypt). In Exodus, the Pharaoh ordered to kill all the Hebrew male infants, while Haman convinced King Ahasuerus to give him

permission to annihilate all the Jews of the empire on a certain day (Purim). Neither of these plots succeeded, and the perpetrators paid a high price for their wickedness. Both were ironically punished by the way they tried to harm their victims. Haman built a 50-foot gallows on which he planned to hang Mordechai the Jew, only to end up hanged on the very same gallows. The Pharaoh who wanted to kill the Hebrew babies lost his own son during the last plague. We can sum it up with the punchline of the famous joke —"they tried to kill us, we survived, let's eat!"

Less noticed and more surprising is the fact that both stories are set in motion by women who disobeyed a royal decree, and some of these women were even part of the Royal household. In Exodus, the Pharaoh's homicidal plan begins crumbling down when the midwives, Shiphrah and Puah, keep the Hebrew babies alive. The one who saves baby Moses, who will ultimately defeat the pharaoh as a grown man, is none other than the Pharaoh's own daughter who raises Moses, a Hebrew baby male, in her father's palace. In The Book of Esther, it begins with Queen Vashti, who refuses to show up at her husband's party and show off her beauty to a bunch of drunken men, and it was Queen Esther who turned King Ahasuerus against his loyal vizier, Haman.

Both saviors, Moses and Esther, kept their Jewish identity secret from others in the royal palace, most especially from the king. Even their names are Egyptian and Persian. It seems like the Pharaoh is aware of Moses' Israelite origin only when he returns to Egypt demanding the freedom of his people, and Esther reveals her Jewish identity to her husband, the king, as a last resort to save the Jews of Persia.

There are more similarities between the xenophobia of Ancient Egypt and Ancient Persia, and it's disturbing how many times since, and in how many places around the globe, these stories repeated themselves. Yet, there is one big difference between the Jews back then and the Jews today—we can defend ourselves. When we look at the modern versions of both Egypt and Persia (Iran), we see that the disdain for Jews has not changed, but the Jews did. For 30 years, Egypt tried to destroy modern Israel until she realized that it will not happen, and they signed a peace agreement. Modern Persia (Iran) is still dreaming to execute Haman's ancient plan to blot out the Jews, but they know that that will lead to their own demise. Today, we don't only survive—we thrive.

GOING PLACES TOGETHER

From Danna:

The last time I went to a professional conference in person was 2019, and I attended the URJ Biennial Convention with Bruce Cohen, who is the current past-president, and Lindsay Hirsch, the current president. Being able to spend time together outside the confines of a board meeting was priceless.

Often times, the partnership between the lay leadership and the professional staff of any organization is focused on immediate problemsolving, which is important, but can make carving out time for looking at the big picture and planning together difficult. A conference is the exact opposite—all the urgencies that are not true emergencies cease to exist and the big picture comes into focus, coupled with uninterrupted time to work on it together.

I do not know how it works in the rest of the non-profit sector, but in the Jewish world, we are lucky to have a multitude of options that bring the professional and lay leadership together for joint experiences. Still, there are often times when I attend something just for Jewish professionals and am left wishing our lay leadership could experience that speaker, take part in the study, be part of the conversation.

This year that possibility is coming true. Conferences are back in person and I am registered to attend JPRO: Going Places Together in May in Cleveland. The thing is, so is TBA President Lindsay Hirsch, who works as Senior Director of Leadership Development in the Mandel

Center for Leadership at the Jewish Federation. It's an apt title and a rare opportunity to both be there in our professional capacities as well as our volunteer ones (full disclosure: I sit on the JPRO Palm Beach Committee as a leader).

Sure, it means packing a lot of proverbial hats, attending dozens of sessions, airports, flights, and lack of sleep, but I am excited for all of it. I can already picture texting each other during sessions about an amazing speaker we want to bring to the Temple, debriefing over dinner about the amazing program ideas gleaned from the day, learning from other organizations, planning for the future of the Temple, and bringing back a wealth of information and knowledge.

From Lindsay:

It is amazing to think that I have not traveled on behalf of Temple Beth Am or Federation since 2019. There is some symbolism here. The last time I traveled for professional development was for URJ, and now heading into the JPRO Conference with Danna feels as if we are turning a corner in the pandemic. Just knowing that in a matter of months, I will have the opportunity to learn with 1,000 professionals from around the country representing Jewish communal organizations, institutions, and synagogues is deeply meaningful. Having the ability to travel with a delegation of 30 like-minded professionals from Palm Beach and representing Temple Beth Am gives me an entirely different sense of pride about what we at Temple Beth Am

This year, I happen to be a conference presenter during three separate Featured Collaborations sessions. Part of my presentation was inspired by my role at Temple Beth Am and during the conference I hope that Danna and I can explore where we have been over the last two years of disruption, and where we might go together. Time in Cleveland will be an invaluable resource to maximize success in my current role and in preparation for the future. The Jewish community is grounded in the values of our people and so when leadership, Judaism, and shared values come together in a manner of shared learning, only positive change can occur. Or Mars said "leadership is using yourself to intervene in a group situation to bring about positive change." I know this conference will have profound moments of reconnection, meaningmaking, celebration, and envisioning the future in partnership. Danna and I look forward to sharing with you any best practices we glean from communities from across North America as well as incubating programs that might be new in **Jupiter!**

PERSON, PLACE, OR THING?

I recently read a blog post by Rabbi Esther Lederman on the URJ website. She told the story of how, one Friday, her family planned to attend a special Shabbat Service being put on by her Temple. When her son asked where they were going she told him, "Temple Micah". On the way to the event he kept saying they were going the wrong way to the Temple, and when they arrived at a local bookstore and café he had a tantrum because she had promised they were going to Temple and this was most certainly not the Temple.

Rabbi Esther recounts having a realization that to her son, Temple Micah was a building, whereas to her, Temple Micah was the people. She goes on to explain that when she thought of Shabbat, she thought of the Rabbi and his kids singing the blessings together, the jokester usher, the fluffy challah at the oneg, and everyone else who makes up their community, where as her son thought of...the front door.

Her story made me think of our own Shabbat Services and what they reflect about the people who make up the Temple Beth Am community. Every Friday night during Shabbat Services, our clergy ask people what is something they are grateful for that week. Those in attendance in person stand up and share, and those at home watching the stream type it into the chat box. Every week I think to myself, what a wonderful way it is to go into Shabbat. Sure, later in the Service there is space for thinking about and letting go of anything bad that happened that week, but how wonderful it is to first start from a place of joy and gratitude. Sometimes people are grateful for big things—the birth of a new baby, news of remission from cancer, acceptance into the school of their dreams, but often it is the smaller moments—getting a good grade on a test or having a friend visiting from out of town.

I'm usually working during the Service, either monitoring the chat box, helping set up the oneg, or greeting people coming in, but I always stop what I am doing and pay attention to this part of the Service because I think it says so much.

If I had to describe the congregation to a visitor, I might say that Temple Beth Am is made up of people who are generous, kind, diverse, talented, compassionate, and a multitude of other adjectives. And if they asked me about Shabbat, I could tell them about the beautiful music, the ornate fruit platters, the thoughtprovoking sermons. But, I think these two minutes of gratitude say more about the people of Temple Beth Am than any description ever could. From my bird's eye view in the back, I can see the people who are squirming in their seats just itching to share their good news, I can see spouses whispering to each other about how happy they are for their friends, I can see the pats on the backs happening across the pews. In that moment, how much the people who make up the Temple Beth Am community care about and for each other becomes utterly opaque, and that is a beautiful sight.

SECURITY UPDATE

Over the past four years and under the direction of Rabbi Alon and our Presidents, your Security Committee has diligently been evaluating and implementing security measures for the safety of our staff, children, parents, congregants, and visitors to our campus through physical as well as training security measures. While we continuously emphasize preparedness, we recently completed a training update of all staff, the Board, and key volunteers utilizing the most recent methods and strategies.

Security is everyone's responsibility: See Something-Say Something-Do Something!

Following is a list of those security measures we can talk about, that are continuously reviewed, updated, and implemented in partnership/consultation with Jupiter Police/SWAT, Palm Beach County Sheriff, Jewish Federation Palm Beach, Secure Community Network (SCN), Anti-Defamation League (ADL), Department of Homeland Security (DHS), and others.

- Emergency Response Plan developed; training and routine drills
- Active Shooter System (ASR) installed; pendants worn by key staff and volunteers during events and located in all rooms, Social Halls and playground, panic buttons along with frequent training
- Proximity locks access control in all classrooms and safe rooms; classrooms always locked
- Proximity photo access control: all staff, key lay leaders
- Cameras
- Controlled entry during Covid: doors locked at all times
- Cyber security: upgraded access points, restricted access (password policy)
- Blackout shades where applicable
- New lighting and emergency exit in playground
- New LED lighting in parking lot (dusk to dawn)
- "All Call" intercom expanded

SPRING BREAK HAMANTASCHEN



Purim falls over Spring Break this year, and if you are spending the week at home, baking hamantaschens is one way to enjoy Purim at home as a family...and most importantly, they are delicious! You can bake them classic with apricot jam or poppy seed filling or get creative and use chocolate spread, cookie dough, or brownie batter for the filling! You can also combine chocolate chips, candy pieces, crushed pretzels, or sprinkles with the dough.

This simple recipe makes about 20 hamantashens.

Ingredients:

- 2 eggs
- 1/2 cup oil
- 2/3 cup sugar
- 1 tsp vanilla
- 2 tsp baking powder
- 2 1/2 cups flour
- Jam, chocolate spread, or desired filling



Directions: Cream together sugar, oil, eggs, and vanilla. Slowly add flour and baking powder. Mix together. The dough might be crumbly; use your hands to smooth it out and combine it. If the dough is sticky, add an additional 1/4 cup flour. Roll out dough on floured surface about 1/4" to 1/8" thick. Not too thick because then the circles are hard to shape and will open up. Not too thin because then it will rip when shaping or filling. Cut out circles using a cookie cutter or the rim of a large glass cup or mason jar. Fill center of circle with desired filling (about 1/2 tsp) and bake on 350 degrees for 8-12 minutes depending on how soft or crispy you want them.


