TRANSACTIVE MEMORY & THE GENIUS OF YIZKOR

As we started planning the High Holy Days many months ago, I was reminded of the late Harvard psychologist Daniel Wegner's theory of transactive memory. He explains that:

People in close relationships know many things about each other's memories. One partner may not know where to find candles around the house, for instance, but may still be able to find them in a blackout by asking the other partner where the candles are. Each partner can enjoy the benefits of the pair's memory by assuming responsibility for remembering just those items that fall clearly to him or to her and then by attending to the categories of knowledge encoded by the partner so that items within those categories can be retrieved from the partner when they are needed. Such knowledge of one another's memory areas takes time and practice to develop, but the result is that close couples have an implicit structure for carrying out the pair's memory tasks. With this structure in place, couples in close relationships have a transactive memory that is greater than either of their individual memories.

Here he talks about couples, but the same idea is applicable to families

and people who work together for some time. Without ever verbally acknowledging it, different people have a unique knowledge of how to perform certain tasks and the rest of the team rely on these memories. I can hear Mark Slifkin's voice in my head telling me "that's why you need to have good written procedures". He is right, of course, and we have them, but...every year I'm amazed when **Debbie Baseman** opens the High Holy Days binder that contains a detailed timeline and specific tasks for each one of us to perform by a certain deadline. But there are always things that even the best written document cannot replace the transactive memory of (like, how to find this binder without Debbie).

When we are in a long relationship, everyone becomes specialized in different functions. We use each other's memories as our own. I realized that as our children grew older, they took over larger parts of our family's virtual shared hard drive. It started with them being the only ones who possess the knowledge of operating the TV remote control and gradually spread to cell phones and other electronic gadgets. I'm the only one who knows how to decalcify the coffee machine and, unsurprisingly, Gali knows the rest.

When a person dies, I often hear the bereaved spouse says, "something within me died with her/him". I used to understand it figuratively, but in light of Wegner's theory, I understand how the loss of our loved one is at the same time.

literally, a loss of a part of us. The knowledge that we "stored" in their mind is lost to us. The person we loved was part of our external memory system; their experiences were our experiences and ours were theirs. Some of these things are mundane, but some are crucial and touch on the core of who we are. They were the only ones who knew certain things about us. It is this loss of our "self" in losing a loved one that makes us "no longer, literally, wholly ourselves".

But at the same time, we must remember that the memories that our loved ones stored within us are still there even after they are gone. The genius of Yizkor is the setting it creates to call on these memories, to bring to the surface the knowledge that only we have of them.

May we all have a wonderful year with many meaningful memories.

A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

I am writing this article between Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur while also working on my High Holy Days Appeal speech. My family and I attended Rosh Hashanah Services and Tashlich at the Beach, where we just barely beat the rain as we threw away our sins for the year. Many of you commented (as I hear every year) that I didn't have enough bread for all my sins but I feel since mine is gluten-free, it all evens out.

Many of you have told me how much you enjoyed the Rosh Hashanah Services and how meaningful they were to you and your family. It is always nice to hear these comments and I, of course, pass them on to our clergy and staff. I woke up around 4:00am this morning, turned the television on, and watched a documentary called Hava Nagila. The movie is a documentary that goes through the history and meaning of the 1915 Hebrew folk song we have sung and danced the hora to all our lives. It highlighted this party song from the shtetls to kibbutzim before Israel was a nation to its universality today. I didn't realize that a song about us rejoicing and being happy that encapsulated the Jewish journey over the past 150 years has also bridged cultural divides. It has been sung by people around the world, not only by artists in America such as Harry Belafonte, Connie Francis, and Glen Campbell—none of whom were Jewish—but by many others as well. I also didn't know that the civil rights anthem "Now" by Lena Horn, and Allan Sherman's parody "Harvey and Sheila", were also set to the tune of Hava Nagila.

Around 30 years ago while I was visiting my dad in San Miguel de Allende in Mexico, I attended a wedding of a friend of a friend in

town. Since my Spanish was very limited, I was lost quite a bit until at this Catholic, Mexican wedding party, the band started playing Hava Nagila and everyone started to dance. This was the first song I knew so I joined in singing and watched in amazement as over 500 guests were having a wonderful time dancing and clapping to what I had presumed was a solely Jewish tradition.

It's always nice when something from our Jewish culture transcends the Jewish community. It reminds us how important our traditions are as they're passed down through the years, and that we all have more in common than we sometimes think.

I want to wish all of you the happiest of new years and look forward to seeing you soon.



SISTERHOOD SCOOP



and a disregard for the status quo that threatens to upend this carefully ordered community.







WHAT NOW?

Were you here for Rabbi Alon's sermon on Rosh Hashanah morning? It got me thinking.

I've always relished a good argument, and I naturally work through things by playing devil's advocate, sometimes to the vexation of my opponent—I mean person with whom I am conversing. I don't necessarily need to win, but I need the "fight" in order to understand the other person's and my own viewpoint more thoroughly.

And for a good amount of years my surroundings validated me on this matter.

As a student, I participated in debate tournaments all through high school, and in my senior year had my first internship, at a law firm that at the time was representing Firestone in a lawsuit about flipping vehicles. My most vivid memory from this case was the week before it went to trial: one entire floor of the firm came to a standstill to conduct a mock trial for two days, one in which my supervising attorney, who had been working for months to represent Firestone, now had to present the plaintiff's side. This seemed like the craziest, albeit brilliant, thing to me at the time. As she explained to us, the best way to be prepared is to research, know, and understand the other side.

In college I fell in love with Jewish text and took as many classes in Talmudic law as I could, poring over the nuanced arguments presented. It was like the most

exciting show you've ever seen, except it was unfolding in tiny font on giant pages, and the plot was essentially about splitting hairs.

Sure, in all of these experiences, someone always won, but the road there was painstakingly paved with respect for the other side, both the person and the value of their differing conclusion. Much of our sense of justice is built on this, right? The Supreme Court publishes minority dissenting opinions, and even though they don't prevail, those opinions are often used as the basis of future arguments. In international law, you'd be shocked to read the amount of debate time allocated to choosing a single, seemingly inconsequential, word in a treaty. While entirely different from our American legal system, this debate is preserved and utilized later on to discern the intent of the parties that drafted it. Its value is not just theoretical but practical.

And today? Well turn on the news, go to a dinner party, browse through social media, and see that this is no longer the case—at least it doesn't feel like it. We not only shut out opposing viewpoints and refuse respect to those that have them, we flee from anything controversial... except at the same time we have created a society where everything political is controversial, and everything is political. But as Rabbi Alon pointed out, we share many of the same goals and find many of the same issues important. We want to get to the same place; we just want to take different routes to get there.

You've probably heard of Hillel and Shammai, the famous Rabbis and contemporaries whose schools of thought notoriously disagreed on almost everything. What you probably don't know is how that story ends. One day violence erupted and...well, to hear what happened you'll have to join us for Temple Beth Am's Day of Learning: Arguing to Learn vs. Arguing to Win, on Sunday, November 4, 2018 at 10:00am. We've partnered with The 9ofAdar organization to tackle constructive disagreement. We will explore how Judaism did it historically and strategies for doing it today, in the hopes of moving out of the echo chamber, backing away from the powder keg, and being able to once again engage in "arguments for the sake of heaven."

We will hear from and learn with Rabbi Alon, as well as experts in our congregation before enjoying lunch together. Adults will have a choice of three breakout sessions, and separate sessions for kids and teens will be held by Alissa Frankel and Elana Beame.


