Going Out to Find Holiness

Anxiety is creeping into the hearts of Americans. In a recent conversation I had with a congregant about going out to a restaurant, having recently received her second vaccine, she commented, "I feel like I am becoming agoraphobic." She lamented that as she was standing outside the front of her house and a UPS driver leaned out of his truck to wave hello, she jumped back in horror. "I never would have done that before COVID-19," she said. She recognized that she is becoming increasingly anxious about returning to life and doing something as simple and common as going out to a restaurant. What can she do, she asked me, now that the plague seems to be subsiding, at least to some degree?

From the Rabbi's Desk

One of the side effects of COVID-19 is this new phenomena that I can only call "COVID-19 re-entry anxiety." Can we go out with other people and be unmasked if

everyone is vaccinated? Can we socialize at a restaurant, go on a plane, take a vacation and truly relax if we are with other people? I am one always to trust the medical professionals, but I am seeing tremendous confusion, conflicting messages and an ever-growing fear about what life is going to look like when we leave our "bunker" like homes.

Our Torah gives us a clue on how to deal with this anxiety. It is rooted in the order of the Torah itself. In Leviticus 10:1, we learn that Aaron, Moses' brother, suffered a terrible loss. His two sons, Nadav and Abihu were killed in a calamitous act of God.

Following this tragedy, we transition to Leviticus 19 called, *Kedoshim*, which means holiness. *Kedoshim* teaches us about reverence for our parents and building a community; we are to eat the sacrifice only on the first or second day, necessitating a group of people with whom to eat. We are to share our abundance with the less fortunate, refrain from theft, deception and deceit. "You shall not swear falsely by My name, profaning the name of God." Of course, we are called upon to "love our neighbor as ourselves." Subtly, our text is telling us how to rise up from disaster and death.

Moses joined with Aaron to support each other and the people by offering a path out of the darkness. Work to bring holiness into the world. Endeavor to "look up," even as life sometimes forces us to peer downward. We can either live in the past and the suffering of it, or we can move forward with a renewed purpose and mission. We can either let the past destroy our future, or we can imagine a world where our brighter future allows us to move beyond the pain of the past. Aaron and Moses moved forward and found holiness even after tragedy.

We must following the death of over 500,000 Americans, mourn our loss but then "put one foot in front of the other." We must focus on the tasks in front of us. We might see going out for dinner or speaking to another person in the grocery store as a common, or meaningless act, but in light of the past year, it is a holy act. It is a courageous act. It propels us out of the pain of yesterday; empowering us to normalize our lives again.

Most of rituals and ethical laws can only be fulfilled in community. We cannot find holiness alone. We must get out, live our lives and embrace our time with one another. We must keep safety at the forefront, but let us not be paralyzed by our fears; rather let us go forth, and find *Kedoshim*, holiness.

From the Rabbi's Desk

It is important to hold onto the idea that the Torah of our lives is revealed to us every day.

Change as Revelation

My son, Mark, was born the year I graduated from rabbinical school. My daughter, Sophie, was born just before my family arrived here at Beth Or. Along with bringing so much joy to our lives, my children also happen to be walking and talking yard sticks who measure major moments in my career.

The other day, comparing our human measuring tools yielded particularly powerful results. We realized that Sophie, now 3 and a half years old, is the age that Mark was when we arrived at Beth Or. We were astonished at just how much our children have changed in our time here. Then it hit us. If they had changed so much in this time since arriving at Beth Or, could it be that we, too, have changed? Of course we have. But isn't it amazing that as we watch young people noticeably change every moment, it somehow feels like we adults remain exactly the same? But we have changed. We are three years older. We've

added three years of experience onto our parenting resume. Our family stories are now interwoven with yours for three full years.

For me, professionally, tasks that once took significant time to learn here at Beth Or are no longer a challenge. Email systems and phone extensions now take up much less of my conscious attention. The faces on the screens of our gatherings (and God willing in person soon) are all familiar to me. But even more so, I have the privilege of knowing the stories held in the eyes of those I see. My Introduction to Judaism students helped me see Judaism through a beginner's lens all over again. Our "On One Foot" Sunday morning class struck a deep chord within me and has changed how I see the world and the people in it. Through teaching 6th grade Hebrew and leading life cycle events, I've learned that online methods will always be a hurdle to human interaction, but that the human spirit, and the strength of our students and congregation, will help us overcome that hurdle every single time.

I'm not sure I would have ever taken stock of these changes in me had it not been for that brief realization that Sophie, the six-month-old infant we brought to Beth Or, is now the same age as her older brother, Mark, the pre-schooler we brought to Beth Or in 2018.

On Shavuot we celebrate the revelation at Sinai. But that was not the last time that Torah was revealed. It is important to hold onto the idea that the Torah of our lives is revealed to us every day. Revelation also comes in the changing faces of our children, the passing of seasons, and the rising and setting of the sun.

The term "Olam Habah" is most often translated as "the world to come," but it can also be translated, as the Kabbalists of old pointed out, as "the world that comes." By translating in such a way, we encounter the idea that the world of revelation and beauty is not somewhere we go one day. Rather, that world is constantly coming towards us. The way to experience revelation, therefore, is not to go searching towards heaven, but to be as attuned as possible to the changes in our world. As we appreciate the changes around us, may they highlight the beautiful changes within ourselves as well.

As the Pandemic Abates, We Must Come Out of the Desert **Recognizing Individuality**

Individuality has always been stressed in our Jewish heritage.

As we get inoculated and begin to get back together as a community, in person, the importance of recognizing each other's identity and individuality will become even more important than before the pandemic.

This reminds me of an experience I had calling AT&T. Instead of the usual, automated list of options to choose from, a "live person" spoke to me. We starting talking about our hobbies and interests, not even addressing, at first the reason I called AT&T. I was so touched that he talked to me as an individual.

The same occurs in the Torah portion, Bamidbar. God told Moses to take a census of the Israelites. The Rabbis interpret this as a symbol of individuality. The Talmud states that when one dies, it is as if all had died. Individuality has always been stressed in our Jewish heritage.

The Nazis tried to take away our identity in the concentration camps. One rabbi in the camps would not let that happen as he celebrated and officiated at Shabbat & holidays, Bar Mitzvahs and weddings. The rabbi followed the view of Sforno: "Everyone from each generation would then be thought of by his/her name and thus by his own unique personal qualities."

Rabbi Ron Wolfson states that modern Judaism today faces the same challenges. Synagogues will have to find new ways to reach out to their congregants to make them feel unique and special, developing real relationships with each member.

Rabbi Neal J. Loevinger goes on to say: "You can only have a strong community when you recognize the importance of each individual."

As we begin to come out of the desert of isolation the pandemic has created, let us strive to rebuild our relationships, recognize each person and rebuild a new strong Jewish community.
