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An Evolving Chanukah

From the Rabbi's Desk

Most Jews love Chanukah. What's not to like? Dreidles, latkes, candles in the darkness, family and greasy food are all enjoyable. Truth be told, Chanukah is a fabulous holiday. This year it will follow Thanksgiving in a unique blending of two very popular holidays. I've heard many comment on their recipes for yam latkes and apple sauce made with cranberries.

When you think about it, however, Chanukah is a complicated holiday. Even the Book of Maccabees, which tells the story of Chanukah, is controversial. The four books of the Maccabees, which didn't even make it into the Bible, were treated as holy books by the Greek-speaking Jews of Alexandria, but not by the Rabbis

of Israel, who canonized the Bible.

They never regarded them as holy, never entered them among the books that made up the Hebrew Bible, for the Maccabees

by the second century were very unpopular. You see, they celebrated might over faith. They were a bloody band who waged a religious war to win Jewish freedom against a tyrannical overlord, in this case, the Greeks. Ironically enough, these books that celebrated the Maccabees' victory over Hellenism survived not in Hebrew but only in Greek. And it was the most Hellenized Jews in Egypt who most honored these testaments of resistance to Hellenism.

The Talmud tells us a different story of the holiday. The Talmud tells of how the Maccabees found a jar of oil that would only last for one day, and miraculously lasted for eight. Originally a tale of military conquest over the Greeks, the Rabbis transformed the Chanukah story into one of God's miracles and Temple rededication. This remaking of the holiday was essential, for the Jews of the Talmudic period did not have a state and painfully, the original Chanukah story was about nation creation. Also, the rabbis were writing in a period when similar revolts against Rome, seeking to win the Jew's political independence and to turn Israel into a rocky fortress, had been brutally smashed by Rome.

Chanukah has been a kind of battlefield between "Rabbi" and "Maccabee" as models of Jewish life. First it was a story of Maccabean revolution, of a people tired and oppressed rising up in violent revolt against tyranny and fighting for religious freedom. The Rabbis, hostile to the violence and warlike actions of the Maccabees, instead focused on God's redemptive power. By the early 1900s in Israel, the early Zionists, unhappy with Rabbinic dependence on God's saving acts, that neither saved nor healed in their eyes, rejoiced in the strength of the early pioneers. They even reworked Psalm 106, which celebrated the saving power of God, and instead sang about the self-redemption of the early pioneers. Thus Psalm 106 which reads, "Who can tell the mighty acts of the **Eternal**," became "Who can retell the mighty acts of **Israel.**" So, from the standpoint of the Rabbis, Chanukah celebrated God's saving Spirit: "Not by might and not by power..." The holiday was all about kindling the flames of dedication that was contradictory to insurgency. From the standpoint of the Maccabees and the Zionists, Chanukah celebrated human courage and doggedness, the human ability to make history bend and change to their will.

Over the centuries we have seen our festival of lights in many different ways. It has been for some a political holiday. For others, it is a triumph of the few and weak over the many and the powerful. To others it is a celebration of faith in a world of despair. It is a defiant act of lighting a candle in the darkness and kindling sparks of light. This year, as it coincides with Thanksgiving, may it symbolize a heart of gratitude and hope, which spring forth as we contemplate our blessings around the family table.

Haftorah — A Light in the Darkness

If you've had your bat or bar mitzvah in the last three years, then I've asked you the following question. "What's a haftorah?"

A haftorah is a reading that comes from the section of the Hebrew Bible known as "The Prophets" and a different selection is read on each Shabbat and most holidays after we finish reading the Torah. There is usually a thematic connection between the selected haftorah and the Torah portion of the week, or between the haftorah and the time of year. I ask this question of our B'nai Mitzvah students because I have the pleasure of helping them formulate their *d'var Haftorah* — their explanation and analysis of their portion. I truly delight in seeing them come face to face with the ancient texts. Their ideas are

always inspiring and it gives me a window into what it's like to be a teenager in the 2020's.

There is a legend about the practice of reading haftorah that is most appropriate for this time of year. It is said that in the moments and places in Jewish history where the reading of Torah was outlawed, Jews still read haftorah to remind them of the portion of the week or the time of year they were in. Stuck in the darkness of religious oppression, those generations of Jews used the haftorah as the light that guided their way, reminding them of the days when Torah could be read freely.

As I proudly listen each week as our B'nai Mitzvah chant their haftarah portion, I often think about how much those words meant to generations of Jews who lived in graver times than ours, and I think of how easy it is to take for granted the good we have in our lives. We do not fully appreciate the power of a flashlight until the electricity goes out. We do not fully appreciate the warmth of the fireplace until the heating system in the house goes caput. We do not fully appreciate the power of the haftorah until after reading from our holiest of scrolls, the Torah.

This year, during Chanukah, we will appreciate the light during the darkest time of our year. May it inspire us to remember that so long as our students continue reading Torah and haftorah, so long as we pass our values on to our children, the light we see during Chanukah will shine bright all year round, even when the sunshine is abundant.

Should We Question God?

Should we question God? This is a question I often hear. Often, when a person has lost a loved one or is suffering from illness, they will ask: "Why did God allow this to happen?" Our Jewish sacred text has been addressing this question for thousands of years. That is not to say there is one unified response or easy fix to human suffering, but questioning God in these situations has always been part of our Jewish mind set.

One Torah portion this November addresses the issue of challenging God. In *Parsha Vayishlach*, Jacob wrestled with the angels and would persist in this wrestling until the angels gave him a blessing. The blessing was a Name change, changing Jacob's name to "Israel," which means "one who wrestles with God." Rabbinic commentary agrees that this was no ordinary angel or human being. Could it have been God or maybe Jacob's own inner self? Whatever you believe, it was certainly a wrestling or challenging of God and God's relationship with humans.

This occurs not only during times of human suffering, but also in other aspects of the human experience. This is no more evident than in the psyche of modern day Israelis. Did you ever see Israelis wait patiently in line for anything? By their nature, they challenge many things. They seldom accept the status quo. I believe that is why Israel is the leading nation in medical advances, technology and second to the US in companies listed on the New York Stock exchange.

We Jews want to challenge. We also love to argue and challenge the status quo. An old Yiddish Proverb may apply here according to Rabbi Danny Siegel: "Before I begin to speak, I wish to say a few words."

Jews are often known as a verbose people who always have something to say. Our questioning God is as another rabbi states: "To be a true follower one must struggle. One must struggle to straighten the 'akov ha lev' — the crookedness of one's heart. "To struggle, to challenge God, to debate and not accept some things at face value is part of the Jewish value system. This questioning has allowed us to grow in our faith and to not accept the dogma of going on with business as usual.

We are hoping to provide a network to support those who are caring for our community and to assist our community in providing resources.

Our Tzedakah Project For The Year



La'asok B'divrei Torah

Every year for Religious School, we pick a "theme song" that expresses an idea or concept that we want the students to think about and make their own. This year's theme song is Rick Recht's "La'Asok B'divrei Torah" based on the following blessing:

Blessed are You, Adonai our God, Sovereign of the universe, Who hallows us with mitzvot, commanding us to engage with words of Torah.

La'asok B'divrei Torah is recited before studying the words of Torah because we get the opportunity to discuss and discover its meaning. It is traditionally recited before Torah study or any kind of Jewish learning commences. It is important to note that this is different from the blessing we recite before the ritual reading from the Torah ("Barchu Et Adonai Ha'M'vorach...") that our B'nei Mitzvah and their families recite during the Torah service on Shabbat.

In simple terms, the blessing thanks God for instructing us to study Torah. Many people believe that *La'asok B'divrei Torah* is the most important of all the mitzvot ("commandments") because studying Torah is how we learn what all the other mitzvot

are and how to follow them. A big debate once took place between rabbis as to which was more important — study or prayer.

And so this "prayer for study" was created, so that both could happen at the same time.

In Jewish tradition, studying is not something we do just to become more knowledgeable or learn how to behave. Judaism teaches that study is itself a spiritual act and by studying we become closer to God. We make a blessing before studying Torah to remind ourselves that we are not studying this ancient text because it is historically significant (even though it is), or is literally magnificent (even though it is), or because it helps us understand Jewish law (even though it does). We study Torah because it helps us discover meaning and purpose in life.

In religious school, we use La'asok B'divrei Torah as a launching point for learning some of the most famous prayers that come directly from Torah, like the Shema (where we proclaim that there is one God), and Mi Chamocha (the prayer that the Israelites sang as the sea miraculously split after the exodus from Egypt). Please take a moment to listen to the song here: https://youtu.be/xti0UO_ABYo. If you have a student in K-6th grade, have them teach you the hand motions so that you can participate with them at the next youth service! Until then, may you soak in the words of Torah and rejoice in its many commandments (after all, Chanukah is fast approaching, and lighting the menorah is one of the commandments!!)

When it comes to homonyms (words with the exact spelling and pronunciation but different meanings), it's the context that makes their definition clear.

The Religious Action Center's new Pennsylvania (RAC-PA) Campaign uses such a term in their just launched Campaign, JUST ELECTIONS. The Campaign includes three components:

- JUST REDISTRICTING to ensure PA maps fairly represent the majority of voters
- JUST ELECTION LAWS to eliminate barriers for a free and fair election
- JUST VOTING to register voters and get out the vote

When we hear of someone's devastating loss, a catastrophe or tragedy, our natural inclination is to ask how we can help. We hope to make a large impact in each circumstance, but a need does not have to be large to mobilize action from Congregation Beth Or's Sisterhood. All we ask is for someone to share information and be that first spark so we can shine a light on whatever the need might be and come up with a plan to address it.

Through our annual budget, supported by over 230 Sisterhood members, dues and activity fees directly support the needs of our congregation and local community partners. Sisterhood touches and supports educational, ritual and spiritual programming, such as:

- Purchasing kitchen supplies a new rolling cart, new pans
- Providing materials for Religious School students to make Yads
- Helping to off-set the cost of dinner for YOBO
- Knitting blankets, lap afghans, bears, masks, scarves and hats for cancer patients and those in the hospital
- Supplying traditional symbolic Holiday sweets like apples and honey, hamentashen, and decorating the Bimah Sukkah
- Gifting Shabbat candle sticks to B'nai Mitzvah students to use in their homes.

Sisterhood has built strong bridges with our community partners like Camp Harlem by updating tee shirts, donating school supplies to Bethlehem Baptist Church for local elementary schools, and maintaining an apartment for families in transition through the Interfaith Housing Alliance We've also coordinated collection drives for organizations sur

Interfaith Housing Alliance. We've also coordinated collection drives for organizations such as Cradles to Crayons, Our Closet, Mitzvah Circle and Laurel House in the form of clothing, accessories and gently used books.

However, not all needs are anticipated in the annual budget. This is where Sisterhood's Mitzvah Fund can be activated by the Sisterhood Executive Board. This anonymous fund is designed for a one-time monetary allotment. Most recently, this fund assisted a nurse from Camp Harlem who cares for both a disabled son and husband and was displaced from her home. Many are too proud to ask for help for themselves. Be their voice and help us help them. If you know of a circumstance where the Mitzvah Fund can be helpful, reach out to our clergy or a Sisterhood board member.

As Chanukah approaches, we remember the valuable lessons learned from the Maccabees - Hope, faith, belief in miracles, care of family and friends, learning, standing up for good, and taking the first step towards action. We light the Shamash and kindle these possibilities. We all have the calling to do what we can to create a better world. Please help Sisterhood lead the way for our children by spreading a caring and spiritual light.
