Welcoming Rabbi Jason Bonder and Rina Lebovitz To Our Community

As Jews, we revere the life and character of Moses. The rabbis of old, called him "Moshe Rabbeinu," Moses our teacher, in our sacred literature. So what characteristic do you believe he best teaches? Of all his deeds, what do you think is the most significant window into his character? Some would say his **passion and anger**. When he first saw an Egyptian taskmaster beating a Hebrew slave, he got involved and killed the taskmaster. Moses got angry a number of other times in his life. He lost his temper when the people rebelled

against him, saying that they wanted to go back to Egypt. He lost his temper when the people built a golden calf. He lashed out in anger when the people complained about the terrible conditions in Sinai. He taught us to care and to be passionate in his pursuits.

Some argue that it was his **love of justice**. He stood up to Pharaoh and demanded freedom for the oppressed. Others would argue that his prime characteristic was his **faith**. He believed in a better tomorrow and that God would fulfill the covenant and bring his oppressed people home to freedom. Still others respected him as a **teacher**. He was the one who communicated Torah to his people. He took the holy ideas from the mountain top and brought them to the people so that they could "do and understand."

Above it all, I respect Moses for his **humility**. He saw God in the common bush that was burning in the desert. I find it amazing that Moses would find the presence of God in a common ubiquitous lowly plant. Yes, it was burning, but that was not, in point of fact, that uncommon in the desert. The arid heat often would spontaneously ignite things. Moses' humility allowed him to feel God's presence in the lowest of plants; not in the mountains or in the heavens; not in the roaring seas or star-lit night sky. Moses saw the extraordinary in the ordinary bush of the desert.

All of this brings me to a singular point. We are welcoming the newest member of the Beth Or family; Rabbi Jason Bonder. He joins us with his wife, Rina and their two adorable children, Mark and Sophie. Both he and Rina have family ties in this area, so coming to Beth Or is a bit of a homecoming for them. As I discuss their arrival with many in the area, I am amazed that there are so many people who already know and are fond of them. He has a reputation for being a scholar, a great teacher, an athlete and a mensch. In the short amount of time that he has been with us, he has become an integral part of our congregational family and has blessed us with his experiences and fresh ideas.

I admire him for many reasons. Like Moses, he is faithful, passionate, caring, concerned with the welfare of others, but most of all there is a gentle/humble kindness about him. In May, he took the time to call me and offer condolences on the passing of the Reform Movement's seminary president, Aaron Panken. That tells me a great deal about this gentle soul of a rabbi.

We are delighted and honored to "welcome home" Jason and his family. May he take us to new heights and teach us in word and in deed, as did our faith's or our people's teacher, Moses.

3. Institute daily reading time and regular library visits.



This may have a ring of humor to it, but there is nothing funny about having an empty fridge any day of the week.

SOCIAL JUSTICE

"The planet's going to survive — the question is, will we?"

— Robin Bell, Professor at Columbia University's Lamont-Doherty Earth Observatory and president-elect of the American Geophysical Union

The Beth Or Social Justice Committee is committed to educating, advocating and taking action on issues aligned with Jewish values. In 2017, the Committee identified climate change as one of those issues. The plan was to focus on educating ourselves more thoroughly before moving towards advocacy and action.

Over the course of four months from December 2017 to March 2018, the Committee scheduled various opportunities to discuss "Climate of Hope" (Michael Bloomberg and Carl Pope) with fellow congregants, led by a professional facilitator. On April 13 we brought it to a close with Rear Admiral David W. Titley, Director of the Penn State Center for Solutions to Weather and Climate Risk as our Shabbat Guest Speaker.

An abundance of information addressed the immediate nature of this global condition which requires our attention. Below are selected highlights to spur us to action:

1. It starts with each of us. We can vote for elected leaders who support issues vital for a cleaner and safer environment We can make an impact on local representatives by making our voices heard. We can make lifestyle changes that will lead to a healthier and sustaining society.



- **2.** Michael Bloomberg helped launch the Global Covenant of Mayors for Climate and Energy because he believed that cities and municipalities may be poised to respond more directly and expediently than the national government This organization covers "7400 cities and local governments from six continents and 121 countries representing more than 600 million residents." (*globalcovenantofmayors. org*) Philadelphia Mayor Jim Kenney is a member of the Covenant of Mayors.
- **3.** Multiple factors contribute to personal carbon footprints and those generated by utilities, transportation, food production, manufacturing, and other sectors of the economy. We should boldly approach those factors that are manageable and view them as solution-based, rather than turn a blind eye.
- **4.** Climate change has occurred (past tense). Today's conversation must include a snapshot of where we are as a precursor to discussing what the future looks like and what improvements we can make. NASA has developed an astounding 36-second visual that puts us all on the same page. To view, search online: NASA global climate change 1880-2017.
- **5.** On April 19, the American Lung Association released its 'State of the Air 2018' which reported that the U.S. experienced an increase in ozone pollution. Closer to home, Philadelphia, Montgomery, Bucks, Chester and Delaware Counties were assigned an 'F' grade for ozone pollution. This grade raises the risk for various populations, such as the elderly, children, asthma-sufferers, and persons with COPD.

Where To Go From Here

We suggest that each of us measure our carbon footprint today and repeat this exercise a year from now. An online carbon footprint calculator may be found by searching 'carbon footprint calculator'.

We encourage you to become familiar with the EPA (epa.gov/energy-independence) and views that counter their actions (e.g., rac.org/environment).

Andrea and I were fortunate to spend two weeks seeing a good portion of the country not from a bus tour but rather through the eyes of a guide steeped in 67 years of citizenship as a Sabra. We saw the usual requisite sites as first timers but it was the unusual that made our experience memorable. We stood on the top of Masada and visited an area where an ancient synagogue once existed. Inside a small cave was an elderly scribe working on a Torah scroll. I spoke Hebrew to him and he spoke English to me. Along the road we saw an old original McDonald's with the golden arches. In the middle of what seemed like "no man's land" with dust flying everywhere, we enjoyed malabi custard on a hot day served from a shack. Andrea and I also sat at the edge of a cliff overlooking beautiful sparkling water sipping homemade limoncello and eating pita we bought from an Arab farm stand. Finally, we ate in an Arab restaurant in Haifa and WE were the ONLY Jews there. What an experience!

Then, The Miracle in The Dessert occurred. Our guide Arik said it rarely ever rains in the Negev at the end of April. He was beside himself. Not only did it rain, it flooded areas causing destruction and unfortunately the death of nine teens. We witnessed torrents and traveled roads covered with debris of rock and mud. But... through all the devastation we witnessed the miracle of growth. In the middle of useless arid land, vast areas of green fields and forests sprout. Israel has turned a desert of nothing into everything imaginable. Truly a miracle.

Miracles occur every day. As Brotherhood President I have also been privileged this year to witness the miracle of growth in your children at our Religious School. I had the privilege to present all third-grade students their new siddur as they begin studying towards their B'nai Mitzvah. Brotherhood is proud to donate these books on behalf of our organization. Likewise, I have witnessed your children maturing into teens during Confirmation services. All of your children are part of the miracle to sustain Judaism for future generations.

While summertime is lazy and hazy, our members will be busy working with Aaron and Jillian to expand our reach and support them with new and exciting programs. Your children are the miracle at Beth Or and Brotherhood is a part of that.
