RABBI'S MESSAGE:

Sounds of Silence

לזכות ר' ראובן אליהו בן חוה לאה לרפ"ש בתשח"י

I am sure many of you have noticed over these last few weeks an almost eerie silence. Rarely to we hear planes flying overhead. The cacophony of cars and trucks, honking and racing down the streets, have been mostly quieted. You can almost hear yourself think!

Even more stressful is the frustrating silence from the voices of enthused Tefillah; spirited learning; children playing, in our Shuls, and the joyous sounds of camaraderie and friendship that have mostly been stilled.

Last year I authored a dvar Torah that now seems almost prophetic in its relevance. I make no claim to prophecy other than in the spirit of the Talmud's quote in the name of Rabbi Yochanan who said, "from the day that the Temple was destroyed, prophecy was taken away from the prophets and given to fools and children!"

The uplifting words from the Chosid Yaavetz speak directly to us. His novel hypothesis resolves our great exasperation of having been deprived of the power of communal prayer and provides great comfort.

I share it anew with slight additions in the hope that it may encourage us all in these trying times.

There are four strata of life forms: דומם - mineral, צומח - vegetable, יחי - animal, and - מדבר - speaker/man.

Man's stature is defined by his ability to express himself verbally.

This appellation of honor conferred on man is that of מדבר, literally a talker or speaker.

Does that define him properly?

Aren't his actions louder than any words he could elegantly utter?

Why do we focus specifically on that quality?

True it is the faculty of speech that is unique to man, but more so is his ability to make choices exercising his free-will that ultimately determines more accurately his greatness. Speech is merely a tool that displays the underlying character, not the defining quality itself.

Even more perplexing is the accenting of this trait in the episode of Nadav and Avihu, when Aharon after the tragic death of his dear sons, his greatness is expressed not as much by what was 'spoken', but by what was squelched.

The exact depiction here is אהרנ, and Aharon was silent.

A similar use of this term is found in Eichah.

(ישב בדד וידם כי נטל עליו (איכה ג cone sit in solitude and be silent, for He has laid it upon him.

Ostensibly this verse describes one who has met misfortune who silently sits alone bemoaning the fate that has befallen him.

This verse though is interpreted in Pirkei Avos as referring to an individual who is bereft of a partner to study Torah with, who despite his isolation nevertheless devotes himself to thoughtful meditation and is promised a reward that 'He has laid upon him'. (אבות ג ג)

The Chosid Yaavetz expands the understanding of this in a most

profound way.

This is not simply a promise of reward.

Studying the verses preceding, the prophet extols the great kindness of G-d that never cease, renewing them each day. This, he avers, refers to a society who devote themselves to striving for perfection collectively, supporting one another in that goal.

But then the verse transitions to one who finds himself alone and isolated, discouraged in his ability to accomplish his noble goals solo.

To him the prophet encourages, "G-d is good to those who place trust in Him. Even when you feel dejected and lonely know that in your devoted silence you will persevere."

The prophet emphasizes, **כי נטל עליו**, "be ennobled by the fact that the mission **is placed upon you**, G-d knows that you are capable and is counting on you to achieve your destined greatness."

The Chosid adds, a message directed to us:

The Holy Baal HaTanya interprets the term מדבר, not as one who speaks, but rather in the spirit of the root ידברי which means to 'lead', accentuating a person who 'leads the entire universe by his credo and deed'.

In the face of tragedy, especially loss, one often gets discouraged, forgetting one's mission in life, mistakenly assuming one can't do it alone. The greatness of Aharon wasn't that he felt no pain, but that he maintained his momentum in knowing that each one of us alone is responsible for our fate, to elevate the universe towards devotion to that One above that beckons us towards personal greatness.

A wonderful member of our Shul shared with me that in these days of isolation, where she was unable to interact and dote on her beloved children and grandchildren as she normally does, she devoted extra time, energy and concentration to her prayers and the reciting of Tehillim. She expressed that she discovered new layers of depth and connection in her tefillos that she never experienced and committed to maintaining that in the future. She felt elevated and closer to Hashem than ever before, and thankful for the loneliness that brought her to this privilege!

In the silent marching forward, tackling the tasks at hand with a resolve that despite our losses we can each bring the world to its purpose, even alone, lays our greatness that gives us the right, nay the privilege, to utilize the strata beneath us in bringing us ever closer to G-d.

We must stay on track no matter what comes our way, knowing the He has faith in us to accomplish our goals, and may we never lapse in faith in ourselves.
