Rabbi's Ramblings

Rabbi Bennett Greenspon

I am assuming that the war in Ukraine is still going on as this is being read. As I write this note the war has become a little bit more meaningful to me on a personal level. No, I have not been personally affected; I know no one personally who has been hurt. Yes, we as a congregation have been helping the agencies who have been trying to get our Jewish brothers and sisters out. Yes, we have taken into our school a little girl whose family, mother and siblings, have left. Yes, sadly, dad has had to stay behind to fight for his home and homeland. It has become a little more personal because of family history.

My cousin called me the other day and told me that the town that some of my grandparents came from, or at least lived in, before they began the journey to Canada and then the U.S. had been bombed. Bombed may be an understatement. What if they had not made that journey? Would they have been killed in WWII? Would I be fighting Russian forces today? Would my kids?

The war has also shown me how important the State of Israel is for Jews. Yes, I may not agree with all of the policies of the Israeli government; yes, I may see many flaws and failures in Israeli society i.e. the huge economic gap between the haves and the have nots or the animosity between the religious streams. But there is no doubt in my mind that at a time like this, having a place where Jews can get shelter, where Jews can immigrate and be saved without worrying about quotas, income, educational background or any other criteria is paramount. The Law of Return states that anyone who has at least one Jewish grandparent (taken from the Nazi era) or who has converted to Judaism (from whatever religious stream) can come home to the Jewish state. Had such a state existed back in the thirties who knows how many lives would have been saved?

Mark Cherendoff recently wrote: Eighty years ago, as Jews tried to flee the war raging in Europe, they had nobody to turn to and nowhere to go. Even if they could escape, almost no place in the world would accept them. The existence of the State of Israel guarantees there will be no repetition of that tragedy.

At this writing, as war rages in Ukraine, Jews are once again on the run, trying to flee another evil tyrant. But today they are greeted by volunteers holding signs under a giant Israeli flag, directing them to food and shelter. And for those who wish, there is also a flight to Israel, where a new life and new hope awaits them. Zionism is not about a "safe space" for Jews. Zionism is about creating a real home for Jews — the kind of home Robert Frost had in mind when he wrote, "when you have to go there, they have to take you in."

Mr. Cherendoff goes on to say about the State of Israel and his feelings about it even as it struggles to be a light to the nations and one that struggles to embody Jewish ideals: I'm going to celebrate Israel's achievements and ache in its suffering. I'm going to take pride in Israeli Olympians competing in sports I otherwise don't care about. I'm going to sing secular Israeli songs that quote the Psalms and watch excellent (and not-so-excellent) television shows produced in Israel. I'm going to dedicate my energy to the success of this grand national project of the Jewish people and do everything I can to ensure that our children do the same.

Many who know me know that I love old school folk music. I am always up to join a Hootin Annie, a gathering of people to sing folk music. Folk music is a genre of music usually passed down in oral traditions from various cultures, regions and societies throughout the world.



At Hootin' Annies, when we got together to play our instruments and sing, we often sung songs about fighting for freedoms and rights for everyone. I recall singing one folk song in particular at camp, growing up, around the campfire, on Friday nights.

I'm on my way to the freedom land.
I'm on my way, Great God, I'm on my way.
I'll ask my family, if they'll go with me.
If they say no, I'll go anyhow.
I'm on my way, Great God, I'm on my way.

Freedom and making our way to the freedom land, captures two themes that we find in Passover. It is a holiday about freedom from both physical and mental slavery. This theme, woven throughout our history, requires us to always remember that we were once slaves in Egypt and that we should be fighting for freedoms, for ourselves and others, today.

Rabbi Jonathan Sacks (z"l) once wrote, "The message of Passover remains as powerful as ever. Freedom is won not on the battlefield but in the classroom and the home. Teach your children the history of freedom if you want them never to lose it."

The v'ahavta is a prayer talking about teaching our children. This means our values and how to live them out in everything that we do. All the more so, with all taking place in the world, we must teach the importance of freedom.

May your Passover be filled with learning, discussion and blessings.

The Passover story is chock full of excitement! Miracles galore, plagues, an uprising against a world power, the parting of the Sea, celebrations of freedom...

Here are some interesting and perhaps "not so well known" heroines who helped save our leader Moses' life along his way. Included are some interesting ways to include their memory and incredible examples of bravery in your Seder...

During the past few years it has become popular for many people to honor Miriam, sister of Moses, with the "Kos Miriam" (Miriam's cup). It was Miriam who watched over her baby brother Moses after their mother put him in a basket in the Nile to avoid his certain death as a Hebrew baby boy. Later, after the crossing of the Sea into freedom, it was Miriam and the women who led the celebrations in song and dance throughout the night.

• Your family could start a tradition of playing the most joyful music you can find and dancing around the table while singing and playing instruments, after drinking from "Kos Miriam", of course.

Two very brave Jewish women who don't get remembered as much are Shifra and Puah, the two brave Hebrew midwives who had the incredible courage to disobey Pharaoh and refuse to kill Jewish baby boys they had delivered, as Pharaoh had decreed.

 One way to honor them at your Seder table is to place a picture of someone in your family, or perhaps from history, who demonstrated bravery amidst oppression, and tell their story as well as the story of these two brave women who were willing to sacrifice their own lives for others.

Yocheved, mother of Moses, saved his life by hiding him as a baby for three months. Then, when she feared he was getting too old to hide, she placed him in a basket in the Nile, hoping someone kind would find him and allow him to live. Pharaoh's daughter ended up doing exactly that.

You can honor Yocheved during your Seder by sharing stories of things your mothers did for you as you
were growing up.

Then there was Pharaoh's daughter, who found baby Moses floating down the Nile in the basket, surmised that he was Hebrew, and yet still adopted him and raised him in the palace of the Pharaoh.

You can place, on the table, either a pacifier, a small basket, or any baby accessory to symbolize this brave act of saving Moses' life once again.

May your Seders be meaningful and joyful celebrations of freedom!

Let's Get Moving In Kindergarten



Beth Emet School students learn a vast number of subjects. Language Arts, Math, Science, Social Studies, STEM, Reading, Writing, Hebrew, Art, Music, Agronomy, Israeli Dance, P.E., and Chess are all part of our fun and educational weekly curriculum. We are busy bees learning all day, Monday through Friday, from 8:30 a.m. - 3:30 p.m. It is important to keep our students engaged and having fun during every lesson. As teachers, attending professional development conferences, reading articles, and learning from experience, has provided us the best way to keep our students interested and focused. We can't expect our students (especially kindergarteners) to sit down at a

table all day and enjoy learning. We understand that

movement is essential. Not only does it provide health benefits, such as exercise and fine motor skills, but it is also a powerful teaching tool for the brain. Research has shown time and again that children need opportunities to move in class. Memory and movement are linked, and the body is a tool of learning, not a roadblock to or a detour away from it. By incorporating movement-based activities

into our daily lessons, we are allowing our students to absorb new information and ideas, like the human sponges that they are!

What exactly is movement-based learning? Movement-based learning is any activity that involves movement. Lessons can vary from simple movement, such as clapping your hands for the number of syllables in a word to harder movement, such as learning an entire math lesson from a dance. In kindergarten, more movement = more fun and learning! There are an infinite amount of learning activities that can be incorporated into the classroom. We play sight word games, such as Sight Word Swat. In





this activity, each student receives a fly swatter and sight words are placed on the floor. When the teacher calls out a word, our students have to move all around the room to try and find the word. When the word is found, that student has to swat it with their swatter. They then have to pick it up, spell it, and repeat the word. We are so fortunate to live in South Florida where the weather is beautiful year-round. Often, we take our learning outside. In Math, we draw number lines on the sidewalk when practicing addition, subtraction, and skip counting. Our students take turns solving different equations and hopping to various numbers, while learning and having fun!

Movement in our school is not limited to just Language Arts and Math. In Hebrew class, we create Hebrew letters with our bodies. In Science, we go on nature walks and conduct many different experiments. In Agronomy we plant, water, and take care of our garden. We also have P.E. and Israeli

Dance where they are moving during the entire duration of class. All day long we provide engaging lessons to our students that allow them to have fun and learn at the same time.

Making Learning Visible

On Thursday February 24, the teachers from our Beth Emet Early Childhood Center came together to show families how young children learn in our Reggio Emilia-inspired school. Each classroom created a table outside

of their room that showed amazing documentation, work samples and photos of children learning through play. The effort they put into their displays was tremendous. They work so hard each day to create a developmentally-appropriate learning environment for all of our students. We showed highlights of our learning experiences.

Some of our documentation highlighted how early childhood students thrive with sensory exploration. When our school celebrates the Jewish holidays, we know building on their sensory exploration adds to the joy of learning. As we explored Tu B'Shevat, the classes were able to touch, scoop, and feel soil. Tu B'Shevat is the birthday of the trees...what better way to bring them closer to this holiday, than to feel the soil from which our trees grow? When we explored the farm, books came out and then came the oats - from literacy, to creative play, then back to sensory we headed! We scooped and poured and perhaps a few oats landed on the floor! When we make playdough with our students we often ask, "What



will happen if we add a little more flour or water?" We experiment with different amounts. Some days it is slimy and somedays it is doughier; we notice which textures we like to touch and we notice which textures we could fold more. We notice the impact of measurements. When we see what the students love we know a new sensory experience will arise.

We showed photos that showcased how we build a love of learning with our loose parts exploration. As children explore with loose parts we see curiosity, capability, inquiry, growth motor strengthening, pre-writing skills, compassion and so much joy! In our open-ended class environment their opportunity to manipulate and

move materials allows them to problem solve, and think critically. We see that they are learning everything we want them to learn organically. They are independently guiding their learning.

We see our students as competent and capable individuals, key components of the Reggio Emilia philosophy. As we create a garden because they asked, as we design a ballet opera house with magna tiles because they showed an interest, and as we build, design and manipulate boxes because they are interested, we know we are on a path that allows for amazing learning opportunities to happen each and every day! We listen, we observe, we reflect, we collaborate, and then we plan the best learning possible!

Thank you Beth Emet ECC staff members for supporting an environment that lifts children up and celebrates critical thinking and problem solving.

Mr. Silvio impressed us with his ability to include every participant, from children to adults, in English and in

The temple has been " a second home for us." It provides spirituality, education and encourages philanthropy. My father—in—law was put into a concentration camp at age /3. He spent '4 years there and lost most of his family. It is imperative that we ensure the survival of our Jewish communities and remind future generations that they "must never forget these horrible atrocities." I served on the board at the temple and later became its president. I encourage everyone to give back, perform Mitzvot and to give a gift to the Life and Legacy campaign.

Chloe Barkey






