Rabbi's Ramblings

It has happened to all of us. We are in line waiting for the cashier to ring up our order and the customer a few people ahead of us is jabbering away with the clerk. We are getting really impatient, after all we have our afternoon workout waiting.

We finally get to the checkout and before we can say anything the clerk says to us "Poor Mrs. Cohen, she lives alone, no children, she is widowed and her twin sister just died and she can't get to the funeral." You have been standing there stewing and were about to give it to the clerk but how do you feel now?

Or maybe you get to the clerk and see that it was not Mrs. Cohen who is suffering but the clerk who is dabbing her eyes as she rings up your purchase. She too has just suffered a loss but because she is scheduled and her boss is inconsiderate, she has to finish her shift. How do you feel now? It's not my problem you say to yourself or do you offer a word or two of sympathy?

It has happened to all of us. We are waiting in line for the cashier to ring up our order and the person being served is berating the poor guy. He is cursing him out for a small mistake. Do you feel uncomfortable? Do you slyly smile to yourself and say let him have it, this place is really bad? Or do you ask the customer to please not be so rude? If the place is so bad why does he keep coming back there? And when you finally get to the clerk do you apologize to him for someone else's poor behavior or at least offer him some comfort? It's not his fault that the scanner isn't working or that the return policy is that you can't return used merchandise.

It will happen to all of us. You are a bit down and want some human contact and you get to the checkout and the machine says, "Begin scanning now. Put your item in the bag." And all you want is a "Good morning Mrs. Cohen." How do you feel now?

It will happen to all of us. You get to the checkout and the self-scanner scans your face and says, "Mr. Cohen, do you think you can afford that jar of peanut butter? My A.I. says that you are going to be fired this morning." How do you feel now?

Rabbi's Writings

Why did the Matzah cross the road? To get covered in road salt so it would taste better. (Or chocolate, or butter, or charoset or hummus, or pizza sauce, or anything.)

Passover is a holiday that commemorates the liberation of the Israelites from slavery in ancient Egypt and takes place on the 15th of Nisan. Passover has four names.

The first name is Chag Ha-Matzot/ חג המצות (the Festival of Matzah). This is the holiday when we eat matzah, as we are commanded in the Torah to do this. It represents the speed in which we left Egypt.

Another name is Chag Ha-Pesach / חג הפסח (the Festival of Passover). During the final plague, the death of the first born, our ancestors were told to place blood of a lamb on the doorpost so the Angel of Death would pass over the houses of the Hebrews. In addition, there is a sacrifice called the paschal sacrifice, which was traditionally done on the evening of Passover.

The third name is Chag Ha-Aviv / חג האביב (the Springtime Festival). There are four new year celebrations in Judaism. Two of them are Rosh Hashanah and Passover. Rosh Hashana is literally the head of the year, when we begin the new Jewish year. Passover is when spring begins, a time of renewal of nature.

The final name is Chag Ha-Cherut / חג החירות (the Festival of Freedom). This name comes from our people going from slavery to freedom. Freedom is conceptually easy and practically challenging. By supporting freedom, it allows others to do and express something that you may disagree with. Rabbi Jonathan Sacks wrote,

Freedom is won, not on the battlefield, nor in the political arena, but in human imagination and will. To defend a land, you need an army. But to defend freedom, you need education.

This last name for Passover, Festival of Freedom, challenges us on how to truly observe the essence of this holiday. Freedom is not merely about enjoying our freedom and ensuring that you and I are free. Maya Angelou wrote, "The truth is, no one of us can be free until everybody is free." All of us must act to strive for everyone's freedom, everywhere. While fighting for freedom for all can start at home, it must spread out globally, even to those whose definitions of freedom differ from ours. Only then can we truly be free.

"The cause of freedom, and the cause of peace are bound together." - Anonymous



Poetry and Creative Writing in Middle School

For the second year in a row, our middle school has dedicated one special day to celebrating the joy of poetry together. Through a variety of challenges, games, and projects, the students explored sensory language,



poetic elements, and close reading. They also demonstrated their facility with these poetic techniques by composing poetry of their own in their poetry notebooks, which the students personalized and utilized to hold all their writing and work for the day. Though each year's activities are unique, the goal for Poetry Day continues to be the same—to make poetry engaging and entertaining!

This year we kicked off the day with a poetry escape room. Students were organized by *mishpachot* (families) and provided with four distinct challenges to solve. The goal of each activity was to reveal a secret word, the letters of which corresponded to symbols they would need later to solve the final

challenge and "escape." The first challenge asked that, given cards with excerpts from various poems, the students categorize the cards according to which of the five senses the description evoked. If categorized successfully on a sensory chart, the answers would reveal secret words. The second challenge was a poetic elements challenge in which students determined the meter, syllables, rhyme, and repetition of various



poems. The correct answers revealed an additional secret word. Next, students completed a close reading challenge in which they were given a specific poem to analyze in detail. If they answered questions about this poem correctly, the answers revealed yet another secret word. With each additional code word received, students were able to identify the letter represented by the given symbols. Armed with this hard-won knowledge, students were finally ready to complete the final challenge—to translate to standard English a poem expressed entirely in

code. If any group got stuck, teachers were ready with bonus clue cards to help get them back on track. The students enjoyed working together to solve these challenges, which not only allowed them to draw on the knowledge of poetry they've been studying in class but also engaged their problem solving and cooperative learning skills.



After the escape room, students had a chance to express themselves through poetry. They wrote an "I Am" poem expressing various aspects of their personalities and a "My Selfie" poem to portray their family culture in concrete details. For both of these poems, students were able to use the pages provided in their poetry notebooks to convert their poems into an art piece.

To pick up the pace again, we played various games, including Figurative Language Bingo and Literary Lyrics. Often, students are intimidated by poetry, but these activities not only made poetry accessible to the students but also reminded them that poetry is all around us—in the songs we sing, in the food we eat, and in the joy we take in each other.

Early Childhood Center





Each day our teachers take notes on children's experiences. We call these "observations," which we then turn into what is called a "Learning Story." As we work hard to capture the essence of each child in our school, we learn about children and their development, and about our teaching practices - what works, what doesn't, and what we should focus on and reinforce each day.



This month the children ages 3 and 4 years old showed the value of their school experience and group play:

Three friends were sitting in the class library. One friend walked over and looked around and said, "There is no room for me." In the past our staff may have jumped forward to help the children problem solve and be there for each other. We have been practicing the art of giving the children the opportunity to work this out independent of their teachers. When the student said this another student responded, "What can we do?" Together they sat for a moment, and they all looked around the room when one of the students said, "Let's go there," as he pointed to a spot in the room that had space for all of them! They all agreed and moved to this new spot. Many different situations may have

occurred. Maybe they would not have made space or they would have had a different idea. In this situation they welcomed the fourth friend. They did make space, and we made space as staff to believe in them.

As they continued playing one child said "Who wants to come to my house?" The friends all yelled, "Me!!!" Then he counted, "1,2,3,4," and said, "Ok, four friends." Another friend said, "Let me count, too," and then he counted. They returned to playing when one friend said, "My name starts with "G." Each child then shared the first letter of his or her name. It was wonderful to see the beauty of the emergent curriculum. They included numbers and letters in their play as they often do. It was relevant and had meaning to them. Numbers and letters applied in a meaningful play experience allow for retention and builds a strong understanding of numerical and alphabetical knowledge that can be used throughout their school experiences. This happens all of the time in play. How many? How do you spell...? What letter is this? They ask many questions



as they make sense of their world. When we listen closely we can facilitate and build on this knowledge.

As they were playing, a student picked up an animal and said, "Look." No one responded. The student sat for a moment and then he held up two animals to one of the friends and said, "Which one do you want?" When the friend picked one he said, "We are friends, right?" He tried to speak to the group, and when no one answered he singled out one friend and gave him choices. This student showed what happens when you continue to seek connection in group play. As he had no response to his verbal request he moved on to another strategy to connect. He then asked for a verbal confirmation of friendship to possibly reinforce his connection. His perseverance in having his emotional needs met was a wonderful skill to see.

These play experiences give our students opportunities to strengthen their relationships while building amazing skills. We value all of the learning in our classrooms. From letters and numbers to the way we build relationships and so much more, we see the value in these experiences as we embrace the way children learn!
