Rabbi Frank DeWoskin

I have shared in the past that my first trip to Israel was when I moved there for a year, at the start of rabbinical school. I reflect back on the idea of moving somewhere I've never been and I think about how crazy that was, especially considering the fact that my parents still live in the house I was born into.



When I first arrived in Israel and I walked off the plane, I stepped onto the tarmac and took a shuttle to the terminal to go through customs. When I visited several years later, we walked right off the plane into a jet-way and were already in the airport's terminal. Israel is a continually modernizing country that also has a great deal of history.

One of my favorite activities when I lived in Israel was going on an archaeological dig. I still love that activity when I visit Israel on tours. Participating in a dig allows one to imagine and attempt to understand what came before us. There is always history waiting to be discovered. After the dig, I worked for a while in the archaeological department. It felt like I was working on an ancient puzzle trying to put pieces of pottery back together. I went from there to my modern apartment and continued my studies.

Travelling throughout the country is an exciting way to discover the Israel of yesterday, today and tomorrow. In one day you can walk on the field where David slew Goliath, learn about Israeli technology that is changing the world and eat at an upscale restaurant in a bustling city that was around hundreds of years ago. The 1902 statue of Rodin's, "The Thinker", was sculpted long before the introduction of common core math or Dr. Seuss rhyming books. What do you think the man was thinking about? Was he trying to solve a problem?

We've come a long way since "The Thinker" and realized the importance of teaching our students the art of critical thinking and strategies.

Strategies are tools we use to help children learn to find answers in every possible subject, from language arts and math to the sciences and social situations. By exploring various techniques, they arrive at solutions that are most helpful to them. For example, in First Grade math, the students use strategies to find the answers to addition and subtraction problems - counting on or back, using a number line, drawing pictures, using manipulatives, etc.

In Language Arts, they learn to sound out words, answer questions, predict outcomes, find keywords, and form opinions. They also use critical thinking strategies to answer comprehension questions.

Throughout the school day, First Graders apply strategies to help them deal with everyday situations. "What's the best way to climb the rock wall? How many friends should push the Merry-go-round? How can we fairly choose a goalie? He hurt my feelings, what can I do?" Children who can solve problems independently by using strategies will feel more confident.

The ultimate goal of strategizing is to help our students think for themselves. Children who are independent thinkers and solve problems on their own, are more successful in the real world than those who are given the answers.



The art of gratitude...

Throughout the year we celebrate many different holidays with our students. Our focus on each holiday is the morals and values we take away from the story/history of that holiday. Chanukah is no different. The story of Chanukah conveys the message of religious freedom and choice and the right to say no to assimilation.

To teach these values to children ages 5 and under is no easy task. But it is one we tackle with all of our hearts. We each know the value of learning these lessons. We want all of our children to live in a world where they feel they have the choices and rights our country has fought for. We have the right to say yes or no to assimilation. We have the right to choose our religion. We have the right to be who we want to be, or in their mind, we have the right to say "I'm Chanukah, you're Christmas." For young children this is often the beginning of finding and understanding their identity.



We begin by reading the story of Chanukah in class. Then the children have the opportunity to act it out. We role play the various parts, and



practice standing up for what we believe in. It is with great joy that we watch the children begin to act it out on their own. From the block center to the playground we will hear the words, "Who wants to be the Maccabees?"

As you prepare for the holiday in your house and you shop for presents I hope you have a chance to reflect on the true meaning of the holiday. Sometimes the holiday exchange can become the only focus. If you sit down for your holiday meal you can talk about the story, or a story that comes from your

family's personal history. Together we can continue to instill these important values in our children.

And, of course, there is the dreaded dren's response is disheartening. Sometimes

gift giving where our children's response is disheartening. Sometimes they don't like the gift they are given and they throw it or cry or sulk. We may ask ourselves "Why do they behave so ungratefully?" This year let's ask ourselves "How can I teach them to be grateful?" This can be a hard part. I remember feeling so disappointed and frustrated with my children. Many parents have talked with me about the guilt they feel for working and for being away from their child while they are at school. We cannot let our guilt impede us from being a good parent. Children can understand they don't have to like the gift, but there is an appropriate way to respond. We will teach it in class, you will teach it at home and together we will teach the art of gratitude.






