Let me begin by wishing all of you and all of us a Happy New Year. I hope, as do we all, that 2022 will be a year of joy, a year where we can go back to shaking hands and giving hugs, a year where we can all gather without fear of illness, and a year where we all respect each other.

Last week we read in the Torah about the death of Jacob. As Jacob prepared to die he taught us an important lesson and left us with a mitzvah to do for our kids. He taught us that we all need to bless those that we love: our kids, our friends, our significant others and even our co-workers.

But the way that Jacob did his blessings led to a dispute among the sages. You see, Jacob didn't just bless his sons, he also in some ways castigated them. He pointed out their strengths and also their weaknesses as well as their misdeeds.

In looking at the portion, the House of Shammai said that we "should describe the bride as she truly is" while the House of Hillel said that we "should describe the bride as beautiful." What are they saying? Shammai is saying that we should be brutally honest and tell the truth no matter the consequences. Hillel is saying something different i.e. that we should worry about people's feelings.

Here are some questions for you to ponder:

How does this translate into our day and age? Is it okay to lie? Have you ever lied? Do we tell the truth differently face to face than we do on social media? What other questions does this elicit? Are all brides beautiful? Are all grandchildren geniuses?

Again, have a great year and continue to be safe.

Rabbi's Writings

Rabbi Frank DeWoskin

When you celebrate an event, how do you do so? Is it marked alone, with a small group or with the world?



When we commemorate the Jewish New Year we often celebrate with family or our greater Jewish community. We sing, pray and eat. Sometimes when we ring in the secular New Year, we do so with a group of friends or family. We have silly rituals, like staying awake until midnight to see a ball drop and kissing a loved one at midnight. If you have ever observed the new year of the trees, Tu B'shevat, we often take time out in nature, plant trees, eat food that comes from trees and take part in other outdoor activities. We will be hosting a Tu B'shevat Palooza on January 23. It will be an amazing experience for you to join together to mark the holiday. More details about this event can be found on page 10.

When we celebrate life cycle events we do so with food, blessings, reflection and community gathering. These might include a baby naming, circumcision, consecration/ta'am shel d'vash (beginning of formal learning/a taste of honey), a bar/bat mitzvah, confirmation, a wedding and even a funeral. Most of these celebrations are positive, significant moments in one's life. A funeral, while sad, is still a celebration of one's life.

While we continue to experience a global pandemic, we work hard to find ways to celebrate everything and anything...and it is hard. This challenge goes for every family celebrating any life cycle event and for all of us celebrating some kind of holiday or new year.

Sarah and I are blessed that our daughters are becoming b'not mitzvah at the end of January. While we were able to celebrate in person with so many of you at our son's bar mitzvah service, at this time we have to celebrate with our Temple family digitally and not in person. We are fortunate that we have the technology to make this happen. While we are sad that we are not able to all be together in person, we hope that you are able to join in this virtual communal celebration of our daughters becoming adults in their Jewish experience.

One day, post pandemic, wouldn't it be great to attend a huge gala with a theme of life celebration? For now, we appreciate the scaled down festivities as we continue to live each moment, being a part of the holy community of Temple Beth Emet, working hard to celebrate with you for so many events.

Art is crucial to our individual growth and development. Creative expression lowers stress, improves our memory, and makes us feel happier.



The artist Wassily Kandinsky said, "Everything starts from a dot." So that is where we began. As we learned about the artist and his work, we were inspired by circles and dots, and made incredible creations. Next, we examined large clusters of dots and studied the art of Georges Seurat, the genius behind pointillism. Amazing landscapes came to life using Q-tips as paint brushes and lots and lots of dots. What about lines? The art of Piet Mondrian was our next featured artist and inspired bold, beautiful abstract works of bright colors set in bold, black lines. Amazing! We are starting a unit on "Pop Art" with colorful paper tiles emulating the works of Pablo Picasso.

As students learn about Agronomy and become caretakers of our garden space, our art projects reflected their enthusiasm. Kindergarten created sun catchers, first grade made awesome pink flamingos and second grade created beautiful birds. Third grade showed us the beauty of butterflies and fourth grade made hydroponics come to life in fabulous water-colored vases with plants. The fifth-grade owls are unique and gorgeous. Their "Save the Ocean" drawings will be outstanding when completed.

All will soon be on display outside the Agronomy area. So, keep a look out for your child's creative inspirations.

Miss Joan's Chanukah Legacy Lives On

There are many important concepts we teach throughout the course of a Pre-K year. Staying true to our Reggio-inspired philosophy, these lessons often evolve naturally. Chanukah was quickly approaching, so we created a Chanukah-inspired invitation and asked the children what they know about this Jewish holiday. They excitedly began talking all about the eight nights of presents they would receive. I posed the question, "How would it make you feel to give a gift instead of get one during one of the nights?" Not a single child could articulate that feeling and most had a look of surprise on their faces at the prospect of missing out on a Chanukah present. I told them about a family tradition we had in my house that was inspired by Miss Joan and her JAFCO dreidel board. Each year, my three children would pick a dreidel that had a child's name, age, and gift they wanted written on it. We would shop for the gifts together and, as we lit the Chanukah candles on the night that coincided with Shabbat, our kids did not receive a Chanukah gift. Instead, we thought about the mitzvah of bringing happiness to others.

A few hours later, I found myself sitting in our weekly PreK Team meeting with Miss Robin and Miss Dina. They posed the question, "What do you want your focus to be during Thanksgiving and Chanukah?" I immediately had my answer!

We were going to do a Chanukah Mitzvah project in our class that would not only allow them to experience the joy of giving to others but would help Miss Joan's JAFCO Chanukah drive live on! When I returned from my meeting, I gathered the children together to tell them about the idea. We would collect tzedakah over the next few weeks and then shop on Amazon to pick out presents that the children in JAFCO hoped to receive. The cheers that erupted from this amazing group of children let me know immediately that this project would be a huge success because it was something that interested them greatly.

Our class parents, and even grandparents, were excited to help us with this mitzvah project. They could see how important it was to their children. Over the next several days, the children proudly began filling



our tzedakah box with coins and bills of various denominations. We quickly got to work sorting and counting the change. It was easy to identify the coins by name and recall the value of each coin because it was so meaningful to the children. We sorted the quarters into groups of four to make a dollar. Dimes were stacked into groups of ten to make a dollar. We counted by fives and learned that 20 nickels equal one dollar. Pennies were also placed into stacks of ten and we counted ten groups of ten pennies, or 100 pennies, to equal to one dollar. Likewise, when counting the paper money, we learned about equivalent amounts and how to add them up. In the end, the class had donated so much tzedakah, we needed a calculator to find the sum. To our absolute joy and amazement, we had collected a total of \$267.57! Best of all, our other PreK classes began collecting for the JAFCO drive, too!

The children thought carefully about which gifts to purchase from the JAFCO wish list. Since they love to locate countries on our classroom globe, they put a globe in the Amazon shopping cart. One child picked out a tree lamp thinking it would be helpful if someone is afraid of the dark. Many of them love video games so they bought one of those too. They also purchased pajamas and toys for children of various ages and genders. Many parents expressed their gratitude for doing this Mitzvah project and let us know that our focus on giving back had already made a huge impact on their children. We observed a similar change in our classroom climate, as sweet acts kindness towards one another increased.

After the first night of Chanukah, I asked the children how it made them feel when they imagined the JAFCO kids opening the presents we bought for them. Their answers were similar, "It made my heart feel warm and happy!" I know Miss Joan would be so proud!

Making Connections Across The Ocean

What does it mean to be part of a global Jewish community? How can we show our students that they are part of a larger Jewish community beyond Broward County? For over a decade our Merkaz Limud 6th grade students have been participating in Partnership2Gether - a wonderful program sponsored by The Jewish Agency for Israel & the Jewish Federation of Broward County. Partnership2Gether is a school twinning experience that affords our students the opportunity to virtually interact with 6th Grade students in Nesher, Israel. The purpose of twinning is to help bridge the gap of understanding between our students and their counterparts in Israel and to bring both sides together in the spirit of our Jewish faith. It also celebrates our rich heritage, our differences, and the culture that unites us all. We are very proud that our students are part of the 46 different partnerships between Jewish schools in the US and schools in Israel. We have a mutual responsibility to each other and by building and supporting these relationships, it will in turn, create a stronger connection to Israel and the Jewish experience.

Our first "mifgash," or planned educational meeting of Jews who live inside and outside of Israel, took place in

November to teach our friends in Israel about the Thanksgiving holiday. All the equipment and connectivity that we invested in enabled us to divide the students into virtual rooms for a more personal conversation. A staff member from TBE and from Glilot Elementary in Nesher facilitated the conversations in Hebrew and English. The groups spoke about what they are thankful for. Through their conversation they realized that they are not so different each other and they started connecting on a different level. Some students even realized that they like to play the same video games and exchanged information. We culminated the mifgash



with the students from both sides of the ocean creating a cornucopia and filling it with the things they are thankful for. We are definitely looking forward to our next meeting to make our connection even stronger.



The holiday season didn't stop there. We were so excited to Conquer the Oil together! All our classes had so much fun cooking for Chanukah. Our 3rd-5th grade families came together for our first Merkaz Limud in-person family event. From scratch we made potato zucchini latkes and sufganiyot (fried doughnuts eaten in Israel and around the world during Chanukah). Families also made a beautiful matchbook keepsake that can be used to the light the Chanukiah and Shabbat candles all year long. It was heartwarming to finally

host our families on our campus and be part of everyone reconnecting with each other.



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




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
