

The secular New Year is a time for revelry and for resolutions. How many of us have resolved to eat better and exercise more, but only after the festivities are over? The resolutions we make are to help us improve ourselves, to help us become better people.

There is a Jewish version of this it is called Musar. It's been around for centuries though it really became popular in the eighteen hundreds. It is having a modern revival now.

In Musar you take a midah (a characteristic, disposition, behavior, it's hard to translate) and work on it to improve yourself. The other day at services I gave some examples such as patience, generosity, or listening. How does it work:

Choose a midah, let's say patience. During the next week work on your patience. Don't blow the horn when the driver in front of you delays starting right away, don't yell at the grandkids for running around, take a deep breath; in other words be patient. Do this for a week!

The next week take another midah, let's say appreciation. During that week, be appreciative of everything you have and you experience. The person who holds the door open for you, the good morning you get from the barista, the warmth of the sun on your forehead. Do this for a week!

The following week choose another midah, let's say awareness. During this week, be aware of your surroundings, revel in nature, listen to the birds. But, also be aware of the people around you; don't take them for granted, listen to what they are saying and what they are not saying. Do this for a week and then the following week go back to working on patience.

There are a lot of midot for us to practice improving. If you think running a marathon is tough or going to the gym is tiring, doing Musar is tougher. But just as physical training improves your body, Musar will improve our soul, spirit and make us better people.

I hope your New Year will be filled with blessings and peace.

Two truths can be accurate and juxtaposed to one another. I love spending time outdoors. I spend a lot of time indoors.

I have spent a lot of time outside in my life. These days I have not prioritized spending time outdoors. Going on camping trips, canoeing, taking walks in nature, going on bike rides, disc golf, jogging and having picnics have all been a part of my life. Why have I not prioritized spending time in nature doing these, or other, activities recently?

As the holiday of Tu Bishvat approaches (January 24 to January 25), I am reminded about the importance of nature in our lives. Tu Bishvat is also referred to as the birthday of the trees. Historically in Israel, it was an important date for farmers as it was a time to start planting trees. Originally it was focused on fruit trees as they help sustain us in life. Over time, the holiday began referring to all kinds of trees.

We observe Tu Bishvat in many ways, including spending time outdoors and eating various nuts and fruits from different regions of Israel. We are also reminded of the commandment, bal tashchit, do not destroy. This comes from Deuteronomy 20:19, "You must not destroy its trees." This refers to destroying fruit bearing trees during times of war through malicious destruction. Bal tashchit is one of the values we should live our lives by, care for our natural world.

In Genesis 2:15, it reads, "God placed the human in the Garden of Eden to serve and keep it." We are given the responsibility of taking care of our planet. It was amazing to see what happened to our natural world during the pandemic when we stopped using devices and vehicles that pollutie it. For example, some rivers that were murky started to clear and our air was far more breathable.

In Ecclesiastes Rabbah it is written,

Upon creating the first human beings, God guided them around the Garden of Eden, saying, "Look at my creations! See how beautiful and perfect they are! I created everything for you. Make sure you don't ruin or devastate My world. If you do there will be no one after you to fix it."

As the holiday approaches, I plan on reprioritizing spending time in nature. By being physically present, I will be reminded of the importance of taking care of this natural world in order for it to be there for future generations. While I know I am not able to complete the task alone, it does not free me from doing my part.

We said the Shema together. We were Jewish - together. Other guests of the mall were watching. It was a surreal ten minutes.

I am proud to be Jewish. I am grateful that what started out as running an errand and feeling annoyed that I had to park so far away and walk for a while, became a moment of connection, gratitude, and inspiration. What a gift that was!

Wishing everyone in our TBE community a happy, and healthy new year. May you all find your moments of connection and inspiration this year. Am Yisrael Chai!






B'nai Mitzvah



Connecting Past to Present in Middle School

Throughout the year, the Beth Emet middle school students engage in an ongoing conversation about the history of the Jewish people and how the values and lessons from the past connect to modern life. That discussion is enriched by engagement with members of the community who can shed light on their personal experiences with events of the recent past as well as the present.

Middle school students study the long arc of Jewish history, learning about the ways in which Jews have been impacted by and have responded to world events. They also look at the ways in which beliefs have changed over time in terms of how to live a life of intention in adherence to Judaic principles. From the Sephardic Diaspora to the Polish and German Enlightenment, from World War I to the Holocaust, we study the long history of antisemitism, contributing factors, and ways to combat it. We study the power of propaganda and the ways in which it has been a tool of antisemitism and oppression over time. We discuss how propaganda is dangerous precisely because it sparks action, including violent action, and justifies oppressive legislation.

These are complex concepts that become more real and relatable when individual faces are attached to them. For that reason, we study the ways in which those who experienced the Holocaust expressed their experiences through art, literature, and music. We watch accounts of individuals who share their memories of life before, during, and after WWII. Seventh graders attended a webinar hosted by Echoes and Reflections on






the anniversary of Kristallnacht, what led up to it, and how to combat antisemitism. Mr. Nemes, a Holocaust survivor who is 95, was kind enough to come in and speak to the students about his story. In addition, Dr. Noam Kahana shared with students his experience being deployed to the IDF during the current conflict in Israel. The children were very attentive during these conversations and had the opportunity to ask insightful questions and share their reactions to the stories they heard.

Having the students interact with these personal stories helps them make connections between past and present and make sense of complicated current events. They understand that what is happening now is not occurring in isolation but is related to the long history of the Jewish people. At Beth Emet School we want to raise students who are conscientious citizens, active and present in the world, and this course is an important part of achieving that purpose.


Many of our students, in the 3 and 4-year-old classes jump out of the car and tell us "I am walking myself." and off they go, walking to their class independently. They have a goal and they take the steps to reach that goal. These are extremely valuable moments that we celebrate alongside our students.

During the day the students have time to decide what they are going to do in the classroom. They choose which materials to use, which friends to play with, which investigation to begin, they decide. They drive their learning with great pursuit for knowledge.

As you walk classroom to classroom you can see this in action. We give all of our student the time, space and environment they need to be their own agents. We challenge them and facilitate their growth while recognizing the value in their ability to proactively, purposefully and effectively move through all of the experiences in their day! What does this look like for your child?

I want to sit on this chair. I have an idea. I am going to make it happen! I may fall, I will try again. My teachers may clap for this accomplishment!

Builders hard at work, so many ideas. We tried different concepts, giving and taking ideas from each other, and then we needed to measure the water bottles!







Jewish Spirit & Resiliency Revealed! Making Connections Across the Ocean

Now more than ever, we are committed to continue our participation in a wonderful program sponsored by The Jewish Agency for Israel and the Jewish Federation of Broward County called School Twinning—Partnership2Gether. We have been participating in this amazing program for 15 years. The Partnership2Gether connects our 6th & 7th graders with 6th graders at Glilot Elementary in our sister city of Nesher, Israel. Our Glilot friends make a special effort to connect with us because of the time difference—it is usually 4pm or 5pm in Israel when we meet (well beyond their school hours). The partnership

a Hebrew term that refers to a planned "encounter" of Jews who live inside & outside of Israel to enhance the level of social interaction between Diaspora and Israeli Jews. shows our students that they are part of a larger Jewish community beyond Broward County. It brings both sides together in the spirit of our Jewish faith and it also celebrates our rich heritage, our differences, and the culture that unites us all. We have a mutual responsibility to each other and by building and

supporting these relationships, it will in turn, create a great connection to Israel and the Jewish experience, thus helping our students to build a strong Jewish identity.

Our first mifgash was scheduled for October 22, and we recently thought that it would be postponed since the Glilot students and families are dealing with sirens and uncertainty on a daily basis since October 7. However, to our amazement and surprise, the Jewish spirit and resiliency of our Glilot friends and families shined through, and they were more than happy to meet with our students at their homes through Zoom. The dialogue that ensued between the two groups was eye opening for both sides.

Our second mifgash took place right before Chanukah. The goal was to learn how each community celebrates Chanukah, special activities they participate in, holiday meals that they enjoy with friends and family and anything else that makes the holiday special to them. Both sides also participated in a cooking project together. Our students made sufganiyot - pillowy donuts that are eaten in Israel and around the world during Chanukah, and our Glilot friends made latkes! We ended the mifgash with everyone lighting the Chanukiah together and reciting the Chanukah blessings.









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
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
