Rabbi's Writings

Rabbi Frank DeWoskin

I recently spent time with a bar mitzvah student reviewing his Torah portion. One verse read, "These are My fixed times...which you shall proclaim as sacred occasions." What are the fixed times referring to? They are referring to the importance of holy day gatherings,



including Shabbat, High Holy Days, minor festivals and even the three pilgrimage festivals of Passover, Shavuot and Sukkot. There are fixed times when we celebrate holidays, every year.

We have a standing joke that some years the High Holy Days are early, some years they are late. However, they always arrive at their fixed times.

Having fixed times in our lives helps create consistency. When you work with others, having a fixed schedule, or at least a partially fixed schedule, allows collaboration to take place. Fixed times also help to create routines. According to Northwestern Medicine, routines could lead to a healthier lifestyle, including lower stress levels, better sleep, better health through extra planning and being a good example.

In the Hebrew calendar, we have the fixed times for our holidays as most of their timing is based on Torah and some based around the agricultural year.

This time of year, between Passover and Shavuot, we participate in counting the Omer. (The Omer is a measurement and refers here to a measurement of grain for an offering at the ancient Temple.) We count the days from liberation from slavery in Egypt to revelation, receiving the Torah at Mt. Sinai. Going from slavery to revelation, is not something that is easy. Similar to most experiences in life, the process is just as important as the outcome. The counting allows for us to go through an intentional process in order to be spiritually prepared to receive Torah.

In what other areas of your life do you go through a process to get from one experience, getting ready for another one? This may include schooling at all levels, dating and marriage, joining a community and getting involved, and taking care of yourself to remain healthy, physically and spiritually.

I encourage you to use this time of counting the Omer to prepare yourself and to reflect and figure out how fixed timing in your life may benefit you.



Presenting All The Presidents

One of our most elaborate projects in fifth grade is one in which the students research the most important facts, accomplishments, and challenges of every United States president and collaborate, together, to create a poster for each one. As our fifth-grade curriculum focuses on United States history, our research of the presidents offers the students a comprehensive view of American history up to the present day and allows the students to experience how policies developed over time, often in response to an unanticipated problem. At the end of the semester, each student leaves with a miniature poster of each president that they can use as flashcards to study for their presidents' test in which they list the presidents in order.

This semester-long project is one that fosters many important skills. First, students learn to conduct independent research in which they must find a source that contains the necessary information, evaluate the quality of that internet source, determine which of the many facts available are most important, and paraphrase that information in their own concise sentences. Each one of these skills requires consistent practice to reinforce good research habits, which the long-term nature of this project provides.

In addition, students must practice important reading comprehension skills. They learn to use headings and subheadings to scan and narrow down what would otherwise be an overwhelming quantity of information. They read topic and concluding sentences to determine which paragraphs might contain the information they seek. As they encounter terms and events with which they are unfamiliar, they learn to do follow-up research in order to better understand these important events in history and be able to explain them to the class.

Once the students have gathered the information and are ready to write, they face two new challenges. First, they must express the information concisely in their own words, making sure to avoid mechanical mistakes in punctuation, capitalization, spelling, etc. The posters go through an approval process in which multiple rewrites might be necessary. Second, the students must collaborate with the other members of their group to ensure there is no redundancy in their answers.

Next, once the content of the posters is complete, the students must work together with the other members of their group to decorate the poster with a cohesive design. This aspect may seem as if it would be a breeze, but sometimes this is the most challenging part when tempers may rise. Part of the grade is creating a unified poster, so they must be able to create a vision together, compromise on color and design so that no one feels left out, and generally learn teamwork.

Finally, when the posters are complete, the team must present their posters to the class and field questions from their classmates. These presentations offer an opportunity to draw connections from one president to the next, noticing when a vice president in one administration becomes the president of the next and under what circumstances. What problems arose in one presidency that the next president was trying to solve? Through these conversations, the students gain a broad sense of presidential history in which leadership sought to solve problems, improve circumstances, and respond to the problems of the age.

One unintended but important benefit of this project is that in politically divided times, the students learned that every president has had accomplishments and challenges, that no president has been entirely wrong or entirely right, and that as students they were capable of finding strengths and weaknesses in every leader through the nation's history. This ability to think critically, research, and evaluate information for themselves will serve them well as they prepare for entering middle school next year.

Climbing to Freedom

Each day we come into our Early Childhood Center with thoughts, feelings and ideas. From Covid, to the fighting in Ukraine and Israel, the weight of the world can feel overwhelming. Yet when we enter our doors, our teachers come in with their smiles, their ideas and their observational notes prepared for the day. They come in with hope and optimism to play, learn, and grow alongside their students!

These past two years, observation has become key in our planning. We watch, we think, we reflect, we collaborate, and we plan. We ask ourselves, our students, each other, and our families questions to further think about our students and our activities. We observe them to plan for our learning.

As we move from Purim to Passover to the next holiday, we listen and hear, "What do the children already know about these holidays?" From King Ahasuerus to the Pharaoh in Egypt, from Mordechai and Esther to Moses and Miriam, we learn about different characters in these stories. So much of our conversation becomes focused on the "good guy" and

the "bad guy." The children love that theme. We listen to hear what they think defines good and bad. We wonder with them about our definitions, and we push back to challenge them to build an even stronger understanding of these definitions. As they build their own identity, we work with them to wonder and determine what that looks like. How do I stand up for myself? How does it feel to speak up loudly and say, "I don't like that!" We hear them say "We did it together!" and through the many different social interactions we have we learn to express ourselves. Sometimes we are the good guy, and sometimes we are the bad guy. At times some of us need to try on the bad guy, to feel it, and hopefully move through it. With careful observation and reflection together, we find our kind self. Hang on for the ride!



During this past month we learned the story of Passover, we heard the traditions of the holiday, and we held a "Seder" in some of our classes. As we explored this holiday we read, danced, used art mediums, role played and engaged in science experiments to experience and feel the story of Passover. As our students smiled, when they hopped like the frogs from the plagues, or sang loud and proud "Dayenu" (enough), they continue to be our hope!

This past month the children have been particularly drawn to a pile of dirt in the back of our school. Perhaps a pile of dirt is an understatement, it is more like a small mountain. They repeatedly ask "Can we climb there again?" As they navigate the freedoms in their day may we help them build a strong understanding of the value of freedom in our lives. As we climb "Mount TBE" we notice their joy and their strength at they say, "I can do this!" or "I climbed this in four steps!" or "I climbed this with only one scratch!" They have found a very special freedom in this mountain climbing expedition. As a Reggio-inspired school, valuing children as capable and competent of their own learning we salute their bravery, their persistence, and their perseverance on their own climb to freedom!

What is freedom to a student in Early Childhood? What do they understand about freedom? In these complex stories we listen to the students and, as always, they amaze us with what they know and what they are thinking about. They know what is ok for one teacher, yet not another, in the same way they know this about their parents. "Mommy lets me have ice cream after dinner and Daddy doesn't," or the reverse, or "Daddy lets me pick my clothes and mommy wants to pick my clothes." They know us! This may be the freedom they think about. What do they understand about freedom in a bigger sense and how do you partner with their learning of such a big importance? As you move through these family holidays and experiences with your children what meaning does your family ponder together? We will continue to listen in our classrooms to see what our students are thinking about and what are they trying to figure out in the world today. From the listening we will plan and then create and join with them in continuing their education, alongside each other. Follow us on Instagram and Facebook to see what emerges from our exploration!






