Rabbi's Ramblings

Rabbi Bennett Greenspon



It was an unusual juxtaposition. The weekly Torah portion, or at least the rabbinic interpretation of it, corresponded to what was happening in reality.

The Torah portion was about childbirth, leprosy, mildew, black mold, zits, etc. It was about community health and individual diseases. But the rabbis read it as being about gossip and spreading rumors.

Without going into great detail, I received an email basically accusing the Temple, and I guess me, of being cruel to animals. I may be many things, but being cruel to animals is not one of my faults. I am the one who more often than not takes the Palmetto outside instead of stomping on it. I am the one who often on walks sees a worm on the street and picks it up to put it on the grass. Yes, I have swat a mosquito now and then. And yes, when I was a kid I probably did some unkind things to some ants in the name of science or personal knowledge. And yes, I periodically have nightmares ala the roaches in Men in Black, that those ants are going to get revenge.

I can assure you that no one at the Temple is going to be cruel to any animal. But that is not why I am writing this. What I don't understand is why people who know me, who know Cantor Jan, who know Rabbi DeWoskin, who know our staff and teachers would actually believe such drivel? Why would people want to believe the worst about someone?

But haven't we been living this as a country for a while now? We have no problem maligning someone else, especially if they espouse a different view than we. We sit together at tables in restaurants not talking, but rather texting another at the table about another at the table. We listen to rumors and then spread them without checking out their veracity.

The ancient rabbis saw this as a societal problem. Just as leprosy was contagious and could destroy a community, they saw gossiping, spreading slander, sowing falsehoods and doubts as just as dangerous.

They may be right. During this period of the Omer, the days between Passover and Shavuot, maybe we should look at ourselves and see if we ourselves are spreading "leprosy".

Rabbi's Writings

Rabbi Frank DeWoskin

I drive around town to Beth Emet, to meet with people, to chauffeur my kids places and to run errands. I like listening to various podcasts while I'm driving. One podcast that I enjoy is called 99% Invisible. It is about the unnoticed architecture and designs that shape our world.

Have you ever walked around the world and suddenly seen something that is small or typically unnoticeable? How often have you walked around Temple Beth Emet and missed details? Have you ever walked our property and intentionally looked to see what is really present? There are often subtle messages hidden in different areas.

When is the last time you really looked at the stained glass in our sanctuary?

In this particular stained glass is a picture representing the history of our people, in relation to being slaves in Egypt. Is this picture about leaving slavery, marching towards freedom, like we hear about at the Passover seder?



This image represents Moses receiving the 10 commandments at Mt. Sinai at the time we now celebrate Shavuot, which takes place usually in late May or early June. This holiday is when Jews traditionally study all night long and eat dairy. We also read the book of Ruth. Ruth represents someone who wants to learn about Judaism and practice it with passion. May we always follow in Ruth's footsteps, increasing our knowledge and connection to our Jewish community.

This next pane of glass represents the dove of peace. How many doves can you find on the stained glass? The dove partnered with Noah during the flood, one that was far worse than our most recent flooding in South Florida. The dove flew out and back looking for proof of land. The dove flew out again, returning with an olive branch, which meant that the flood waters were receding. Peace from chaos was beginning. It is my hope that we always have peace, in our world, our local community, in our homes, within our family and in our hearts.



Another representation we find in the stained glass is the Star of David, symbolizing the important connection to Israel. A homeland for the Jewish people, now 75 years old, is important. This symbol connects us to the land of our history and to the larger, world wide community of Israel.

The final subtle message I will share from our gorgeous collection of stained glass is the classic tzedakah box. This image represents the importance of giving to people and organizations who help others who are in need. We can give money and time. This act of your righteousness will help make the world better. Help those who need help.



What other images can you find in our stained glass and what messages do you take from them? Let me know what you see. Look for other hidden gems around Temple Beth Emet. There is always something to be found, as long as you look for it.

Shalom! As we begin the celebrations of our amazing Israel's 75th birthday, I want to share the following excerpt written by a young Israeli expressing some of the dichotomies involved in living day to day life in Israel.

"Being an Israeli, one of the hardest things to deal with - and as far as I know it is unique to Israel - is the seemingly unbelievable and immediate passage between sorrow and celebration, as portrayed in the pairing of *Yom HaZikaron (Israel's Memorial Day)* and *Yom HaAtzmaut (Israel's Independence Day)*. The idea behind this is that the day before celebrating our independence, we are reminded of the price and sacrifice made by so many in order to keep us free.

If you've never been in Israel during those two days, nothing can possibly explain the experience and the kind of emotions that it evokes. After a full day of grief and remembrance, something that is very much relevant from a personal standpoint to literally every Israeli, we go rather abruptly to a truly joyous celebration of our freedom and achievements during Israel's Independence Day.

Those achievements are indeed very impressive. In less than a century of existence, Israel has managed to become a regional power, a modern, flourishing democracy in a region that has very little. In almost every possible measurement of world countries and societies, the Jewish state, especially when taking into consideration its small size, is at the top of the ladder alongside countries that have been around for centuries. When you think about the fact that all of this was done while facing constant security threats, some of them even starting literally from day one, the amazement and sense of awe is even greater.

But Israel's achievements are not and should not be measured only in comparison to how other states perform. After all, part of the whole idea behind the creation of the State of Israel is to see if Jews can - more than 2,000 years after the last time we took a crack at it - actually handle themselves independently, be masters of their own fate, and create a society based on a combination of human values and Jewish culture and heritage. When looking at Israel through this Jewish prism, the list of achievements is also quite impressive. As one example of having done something that was seemingly impossible, I point to the revival of Hebrew as our people's language. To think that millions of Jews are being raised today in Israel having not English, German, Russian, or Yiddish as their main tongue but Hebrew - a language previously restricted to scripture alone - is nothing short of amazing.

Nevertheless, our country is also very young, especially to have suffered so much loss and dire threats. One of my family's little traditions during Yom HaZikaron is to keep the TV on throughout the day on a special channel that, for 24 hours, shows nothing but the names of all of the soldiers and victims of terrorist attacks who have died since the day of Israel's birth. I know many other families in Israel do the same, and I think there's something very Jewish about that act. In a sense, it's our way of reminding ourselves that every person matters, that everyone had a name and an entire life to go with it - a whole universe that was lost in a tragic way.

Israel is not perfect. Israel is our creation, the grand project of the Jewish people, and like every artist that has worked hard on a new creation, no one can be more critical than us towards what we have made; but at the same time no one can love the creation more than the artist who has put his heart and soul into his work.

Yom HaAtzmaut has always been my favorite holiday of the year - because in my view it is probably the only holiday where we celebrate a project that is still ongoing; where all of us can make a difference and shape the way this wonderful country, filled with our people, will look in the next year and the one after that. In my eyes, taking an active involvement in the shaping of our country and our people is the best way to commemorate the memory of those who have died defending it. Nothing is worth celebrating more than that."

Happy birthday dear Israel!

What is SEL and Why is it Important for Our BES Students?

Educational acronyms and jargon have come and gone over the years and it is often hard to keep up with the current trends and new procedures in schools. However, Social Emotional Learning, or SEL as it is better known, has been and continues to be a critical and crucial part of both the educational and social processes inside and outside of school. Before discussing its importance, it is imperative to understand what SEL is and how it connects to the daily lives of our BES students. SEL refers to a process in which children acquire emotional intelligence, develop empathy for others, and learn problem-solving skills. Developing self-awareness, self-control and interpersonal skills is vital for school, play and everyday success in general. Students with strong social-emotional skills are better able to cope with everyday challenges and benefit academically as well as socially.



Within my SEL classroom the atmosphere is inviting, relaxing and welcoming which helps students let down their guard and comfortably learn and grow. I focus on five main skills that will assist students in reaching their highest potential while feeling good and productive during the process. These skills include self-awareness, self-management, social awareness, relationship skills and responsible decision making. At BES we begin incorporating them as early as kindergarten and continue through our middle school classes. Each area holds its own importance in the cumulative success of the SEL program.



Self-awareness involves each student understanding their own emotions and future goals (both long term and short term). Self-awareness is sometimes difficult because students must self-assess their strengths and limitations. Having a positive mindset often helps students admit to their shortcomings and helps give them the push they need to accomplish hard things. Self-management is incorporated early on in our students' schooling at BES. It refers to the ability to regulate big emotions, manage stress, control impulses and delay gratification. To achieve this, we often incorporate yoga, deep breathing, guided visualization and mindfulness within the SEL classroom. Social awareness refers to the ability to empathize and feel compassion for others. It is vital for students to understand social norms and behaviors so that they can be successful in the 'real world'. Learning relationship skills is essential for all students. Establishing and maintaining healthy relationships with peers, parents and authority figures is something we stress to our students. In

SEL class we practice communicating in a clear fashion, listening actively, cooperating with others, resisting inappropriate social pressure (especially important with our middle school students), negotiating conflict and seeking help when needed. Finally, responsible decision making encompasses making the best choices possible. In SEL class we consider ethical standards, safety concerns, behavioral norms for risky behaviors, health and well-being, and to think about consequences before acting.

As we begin our final weeks of the 2022-2023 school year, my hope is that our BES students continue using the acquired skills from their SEL classes in order to have a successful and fun summer while still maintaining and growing their social and emotional well-being!

A year in reflection..

As this year comes to an end, we have learned so much from our little friends and the practice of stepping back, listening, observing and reflecting. Children are amazing, they are smart, independent, resilient, and they are wonderful problem solvers and collaborators as we give them opportunities!

In a one-year old class we recently observed a child playing with a bucket and some tea lights. He dumped the bucket and watched the tea lights fall to the ground and then he laughed. A friend came over to play. At first, he pushed the friend away and then decided to welcome the friend into his play. Then another friend came over. For 38 minutes these three students played a game: pass the bucket, dump the tea lights, belly laugh wholeheartedly and then pick up the tea lights and start again. They



created a game, explored physics, worked together and had more fun than you could imagine!



In a two-year-old class we watched (as we often do) a child building with blocks. Again, it was a similar experience in which the child started alone, and when another child came over they were welcomed into the play. As one student set a piece on their building, they clapped at their success and the other student smiled. A third friend came over and they kept building together, respecting space, taking turns, and waiting for a turn. As the construction began to get higher, they could not reach the top. Using problem-solving skills, a chair was brought over by the students so they could climb up and add one more block. When they wanted to add one more block yet couldn't reach, they

climbed on the table. And then the building collapsed! Without a pause they started to build the castle again.

In a three-year-old class a group of friends were sitting together when a fourth friend came over to join the group. He said, "There is no space for me." One of the friends said, "Let's move over there," and space was created. They found a spot where they could all fit. As they sat together they began to ask each other, "Are you my friend?" This is a question we hear often in the 3 and 4-year-old classes. They ask about play dates and friendship daily, exploring what relationships in their lives look like.

In our Pre-K classes they worked hard to create a bug catcher, they gardened, they flew planes and kites, just to name a few of our recent activities. They continued to show us their amazing learning dispositions. They are curious, eager, and excited to learn. We work hard to listen and support them in this educational journey. We wonder how to enhance all of these amazing experiences we see from our infants to our Pre-K students. The better we listen, the more ideas we seem to have! As excited as our students are, so are we as we ponder our next moves! Our curriculum is not predetermined, yet materializes as we watch and listen over time. Our curriculum is fluid and flexible to the interests and competencies of our students!

Through joyful tears, mommies, daddies, grandparents, aunts and uncles all watched as each student was called to the bimah to hear about their Hebrew name. Everybody learned all about the meaning, after whom they were named, and why their name means so much to them all. Following the students' presentation, we went “Beyond the Classroom” together to learn all about the Shema & the importance of this prayer to our people. With Rabbis Greenspon & DeWoskin, families shared their bedtime rituals with each other, and then learned how to breath in & out while saying the Shema. We culminated the experience with each family creating their own Shema pillowcase. The beautiful pillowcase with the Shema prayer on it is a way to remind them of the ritual of saying the Shema when we go to bed and when we wake up.


