Last month in my ramblings I indicated that the Temple was slowly, in some minds not so slowly and in others too slowly, reopening and returning to normality. Services are being

held in person though significantly more are joining us online to worship virtually. Classes and meetings are being held virtually, in person and in hybrid form. We are doing what Jews and Judaism have always done, adapting to the world around us i.e. when the ancient rabbis weren't happy with the way people were behaving at Greek inspired symposia, they created the Passover Seder.

As we move back into our building and people being with people, we have been asked what can we do as individuals to help and to volunteer. A lot depends on timing and skill sets. 


### **ROSH HODESH**



## **Reaching New Heights in Preparation for Middle School**

Fifth Grade is the conclusion paragraph in the essay of elementary school. Our students start in Kindergarten, the introduction to an education of Jewish values and secular studies. By the time our story gets to fifth grade, we wrap up what we've stressed throughout the past five years of schooling, and we prepare our students for their next chapter: middle school.



As we prepare our students for middle school, we, of course, reinforce writing skills, teaching them to transition from one paragraph to the next with finesse. We stress our math skills, dealing with decimals and finding the volume of everyday objects. We learn the history of our country, and of the celestial bodies in the galaxy we are lucky to play a small role in. We practice communicating—in English, in Hebrew, in Spanish.

While all of these skills are essential to ensure our students are ready to move on when the year comes to a close, one of the most crucial skills we have been stressing does not come from within a textbook, but within ourselves, and that's cooperation. Our students are fiercely competitive, always striving to succeed, and it can be difficult to relinquish control and learn to be part of a team, to work together toward a common goal. In class, we put this into practice by having students work in groups on certain assignments, and we see the push and pull of different players wanting to take the lead. During

these activities, we encourage our students to find compromises with their group mates, and learn to take turns trying out each other's ideas.

Our commitment to cooperation is not limited to the four walls of our classroom, however; it's something we take with us everywhere we go. Recently, we went on a class trip to the Challenge Course at FAU. There, our students had the opportunity to do a ropes course—with their classmates working together to control the ropes that held them in place. This time, it was not their grade that depended on their teamwork, but their safety, and our students stepped up. They worked hard to support each other's weight, and encourage one another to push past their fears and reach new heights. Seeing our students apply these skills at the ropes course truly showed us that they are ready to apply these skills as Middle Schoolers next year.

The elementary chapter of our Fifth Grade students' lives is coming to a close, and we are confident that when our students move up to Middle

School, they will have all of the skills they need to shine. We are all so excited to see them thrive next year, and we know that they are ready to work hard, work together, and write their own story.

# Is it enough to just be thankful?

Remember when we would celebrate Thanksgiving and just be thankful? As my knowledge has grown about the holiday, my reflection on this celebration has come into question. Many of us traditionally gather together, eat a big meal, and think or talk about what we are thankful for. But we now know that this holiday represents a time when the Native American culture was not treated well.

As we reflect on this holiday, we may want to create a new tradition for our families. Or should we continue to celebrate holidays exactly the same way as our ancestors did? How might we move forward with this holiday recognizing the importance of gratitude in our lives, yet at the same time recognizing what this holiday may symbolize to Native Americans around the world?

As a Jewish people often persecuted in history, how would we want this holiday celebrated? It is hard to break free from the traditions of our past and perhaps we tell ourselves this celebration symbolizes something completely different to our family. Forging our own or a new path can feel uncomfortable and even wrong. As we sit at our table, we can take a moment to pray for freedom for people all over the world.

In our Early Childhood Center, cultivating kindness is a priority and this includes teaching acceptance, tolerance, and understanding of people with different values, looks, and beliefs. Through books, stories, materials, and conversations we strive to teach and role model these values.

We teach the children and role model our thankfulness throughout the day. We recognize our gratitude for the friendships we make as well as the snack and lunch we eat. We also take time to acknowledge the materials in our class or we walk outside and we take notice of the beauty in nature. Together we learn gratitude for all that our life brings us in our day!

In addition to focusing on our gratitude and our thankfulness this holiday implores that we learn about truth, history, and critical thinking as learners. Each week in school we read stories and sometimes we learn history in these stories. We ask the children, "Do you think this story is true? What about it might not be true? What other ways might this story be told? How else could this story end?" At an early age, children can begin to think about stories and history with a critical eye. We focus on opening their minds to a variety of perspectives and we hope our students begin to think independent thoughts as they learn history.

Perhaps this year for Thanksgiving we will celebrate our ability to be kind, to be grateful, to be inclusive, and to think critically as we walk through life.

# "HINEINI — HERE I AM" So Much to be Thankful For!

We hit the ground running at the start of this new year with all of the fall holidays to experience and celebrate together. Our students were very busy and participated in various activities over the past month to enrich their understanding of Rosh Hashana, Yom Kippur, Sukkot and Simchat Torah. They also had the opportunity to perform their first mitzvah together for the Jewish new year of 5783!



#### School Wide Mitzvah Project

"No one in our community should go to bed hungry."

The Cupboard is a food pantry that helps feed people in need in our community. This year The Cupboard asked our K-8<sup>th</sup> Gr. Beth Emet School and the Merkaz Limud students to help decorate food bags for Thanksgiving. Our students discussed the meaning of mitzvah (commandment) and why it is important to perform mitzvot. Students talked about reasons why organizations like The Cupboard are important to our community and they

learned that taking their time to decorate the Thanksgiving bags will bring smiles to the faces of the families that will be using them. Between both schools, over 500 bags were decorated and sent back to *The Cupboard*.



Did you smell the apple crescent rolls and apple pie cupcakes baking in our ovens for Rosh Hashanah? Our students love to learn through hands-on activities and cooking is usually the favorite! Using teamwork, each group listened intently to all of the steps necessary to successfully make their apple treats. They loved using the mechanical apple peeler this year to help them with the process.



Tashlich, Teshuvah...what are these traditions all about? Tashlich is one of the staples of the High Holiday season and is performed by Jews around the world. It is a way of inspiring repentance and purifying ourselves



before Yom Kippur. Our students were very thoughtful during tashlich, thinking about behaviors that they would like to improve



this new year, and tossing away the behaviors that they felt are not appropriate. Teshuvah is the central theme of the time between Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, known collectively as the "Ten Days of Teshuvah."

Typically, teshuvah is translated from the Hebrew as repentance, but it literally means return, as if turning back to something you've strayed or looked away from. Performing tashlich and repenting during teshuvah helps us reflect on how we can improve ourselves in the coming year.



Our other school wide mitzvah took place during Sukkot, where we ate a fruity snack in the Sukkah and also enjoyed shaking the lulav and smelling the lemony scent of the etrog. Right after the week of Sukkot, we celebrated the joyous holiday of Simchat Torah. Dancing around the Sanctuary for Simchat Torah is always fun and energizing!
