# Rabbi's Ramblings

The war between Hamas and Israel is most probably going on as you read this article. It is hard to imagine that it is over. It is especially hard to imagine the horror that everyone over there is going through. The suffering is unimaginable. The waiting is worse.



Every morning and evening service has a prayer in it taken from the Book of Exodus. The Israelites have just crossed the Sea of Reeds. They are on the other side watching the Egyptians coming after them. All of the sudden the chariots get bogged down in the mud and the waters come roaring back. The Egyptians drown and are defeated. The Bible tells us that the Israelites broke into song as they watched their enemies drown.

The Midrash (collections of commentaries and stories on the Torah) tells us that God was not happy with this and that Adonai reprimands the people saying: My creatures are drowning and you are singing. What kind of people are you?

I think the lesson the midrash is trying to teach is clear to all of us. While we may be praying for victory and wanting revenge, we must always remember our humanity. It would be a shame if we became like "them".

On another note, I want to thank so many of you who have been so generous over these last few months. Your generosity of the heart, spirit, mind and wallet has been overwhelming. You have donated food, funds for security, helped us help Israel through gifts that will help train guide and service dogs, house orphans, rebuild towns and so many other things. And your generosity hasn't stopped there, you have also donated funds to our High Holy Day and Fall campaign to keep TBE going and most importantly safe, especially as the cost of protection has risen so much in the last few weeks. Rabbi's Writings Rabbi Frank DeWoskin

The book of Breishit (Genesis) is filled with many stories. These stories include the Creation, Adam and Eve, the serpent, Cain and Abel, Noah and the flood, the Tower of Babel, Abraham and Sarah, the binding of Isaac, Isaac and Rachel, Jacob, Rebecca and Leah, Jacob fighting an agent of God and being renamed Israel, the story of Jacob's children and the story of Joseph. There are so many lessons that these stories teach us about life, relationships and our people's history.

One of my favorite Genesis stories is when Joseph's brothers are out shepherding the flock and Jacob tells Joseph to go look for his brothers and report back. Joseph does not know exactly where to find them. He comes across an unnamed man who asks, "What are you looking for?" Joseph responds, "I'm looking for my brothers. Can you tell me please where they are tending the flock?" The man responds, "They said that they were going to Dothan."

If this man wasn't at that crossroad or hadn't heard their conversation, Joseph might never have found his brothers, been thrown into the pit, been sold into slavery in Egypt, and ultimately have become Pharaoh's number two. This unnamed person made a huge impact upon the history of our people.

Our lives are made up of many, many moments. Think about a single moment, in which some person who you came in contact with for a brief period of time that made a huge impact on you. We never know what kind of outsized impact someone will have on us or what kind of impact we will have on someone else in a seemingly brief inconsequential moment in time.

Our world has a great amount of darkness, pain and fear at the moment. The tragedy and war in Israel and living in fear of anti-Semitism in America and throughout the world, can often be emotionally and spiritually overwhelming. There are many ways to respond to this emotional struggle. One way is by thinking about the blessings in your life. One blessing might be an outsized impact someone has had on you. Who was that person? What was the moment in time they came into your life briefly but so consequentially? What other blessings do you have and how do you recognize them? Another way to respond to emotional struggles is to be gracious. What and who are you thankful for in your life? Being aware of gratitude can keep you uplifted. One more way to help put you at ease is through attending services in person or virtually. Services can allow you to unplug from the world around you and plug-in to your own self.

What other ways are you navigating the chaos in today's world? How have you found actionable and passive ways to better your world and the world around you?

May we all find light in the darkness.

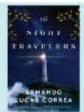

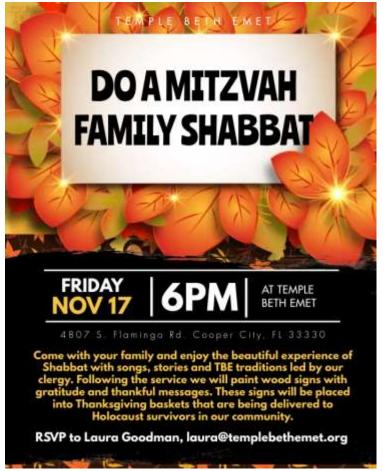


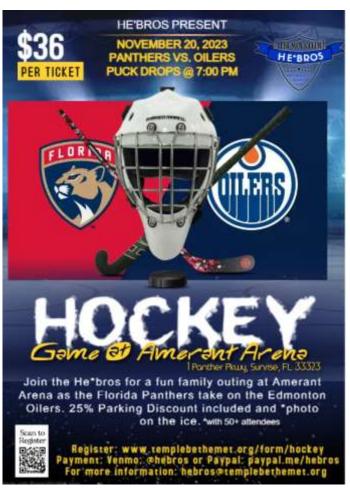

# Getting a 'Taste' for Reading By Miriam Emano, Jennifer Weiner, Natali Webman, & Joelle Marks

Third grade is a transitional year as students are becoming more independent learners. One area where this is represented is reading. Now that they have learned how to read, they start reading to learn. The students are taught how to analyze texts using a variety of strategies and incorporating different reading skills. In third grade we use a wide range of texts to accomplish this goal and the students are independently choosing their own books to read. They have learned to use the title, the pictures, and the blurb on the back cover to determine if it is a good book. As they tend to select the same type of books that they feel comfortable with, we work towards taking risks and trying out different genres to understand that different books are read for different purposes.



Students will read a variety of books, independently and together in class. From Biography to Fantasy, to Realistic Fiction, Non-Fiction and Mystery, students will learn about the characteristics of that genre, and study a well-known author that specializes in that style. They will also complete a project relating to each genre, highlighting the story elements. Our goal is that by the end of the year the students will have a strong grasp of several different genres.

What better way to begin their "taste" of literature than by sampling a variety of good books? The third graders participated in a Book Tasting event.

The classroom was transformed into "Books Cafe" where each table offered a platter of tasty books representing a specific genre. The students were seated at their table and began sampling a chapter book from the platter. They used their menu to respond to the books by recording the title, commenting on the cover art, and previewing the

first few pages. They had the opportunity to move to all of the other centers to keep tasting different genres. At the end of our tasting event they created a bookmark with a list of books they would want to read. "I didn't want to read that book, but once I started I couldn't stop!" was what we heard as one group moved on to the next genre.

The goal of a book tasting is to awaken a love of reading and to show children that there is a wide variety of literature available to them. It is also intended to teach them the skills necessary to preview a book before choosing whether they want to read it or not and to help them understand how to choose books for a specific purpose. Through this experience we hope the students will be introduced to books they may never have chosen before. One student said, in her response, "I didn't think I would like fantasy books but now I do!"



The students truly enjoyed and benefited from the experience and we look forward to seeing the results in the students' reading! As one student summarized, "I hope we do another book tasting soon. I can't wait to see which genre we will taste next."

#### Sitting with discomfort...



As I write this month's article, Israel has declared war with Hamas. Most of our students did not mention these horrific happenings when they returned to school after the initial weekend. We were prepared to hear what they had to say. We are always prepared to listen to their thoughts, fears, and ponderings. We do not need to pretend that we live in a world in which we all get along. Early Childhood children know this is not true.

As I walk through many classrooms and the playground day after day, I hear students calling each other names that their friends may find offensive such as "baby." I see students knock over each other's buildings - sometimes on purpose and sometimes by accident. I see students grab toys from other children and sometimes they give them back, and sometimes they hold on tightly. We all have conflict throughout our day. In these moments we try to

create space for reflection and growth.

It is a big part of our Early Childhood program to promote pro-social skills as these instances arise. We know that at times we disagree, we argue, and we walk away from each other. Sometimes we do this respectfully, and sometimes we do this with a really mad face, stomping feet, and maybe a little more aggression than we hoped for. We work alongside our students to learn to respect each other in anger and disagreement, as well as when we agree and get along. ECC students can engage in a fight and then turn around within minutes and be ready to play as best friends. If only the conflicts in today's world were that simple and this does not even compare to what we have witnessed.

When children are in struggle with their classmates we sit alongside them as we try to make sense in a world



that sometimes does not make sense. Sometimes these conversations are uncomfortable as we face hard truths about life. In these moments we sit in these feelings of discomfort, because sometimes that is all we can do. Some fights cannot be resolved, some fights cannot be forgiven. Some fights have no end.

I pray deeply that when this article drops, Israel is at peace...yet nothing will bring back those whose lives were taken, nothing will erase the horror of what has happened in Israel and together we sit in that. Together, as we do in the classroom, we comfort each other, we hold space for that which has no answer, and we sit in conversations in peace and in conflict, in comfort and in discomfort.

Today I watched a two-year-old child put her arm around a friend as they walked off the playground and she so sweetly whispered, "come, friend," as they walked back to class together. These children are the joy and the hope of the world we live in today. Their love and compassion for each other is our guiding force as we hold on to hope.

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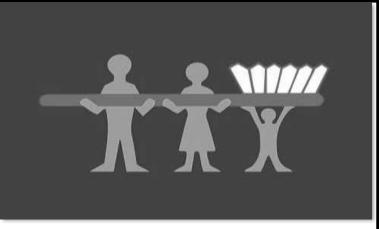


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
