Rabbi's Ramblings

A duck and a dog walk into a bar. Oops wrong story!

But seriously, I recently learned a lesson from a duck and a dog about the High Holy Days.

Let's begin with the duck.

My neighborhood, like so many others, has a surfeit of ducks and geese. They are all over the place and they think they own the place. So, one day as I was driving to the Temple I had to slam on my brakes. A smallish duck started to cross the road in front of me. I had no choice. I either stopped or hit her (I assume it was a her). She walked in front of me and stared me down. But she didn't stop. She kept on going, looked the other way and made a truck stop as well. So, here was I in my car and a burly truck driver in his tanker truck stopped on a street with traffic now stopping behind us and a ten-pound duck daring us to move.

Then the strangest thing happened. A small duckling came out from the other side of the road and crossed the street. The first duck stood there like a safety patrol kid or crossing guard. When the duckling got to the flock on the other side, she turned and walked away. I hope her quacking was her way of saying "thank-you" to us.

So, what is the HHD lesson: WE NEED TO HELP OTHERS. Sometimes we need to do so even if it means inconveniencing ourselves. The duck gave up her foraging for a brief time to help another. Couldn't we give up a fancy restaurant meal to help feed the poor or support a charity? The duck actually risked her own life to do what she did. Was she cognizant of this? I don't know. Should we risk our lives to help another? I guess that depends on the time and the circumstances. But might we give up some comfort to do so? I leave that to you to decide.

The second lesson is from Georgie O'Keefe, our puppy. I was in the kitchen doing something when I stepped backwards and heard a cry and a yip. I had stepped on Georgie. He took one look at me and ran, rather limped away.

About ten minutes later I was sitting on the couch and he jumped up, gave me a lick on my face and cuddled up next to me, purred, fell asleep and began snoring.

So what lesson is the O'Keefer teaching? WE NEED TO LEARN HOW TO FORGIVE. We need to be open to forgiving especially if the hurt we received was unintentional. And of course, we need to be open to being forgiven, which is sometimes harder than forgiving.

A dog and a duck walk into a synagogue and each taught a lesson: we need to forgive and we need to care about others. May we learn from them.

As I write this article, we are approaching the Hebrew month of Elul, which is the month preceding our High Holy Days.

Our tradition is full of powerful ways to prepare spiritually for the huge act of "teshuva" that we are directed to do during these most awesome of days... Rosh Hashanah through Yom Kippur.

"Teshuva" Is usually translated as a deep "turning within"... having the courage to take a good look at who and what we truly are in the depth of our innermost being. What emotional burdens are we carrying that we can let go of? How can we be the loving and forgiving person we know that we are deep down inside in a truly authentic way?

Our tradition offers us some guidelines to make this process more efficient and beneficial not only for us, but for everyone we interact with. Reading and reflecting on the words and spiritual significance of Psalm 27 once or twice a day during the month of Elul is a powerful tradition. Even the first sentence, "God is my Light and my salvation", can be extremely comforting.

From there, we can look up the "middot" or character traits that most apply to us and set the "kavanah" (the intention) every day to work on developing at least one of the positive character traits, knowing (having read Psalm 27) that the strength and power of the Creator of the universe is with us.

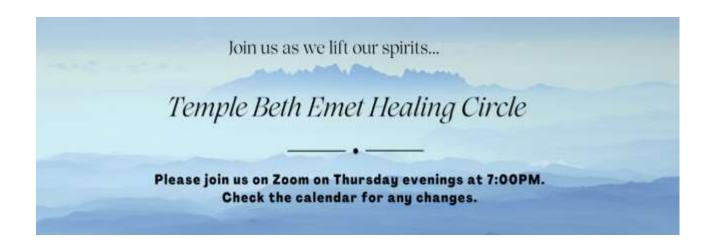
Another powerful practice is to visit the graves of loved ones, reflecting deeply on the positive qualities they have left for us to emulate, as well as reflecting deeply on the qualities we are demonstrating for those we love.

We are taught that as we become better human beings, we are also performing the Holy act of "tikkun Olam"... repairing our world.

May your Holy acts of "teshuva" bring you great peace.

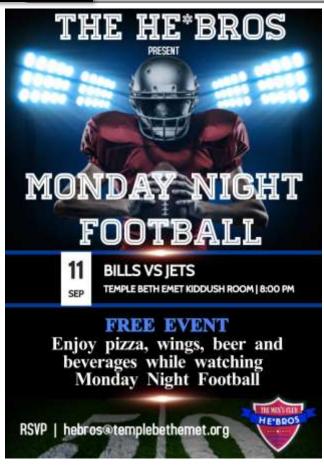

Setting Up for Success

As teachers hang up their alphabet, parents are scrambling to find last minute school supplies and students are coming off of their summer fun gearing up for the next school year, back-to-school jitters are running high. What is this next school year going to bring?

As parents we think to ourselves, "What can I do to make this a successful year for my child?" Before we can address this question, we first need to look into the past. We need to figure out the challenges from the past so we can best create a plan for the future.

One of the most common challenges we face revolves around motivation. It happens far too often that we hear things like "Not, now!", or "I can't do this!" Hearing these words over and over again can upset any parent. Our instincts may be to scream out of frustration or walk away from the situation. What we don't realize is that our reaction is their power. Our negative response actually reinforces their behavior.

One effective strategy to use is "stop, breathe, think". We are so quick to react in the moment. When your child is showing frustration, make a conscious effort to stop and think before reacting. A deep breath helps to relax your body and gives you a moment to come up with a quick but calm plan of action.

Another strategy to keep in mind is that simple change in perspective can make all the difference for a child. Instead of saying "I can't", train your children to say "I will try". When your child is feeling frustrated and cannot figure out what to do on the homework assignment, they may say, "I don't know!" Teach them instead to say "I don't know YET!" Once this terminology becomes habit you will be amazed at the switch in perspective!

A difficulty we commonly face at the beginning of the school year is the morning good-byes. It is hard for them to let go and sometimes even harder for us to let go. New school year, new teachers, new faces, new friends, and new routines. It can be overwhelming to any child. We all know that their heartbreak is our heartbreak. Here are a few tips to get us through it: Firstly, talk to your child with as much detail as possible so they know what to expect, including what the routines will look like. Secondly, it is helpful to be as prepared as possible the night before, with lunch packed, clothes picked out and backpacks by the door. This will eliminate some of the morning chaos and lessen the stress level for you and your child. Finally, when morning drop-off arrives, make the goodbyes quick and positive. This will evoke confidence in your child instead of hesitation. Together we can make your child more confident and successful.

Furthermore, at the end of the school day, engage with your child about their day. So often we have difficulty getting them to share details from their day. The trick here is to ask open-ended questions. Instead of asking "How was your day?", ask "What did you do on the playground today?" or "What was the most fun thing you did today?" These openended questions foster good communication with your child, while getting the details we are craving.

Mazal Tov to our very own Rina Yagerman!

We are extremely happy to announce that our very own Miss Rina Yagerman is the newest Broward County recipient of the Dr. Sidney & Rose Esterson Award for Synagogue School Excellence. Miss Rina has been teaching Judaic and Hebrew studies in various grade levels in our Merkaz Limud since 2015. She is also a highly requested ECC teacher here at Beth Emet as well. For the past four years she has embraced the role of lead Kindergarten teacher in the Merkaz Limud and every year our graduating Pre-K students look forward to having her as their Sunday School teacher. For Rina, teaching is more than a profession – it is a passion that is apparent in every lesson. She cares

about all of her students and teaches them in a very original way, trying all the time to keep them focused and challenged. As one of her responsibilities, Rina is in charge of preparing the Kindergarten students to participate in their Ta'am Shel D'yash service — A Taste of Honey. This is their first introduction to Jewish studies. To be prepared for the service, Rina teaches the students about creation, bringing each of her lessons to life by incorporating art, cooking, music, games, and stories. They then create their own Torah illustrating what took place on each day. Rina provides the class with many different materials they can use to create their own Torah. Each student's Torah is unique to their understanding of the days of creation. Being that "Ta'am Shel D'vash" is the first service the students participate in, they learn the basic blessings for Shabbat, the Barchu, the Shema, and Shehecheyanu and what they mean. At the service the students go up to the bima for Kabbalat Shabbat and they present their understanding of the Creation and Torah knowledge through songs. This beautiful service is followed by a Shabbat "Beyond the Classroom" experience (family program). During the program, Rina explains to the families the ways in which she and her own family celebrate Shabbat. She connects with them on a more personal level and the families really appreciate that. Teaching about Eretz Yisrael is also very important to Rina and she infuses Israel into her lessons throughout the year, not only during Yom Ha'atzmaut. She uses her own experiences of living in Israel to bring her passion about Israel into the classroom. 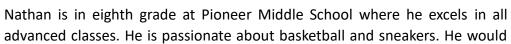

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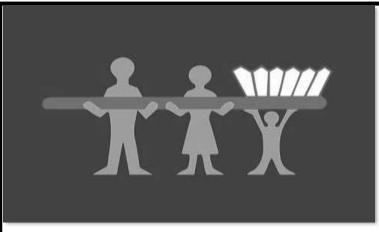


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
