## Rabbi's Ramblings

Rabbi Bennett Greenspon



#### Some life lessons from recent Torah portions:

- 1. Don't let arrogance stop you from doing the right thing. Don't let arrogance stop you from listening. Don't let your arrogance hurt others. Moses went to Pharaoh and asked him to let the people go. Pharaoh was so convinced of his own power and wisdom that he wouldn't listen. He was convinced that he knew what was best and because of that the Egyptians suffered. In our own day and age, we have leaders who refuse to listen; who think that they are the only smart ones in the room; and because of them people suffer. In our own lives we too often let our arrogance rule our decision making. We too refuse to listen.
- 2. We need to learn to control our impulsive behavior. At the end of Genesis Jacob is blessing his sons. He tells two of them that they are like water. Water just flows, it has no control over itself. We, on the other hand, are different; we can control ourselves. But often we don't. The Torah tells us to always remember that we are humans and that we can make decisions.
- 3. Don't always look for imperfection. When predicting the tenth plague Moses says that around midnight the plague will begin. The rabbis ask "Why around midnight?" The answer they give is that if it were a minute before or a minute after, some people would say, "See Moses is a liar! He gave us the wrong time." Don't be one of those who only find fault, especially if you don't have a solution or are unwilling to repair the problem.
- 4. Don't be bitter. When we are bitter those things around us will look bitter. We will see the defects in those around us and in the things around us. A bitter person makes themselves miserable and those near them miserable especially those who are the closest to them and whom they love the most.

May we all learn from the wisdom of the ages.

Rabbi's Writings

I recently had the privilege of participating in our Temple Beth Emet youth group chapter retreat. The experience is open to our middle and high school youth groups. We travel away for a few days to play, learn, pray and be active with friends and fellow youth groupers. The participants had a lot of fun and were able to experience an amazing weekend out in nature,

away from the craziness of normal life. We do a variety of activities couched under a certain theme. This year's theme was "This is the Hope."

Hope is defined as having an optimistic state of mind based on an expectation of positive outcomes.

We find hope in many places. At the retreat, we spoke specifically about hope in Israel, hope in our own lives and hope in the world.

We have hope for the people of Israel, creating peace and existing in a healthy and safe state of being. The song *The Hope* expresses the importance of Israel as a Jewish home for over 2000 years. The story of the Jewish people entails being a free people in our land, the land of Zion and Jerusalem. Even when Israel struggles, we have hope that we will overcome the adversities.

We also discussed having hope in our own lives. The Talmud reads, "Where there is life, there is hope." At times, it is easy to have hope in the face of adversity. There are other times when it is a challenge. How can we have hope at all times? I think of myself as a hopeful realist. My optimism is strong and I recognize not everything will be perfect. This reality does not take away my hope.

Elie Wiesel once wrote, "Hope is like peace. It is not a gift from God. It is a gift only we can give one another." How do we give one another hope? We need to remain positive and take actions towards making all of our hopes come to fruition.

Unfortunately, not all of our hopes become a reality. Fortunately, we have a powerful community where we can support one another when hope is not there and we can celebrate together when hope becomes real.

Dale Carnegie wrote, "Most of the important things in the world have been accomplished by people who have kept on trying when there seemed to be no hope at all." Even in the face of uncertainty, have hope. If we have it, who knows what we might be able to accomplish.

Among many hopes I have, one is that I hope to see many of our students at youth group and on our retreat next year!



Fourth grade is a vital year for students' growth as they become accustomed to being a more mature student. As part of the Florida curriculum, our 4<sup>th</sup> grade GOATs (Greatest of All Time) have been learning all about our beautiful state of Florida. The students created presentations on the various regions of Florida, including the Everglades. These presentations transformed into jigsaw lessons in which the students taught the other



students, as well as the teachers! After the GOATs learned about the facts of Florida, they were ready to navigate the EVERGLADES!

The GOATs had their first day-long field trip to the Science Eye's Everglades Expedition. Using their deep understanding of Florida's geography and regions, the fourth graders went to the Everglades with keen eyes, looking out for animals and plants they learned about, and hoping to find new ones. The guides and expert biologists at the Science Eye taught the GOATs so much, even providing a log to keep track of their findings throughout the day.

It was an absolutely beautiful day, as students bravely took off on their journey. The GOATs partook in many new experiences throughout their voyage. They went on an airboat ride and explored the unique wetlands and plant life. They learned all about their native inhabitants. Thank goodness for the noise cancelling headphones or our ears never would have survived! However, that was the easy part of the day. Next up was the slogging adventure. Slogging gave them a hands-on view of the River of Grass which was a fascinating experience. Students explored a side of the Everglades that most people never get to see by getting their feet wet. Many of them were initially quite anxious about this immersive experience; nevertheless, the GOATs stepped up to the challenge and thoroughly enjoyed themselves. The Everglades was a great adventure for all and fourth grade taught everyone that GOATs really can take on the Everglades. We can't wait for our next adventure to St. Augustine!

#### It's not the children who need to be ready; it's the schools!

Children show us day after day how competent and capable they are. Our students can do it and we are there to see it, support it and extend it. Yesterday, I watched as a group of children investigated a puddle. While one child wanted to just get as messy and wet as possible, another wanted to find a way to explore the puddle without any mess, and a third wanted nothing to do with it! We stood back watching quietly, and then wondering and asking questions as the children navigated this wet, muddy experience. They jumped over, in, and past the puddle, depending on their wet and messy preference. They laughed as they pondered why the sprinkler did this and why the water didn't go down. Learning is all around us. When we pause and listen, the children



joyfully lead the way! And in the words of one student, "I think this messy puddle is from the frinkler!" (No typo, just an adorable pronunciation as we grow and learn at TBE!) We asked, "How do you know, what makes you say that?" as we encourage our students to be researchers alongside us in their education.

At TBE we are passionate about young children's learning and development and we advocate for an education that supports best practices for our students. Today's parents may look on social media for recommendations on where to send their children to 'get ready' for school. They may wonder which schools will provide their children with the best education in literacy and numeracy skills, where they will learn to recite numbers and identify colors and shapes. In past years this was referred to as school readiness. At Beth Emet we believe this is reversed. We recognize it's not the children who need to be ready; it's the schools that need to be ready! Look out here come the students of Beth Emet Early Childhood Center! They are ready to take risks, follow their curiosities, and explore cause and effect in all that they do so that they can think deeply and critically about their world.

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
