Last month when I sat down to write this rambling I wrote that by the time you read it you would have voted and we would have a president. Boy was I wrong. The bulletin got delivered earlier than ever (we got our bulletin at our house on the 1<sup>st</sup>, while we have yet to receive an absentee ballot that was requested). And as I write this we only think we know who the president will be and even that we can't seem to agree on.

I write this just before Thanksgiving and I am truly thankful just as I hope you are thankful. Sometimes in the midst of everything we are going through as a nation, as a community, as a family or as individuals, we fail to see the positive things in our lives. We all get bogged down in the mud and quicksand of our lives and fail to see the sun and the stars; we see only the darkness and the gloom.

Then Chanukah comes into our lives with its candles reminding us that there is light in our lives, if we look hard enough and if we light the candles. Two big ifs!

This year as you celebrate the holiday, look for all the things for which you should be thankful. Reach out to someone and help them. Give a Tzedakah gift instead of a pair of socks to someone by making a donation in their honor. Think about those who are thankful, but living lives that are tougher than yours are and with whom you would never want to trade places with. And remember your blessings.

Over the last few Shabbat services I have been sharing some Yiddish proverbs or sayings of some of the Chasidic masters. Let me remind you of a few of them.

"If you think you can destroy or tear down, then you can repair and rebuild."

"If you put all your troubles into a bag, and everyone else put their troubles in a bag, and you could choose whichever bag you wanted, you would take back your own."

"Hope for miracles, but don't rely on one."

To paraphrase another: to be a Jew one must be a realist, to be a Jewish realist one must believe in miracles.

May the "miracle" of Chanukah light up your hearts, souls and living rooms and may we all be blessed with the light of love, freedom, compassion, patience and understanding.

Dr. Suess once said, "Sometimes you will never know the value of a moment until it becomes a memory."

What would happen if we lived each moment as if we are creating a memory? Would that increase the power of our experiences or diminish it?

My family and I recently traveled to Sanibel for an extended weekend and a change of scenery. Going into that weekend, we knew it would be special. While there we created shared memories of bike rides, swimming in the Gulf and being together. It was indeed special and an experience we will remember.

We find the Hebrew word "*zackhor*," (remember) throughout our texts, nearly 200 times in our Bible. Even though we weren't physically there, we as a people carry those memories as if we had been present. We are told to remember our covenant with God, various holidays and our history. At Passover it is written, "In each generation, every person should see him or herself as if she/he personally came out of Egypt."

How have you been generating memories with your families and loved ones, close and far away, during this pandemic? We have the chance to create new Jewish experiences in how we observe holidays and sacred time together.

I believe our observance during this time may even be more unique and special due to our intentionality, as so many found with Passover and other sacred moments over these last many months.

For Shabbat, which gives us a weekly opportunity, we could take advantage of the slower pace we have been afforded. Force yourself to take a break. Talk with family and friends. Do the prayers to recognize that moment of change, welcoming Shabbat.

Chanukah is coming soon. Try taking time each night to not only light the candles, but maybe learn new songs. Create new versions of dreidel. Try different latke recipes and eat them with different toppings, beyond the standard applesauce or sour cream.

Make these moments into memories and you will value this time, despite the frustrations brought on by the pandemic.

May your Chanukah be filled with light, peace and new memories!

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Recently in our Thursday evening meditation group, we shared this letter, written by Professor Jacques Decour, a member of the French Resistance in World War II, to his family. He was awaiting his execution by the Nazis at the age of 32. I feel he is teaching us the ultimate lesson that hopefully we all eventually learn in this life we are sharing together.

"Now each of us is preparing to die.... we are preparing, thinking about what is to come, about what is going to kill us without our being able to do anything to defend ourselves... This is truly the moment for us to remember love. Did we love enough? Did we spend hours a day marveling at other people, being happy together, feeling the value of contact, the weight and the worth of hands, eyes, bodies? Do we yet really know how to devote ourselves to tenderness? Before we pass away in the trembling of an earth without hope, it is time to become, entirely and definitely, love, tenderness and friendship, because there is nothing else. We must swear to think of nothing any more but loving, opening our souls and our hands, looking with our best eyes, clasping what we love tightly to ourselves, walking free from anxiety, and radiant with affection."

Judaism teaches us that every single moment and each person that we are blessed to be sharing those moments with...is a brand new gift from God.

Let's put this lesson of love into the foreground of our lives...Remembering that it was gifted to us by a young man in even more difficult circumstances than we are going through together now.

## Post Cards from a Grand Adventure

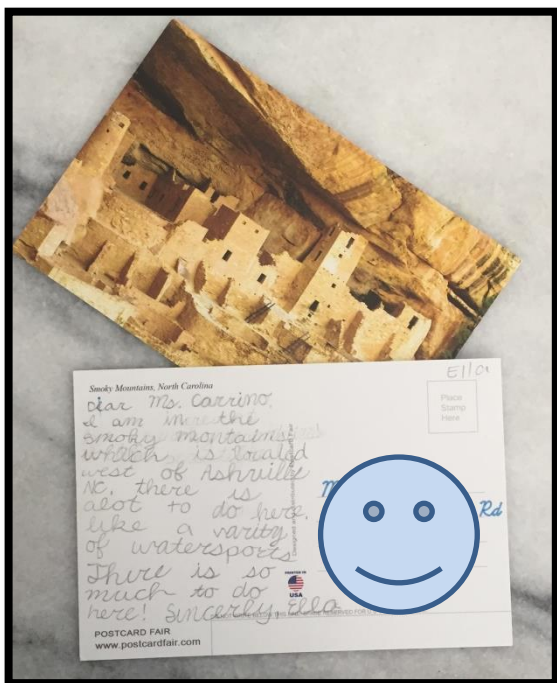
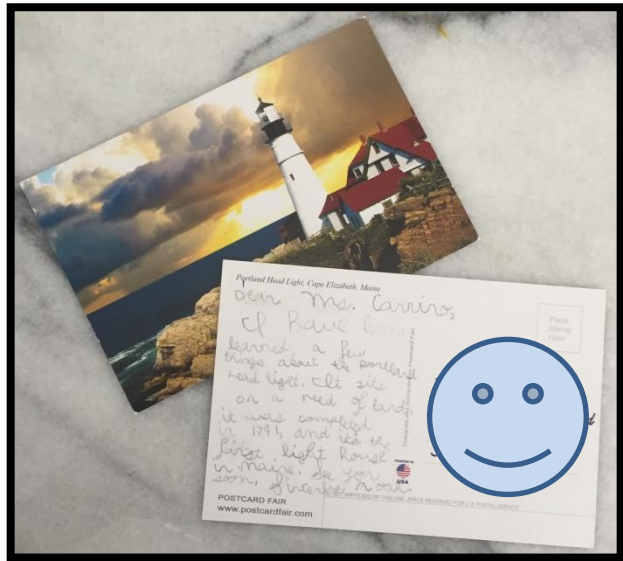
At a time when so many of our plans and dreams have been deferred in favor of safety and caution, our fifth graders are imagining themselves on a grand adventure: a road trip across the United States. This project asks the students to apply their research skills and increasing knowledge of the states, capitals, and regions of the United States in order to write a travel narrative in which they visit locations of their choosing across all 5 regions of the United States.

To prepare for this project, the students studied five regions: the West, the Southwest, the Midwest, the Southeast and the Northeast. In addition to learning their states and capitals, the students chose two specific landmarks from different regions and researched both that specific landmark, a second landmark from that same state, and the state itself. They used this information to write postcards to their teachers, in cursive, offering details of the location as if they had been there. Then, they charted the course of their trip on a map, making sure that their trip took them to the five regions in a logical order, that the places in which they stopped to site-see included the locations from their postcards, and that they included practicalities such as distance, food and lodging in their plans, thereby incorporating some real world math into the project.

Having taken these steps in preparation, the students have now begun drafting their travel narratives. As they write their first drafts, they are asked to focus primarily on ideas, organization and descriptive detail. Just as it would on a real road trip, the map on which they charted their course serves as a guide to keep their writing on course. Adding

descriptive detail for places we have not seen in person is a challenge of imagination, which we bridge by writing exercises that ask us to describe a visual scene in photos and by making a conscious effort to describe using our five senses. As they finish their first drafts, we then begin to revise by applying mini-lessons in the six traits of writing each day: ideas, organization, voice, sentence fluency, word choice and conventions. We use a combination of independent revision, peer editing and teacher feedback to guide this revision process.

Also, because reading so profoundly influences our instincts and inspiration for writing, we will be reading short excerpts from famous travel narratives to get a sense of the genre and the ways in which a writer can use descriptive detail, personal reflection and vocabulary, to create a clear voice. At the end of this project we hope that this project will do for our students what a good road trip also does—reflect on what they have learned from their journey and what lessons they can carry forward to the next.







## On the Road to a More Just World

As this year ends, we all look forward to 2021. Between Covid-19, the presidential election and some end-of-year storms, I think we are all just about ready for a new year! As we approach the holiday season we may be pondering, "How can we make this Chanukah special and meaningful for our children?" In school, the students begin with learning (and for some, relearning) the story of Chanukah. We read stories, do puppet shows and reenact live shows, created by the students, to retell the story and explore what happened!

A simple version of the Chanukah story goes something like this....

A long time ago a mean king named Antiochus ruled over the land of Israel. He did not like Jewish people. He did not like their differences: they celebrated Shabbat, they went to the Temple and they had different practices that set them apart. The King made many new rules such as no more celebrating Shabbat and no more going to the Temple. The King told his guards to go into the Temple and make a mess. The guards listened and they made a huge mess in the Temple. A Jewish man named Judah Maccabee led the Jews in defeating Antiochus and his men, and drove them out of Israel. Once they were defeated the story goes that the Jews ran to their Temple, cleaned it thoroughly and restored it to its glory. They built a new menorah as the old one was destroyed and then the story says they found a tiny jar of oil- enough to light the menorah for just one evening. To their surprise, the menorah burned for eight days. Every year during Hanukkah, Jews light menorahs for eight days to remember the miracles that happened long ago.



As we strive to foster a community built on inclusivity, empathy and understanding, we reflect on the story of Chanukah and we explore with the children what this means in our everyday lives. As the students act out the story some of them say, "Antiochus was mean," or "Judah was brave." As they role-play and try out different characters, they have the opportunity to explore these statements and examine each of the different roles in creating a more just world. Sometimes, they take on the role of the mean king and then they quickly say, "Now I want to be Judah!" From there they begin to build an understanding of what it means and how it feels to be "mean" or to be "brave." Their exploration allows them the

opportunity to develop their own thoughts on inclusivity and kindness. We take time to talk about the role they took on and explore how it feels to act on these traits. We support them in this journey and ask questions that promote an open mind and an open heart.

Today I saw a 3-year-old wipe a tear from another 3-year old's face and look them in the eye and ask, "Are you ok?" They took their small three-year-old hand and patted their friend softly. The student studied the sad friend's face, looking intently, thinking about them. A miracle can be defined as a surprising event that is not explicable by natural or scientific law or a miracle can be an outstanding example of something. Preschoolers always remind us to look, listen and watch as they show us the many wonders in our life.

May your holiday season be filled with miracles big and small.

and socially conscious side to thousands of viewers every day. Feel free to give him a follow at ZachRandomizingThings.

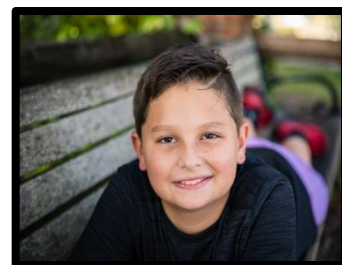
