Here he was juggling diapers and supplies and trying to hand off his baby to the teacher waiting in the window. Yes, babies often come into their classroom via the window. He was taking a bit of time. Here he was holding up the line, moms and dads behind him running late for work and yet... no one sounded a horn, no one tried to move out of the line to cut ahead, no one even shook their head. It was a typical Beth Emet scene. Then there was the little boy clinging to his mom and crying hysterically. He didn't want to leave her. But as soon as she handed him off to the teacher the crying stopped. He smiled and waved as his mom got back into the car. It was a typical Beth Emet scene.

The little girl got out of the car and had her temperature checked and adjusted her mask. As soon as she was given the okay she was off running to her friend and giving him a hug. It was a typical Beth Emet scene.

Patience, caring, friendship may you experience a typical Beth Emet morning every day of your week.

Rabbi's Writings

Rabbi Frank DeWoskin

It's amazing how quickly time goes by, as if in the blink of an eye. I've written previously about the passage of time. When a holiday, celebration or milestone arises and you think for a moment about the same event from a year ago, you may find it hard to believe that it has been an entire year since that last time. When you reflect on how much took place over the year, you most likely realize that a lot has happened since and then it may feel like it has actually been 10 years since that moment.

Approximately one year ago, we celebrated a Passover seder together, yet separately, in the virtual universe that felt so new to us. How is it possible that it has been a year since we last ate matzah or sang Dayenu? That it has been a year since we first were quarantined inside our homes and began navigating the digital space on a daily basis?

I find it incredibly impressive how we have been able to adapt to the world around us this past year. Though in a very different way, our ancestors also adapted when they left Egypt. They had to live in the wilderness after crossing the Sea of Reeds instead of having roofs overhead and being enslaved. They did have help from God even though they didn't always recognize that help as they complained when it came to the needs of water, general food and meat in particular. However, our ancestors began the powerful journey of going from slavery to freedom. We try to emanate this experience in our lives, wandering in the desert, in search of the promised land. We are living in times that feel so different than our past normal and we are wandering in search of a new normal, following the journey between the two.

While reading, <u>Here All Along</u>, by Sarah Hurwitz, I was reminded that Jews do not come from royalty; we come from slavery and we succeed because we value the importance of education, hard work and determination. We are commanded to take care of those less fortunate in our community: the stranger, the widow and the orphan.

Recently, our adaptability here at TBE allowed us to celebrate mitzvah month, helping those in need over a longer period of time than our typical Mitzvah Day. During this past year, as we adapted, we also reflected on blessings that we had and the struggles we overcame to see and appreciate those blessings.

Passover is the holiday in which we celebrate freedom. This year we have even more to celebrate as our journey to freedom continues. My hope for all of us is that we are able to be free to live our lives, more fully, in the near future.

May your Passover be filled with traditions, family and friends.

We can find sources of inspiration in the music of our tradition...and the teachings of our tradition can be music to the ears.

One of my favorite moments during services is when Rabbi Greenspon shares the beautiful call and response chant, "Hareni"... with us, teaching us the holy commandment to "love thy neighbor as thyself".

Yossele the Holy Miser was a Jew who lived in medieval Poland in The Kazimierz Jewish quarter of Krakow. According to legend, Yossele was the richest Jew in Krakow. He was reviled for his apparent stinginess and his refusal to contribute to Tzedakah, (charity), despite his great wealth.

When the Miser died, the townspeople who long despised him refused to bury his body for several days. Out of scorn, they eventually buried him in the back of the cemetery, an area normally reserved for societal outcasts.

Within a week of the Miser's death, strange occurrences began to unfold in the town. All the poor began beseeching the local Rabbi for money because the weekly allowances they had regularly been receiving from an anonymous benefactor had ceased arriving. Eventually, the rabbi realized that Yossele was the source of these charitable donations and that, in fact, the notorious miser was a great Tzadik (righteous man).

Immediately, the Rabbi told the entire town to converge on Yossele's grave and beg for forgiveness. On the tombstone which read "Yossele the Miser", the Rabbi added the word HaTzadik—the Righteous One. According to the story, the Rabbi involved was the famed sage Yom-Tov Lipmann Heller, who requested the honor of being buried next to the Holy Miser. This is the reason why the grave of the venerated Rabbi Yom-Tov is found at the back of Krakow's Remuh Cemetery, next to Yossele, to this very day.

This tale underlines one of the highest forms of *tzedakah*, according to the pre-eminent Jewish philosopher Maimonides, giving anonymously.

Sometimes we help people without their even knowing...and sometimes people are helping us and we do not know it. Whenever we behave in this Highest of ways...we are partners with God.

May we all find ways to partner with God, to share in *Tikkun Olam*, the repairing of our world.



We have had to adjust quite a bit this year. Our annual Purim parade leading into our Sanctuary to watch our staff perform the Purim shpiel is something we all look forward to. Traditions have a place in our heart, and though we look forward to the new ideas we are creating, we also look forward to the old traditions returning as well.

This year we still dressed up and we paraded in our own class or with one other class. We smiled, we danced and we celebrated. Children love to dress up and Purim is the holiday to do it. Wearing masks this year is all part of our costume trend. The sight of children dancing in their costumes brought great joy and hope onto our campus. The staff was all smiles as the children brought in the sheer joy they had wearing costumes and dancing. And in



keeping with tradition we had groggers or noise makers to play loudly when we shouted out the name of Haman. What is needed to carry on a tradition? Over the years, traditions have changed yet key components continue in each holiday.



During Purim it is customary to offer a festive meal or package of food and other small treats to friends and family. This is called Mishloach Manot. In our school the students pick someone in our community, and they bring items from home to put in a basket and give them. Learning to give to others is not always easy for a preschooler, maybe adults also! They often will look in the basket and say, "I love raisins," or whatever they see. I am not sure if in that moment they love the raisins, or they love what they cannot have. This is a perfect opportunity to not only teach our students the importance of giving, but to put it in action. They collect the items, fill the basket, and give the basket to the person their class chose. The process of helping

children to understand that it is nice to give can be difficult. However, teaching this valuable lesson can help children value the act of giving and in turn, will instill in them a sense of pride and self-esteem; character traits that will take them far as they grow.



This month Beth Emet hosted Mitzvah Madness. We hope you were able to participate. If not, that's ok because mitzvot - random acts of kindness and social action - can go on every day. From the small occurrences that take place in school to larger ideas you might do at home, we can scaffold on the children's experiences. As you talk to your child about what we did at school for Purim, maybe include them in a family project that continues

Take Me Along...

The word Seder (סדר) – order, as defined by the dictionary, is "the disposition of things following one after another, succession or sequence." As everything in our life makes more sense when things are in order, our Jewish life cycle has an organized disposition. As we had a Seder for Tu B'Shevat, celebrating the beginning of spring and blessing all the fruits and special trees, we will soon be celebrating Pesach with a special Seder as well. But Seder (סדר) – order, also can be found in our Siddur (prayer book). It has been written in a unique order to give a special honor to each prayer and blessing for our daily prayers.



"My Companion Siddur", our 5th grade Beyond the Classroom experience, is a two-part program that marks the beginning of the Bar/Bat Mitzvah journey. Even with all the obstacles that this year brought to us, we were able to offer this special program and experience all the planned activities through Zoom. To start off the morning, families created a community word cloud based on what the word "Blessing" means to them. Then, parents and students traveled through different breakout rooms with Rabbi Greenspon, Rabbi DeWoskin and Cantor Jan. They were presented with the order of the Siddur, the ideals of blessings and spirituality and the connection to praying with Kavanah (deep meaning). Afterwards, the families worked on a special project of decorating the cover of their siddur. Parents



stopped by TBE ahead of time to pick up the embellishments that they

wanted to use to create this unique keepsake. Each family also created their own "Family Bookmark" collage that included positive adjectives about their family - some chose to make it digitally and some used a cardstock paper template. We culminated the morning with parents writing an inscription for the inside cover

of their child's newly decorated prayer book, which will be shared with their child at the 5th Grade Shabbat Service.

The 5th grade students are no longer taking baby steps; they are on middle ground and will all too soon be taking great strides into adulthood. This prayer book will be a wonderful companion to take along on their journey.



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
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
