I expect by the time you will be reading this, the election will be over. I am hoping that by the time you are reading this we will know who won the popular vote and who won the Electoral College vote.

This has been an important election. But as an article in the Wall Street Journal stated, all elections are important. In fact, most of the time we are told that the current election is the most consequential one of our lifetimes! Only history will tell how important this one really was.

I was asked if as a rabbi I was concerned that X would win. I use the name X as the question was posed to me by both sides. My answer was the same, "Yes". Both candidates had issues, positions, and support bases that concerned me. Who would be their advisors and lieutenants?

But, I told them I was more concerned with us as a people and how we would be reacting to the results. Would we be able to come together as a nation to fight the problems that are confronting us? Would we look at the other as a fellow citizen or as an enemy? Would we let cynicism and suspicion rule us, would we let partisanship and the quest for power guide us, or would we try to conquer those destructive forces? Only time will tell.

One of the things that bothered me most about this election is the fact that we saw labels being used, at least in my mind, so much more. The labels were imbued with hatred, fear and in many cases, falsehoods. We saw a term used and then had it described using the worst examples of it instead of the better more positive ones. Both sides used fear of the other to sell themselves.

There was one commercial that truly disturbed me. It was done by an independent entity not officially affiliated with either campaign. It bothered me not because of whom it was against, but of the images that it portrayed. It sadly reminded me of the propaganda of the Nazi party, and I don't say that lightly.

It described a number of people as parasites. It began with a description of what a parasite is, how it lives and what needs to be done with it. Just like the Nazi propaganda films showed rats and then compared the Jews to being rats. I do not care if you are Republican or Democrat, you don't dehumanize another and compare them to a parasite. We know where that leads and we should oppose it no matter whom we support.

My concern as a rabbi is that we overcome sinat chinom, baseless hatred. My concern as a rabbi is that we need to work together as people and as partners. I hope we can fight our suspicion and cynicism of others to make this happen.

Covid Update

We are still continuing to do most of our programs virtually. We are allowing smaller groups into the sanctuary for life cycle services. Funerals for the most part are being conducted outdoors again with a limited number of attendees. Our schools are happening in person with guidelines and virtually.

We know we are all getting pandemic fatigue. But, we beg you to be careful and to be safe. Masks are a sign of respect for those of us who are compromised. Social distancing will help us reduce the spread. Synagogue and church services are proven to be super-spreaders which are why we are being so cautious. Not one of the doctors we have spoken with has minimized the virus; in fact, just the opposite. My own doctor recently said to me, "When this all started I wasn't concerned, now that I have had to treat so many, I don't want it."

Thanksgiving is coming....BE SAFE!

Rabbi Frank DeWoskin

We pay so much attention to marking time as we live our lives. We mark a person's time in life by birthdays. We mark time by how long we've been working somewhere, how many years we have been in a relationship or what grade we are in. Today, we become aware of time as we count how long we have been distant from family and friends.

In the Jewish world, we mark time in many ways. Our holidays are marked by certain times of year, around the agricultural world, or the end of the week. When we mourn we mark time through *shiva* (the first seven days of mourning), *shloshim* (a 30 day period of mourning) and ultimately the *yarhtzeit* (anniversary of someone's death). Some Jews mark time on a daily basis as they pray three times a day. We also celebrate holiness in time through blessings that mark sacred moments, such as seeing a rainbow, reciting *modeh ani* (which thanks God as we rise in the morning) or singing the *shehechiyanu* (which is said marking first moments while thanking God).

When we are young, we have a perception that time takes forever. This perception exists as a result of experiencing new things, waiting for firsts to happen, etc. When older, we have a perception that time flies. This reality exists because we often are in a routine, try fewer new experiences and do not necessarily set short, intermediate and long range goals the way we might have as children.

If we pause to reflect, we would realize that time is constant. It is all about perception. How do we appreciate all the moments throughout our lives to help time exist, neither moving fast nor slow?

Every time we read the Torah, we are able to find something different as a result of our life experiences. The text does not change, yet our perception does.

As we get older, how can we look at our lives through the eyes of our younger selves, with that fresh perspective? How can we create new memories and mark special moments of time? We must realize that the time we have is a blessing. I encourage you to say thanks. Thank you for the opportunity to exist. Thank you for new opportunities to grow and be challenged. Thank you for recognizing that time just is and we can live our lives fully.

Enjoy your Thanksgiving, whether celebrating it remotely or in person. Try to see the world and our time in it through thankful eyes!

Fourth Grade Cactus Tackles COVID Gloom



When the fourth graders returned to school in August, they did not know what to expect. We could see the worry on their faces as they entered a sterile room, with desks divided by plexiglass screens, new TV monitors and cameras everywhere. In order to contrast the visible changes to their typically cozy and loving Beth Emet classroom environment, we chose the theme of cacti and succulents to brighten the atmosphere. The sunny fourth grade room beams with fresh pastels and vibrant greens. The students discovered that succulents come in all kinds of shapes, colors, and sizes. On the first day of school, each student received a miniature succulent to keep at his or her desk, a friend that lives inside their cubby of "safe space." The student and their "friend" are the only two allowed in that space. They have really embraced the succulent theme, donning cactus masks and hair ties and naming their plants.

The fourth graders of 2020 have embraced the new routine and quickly fallen back into the rhythm of school. There have been many changes, but the students have adapted quite well and enjoy learning and seeing their friends in person. Safety is our top priority and they are on board with that too. Each student takes pride in the cleanliness of his or her "safe space." Class jobs have been changed as well this year, to responsibilities like mask manager and personal space patroller.

COVID-19 has reframed our day, but it does not consume it. The fourth graders are already one *fourth* of the way through the year. The curriculum is centered on the state of Florida. Our current novel, *The Missing 'Gator of Gumbo Limbo*, which is centered on a young girl who has an unlikely "pet," is set daringly in the middle of the Everglades. We may not have "cacti" in the Everglades, but we have an overabundance of other flora and fauna that are completely unique to Florida. In Science we explore this one of a kind ecosystem, native and invasive species, and the circle of life in the wild. The best part is that the Everglades are the perfect destination for a virtual fieldtrip! In Social Studies, we will explore all about the geography of the state, local Native American tribes, and early European settlement.

As fourth graders incorporate the study of Florida into their learning, they begin to branch out in their worldview, understanding not only the community around them, but also their city, state and nearby communities unlike their own, both in the past and the present. They begin to develop a sense of place in the world. They reach an important life phase - turning their focus from inward to outward. Fourth graders are at the cusp of their journey developing into menches of the community and citizens of the world. 2021, here we come!

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

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
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
