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Be Aware of Scat

Scat is an interesting word that has several meanings. Aware is another word with several uses. There is also the etymological question of is beware related to aware.

I have often spoken of Musar which is a Jewish methodology of self-improvement. In Musar you take a midah (characteristic, trait, or attribute) and work on improving it for yourself; for example, patience.

So I'd like to use scat as an acronym for four midot: suspicion, cynicism, appreciation, thankfulness.

Beginning with appreciation and thankfulness, I like to acknowledge those who helped make the High Holy Days into the success that they were to so many. I have received numerous calls from people who said they felt a spiritual connection, others who loved the fact that they didn't have to get out of bed, some who still got up and got dressed up in their HHD clothes and those who shared with me how they combined yoga or meditation with our services. There were some who asked if we could always do the High Holy Days this way and others who said they needed to get back into the sanctuary.

The last year has been very difficult for so many of us and I know that mistakes and failures have been made on my part and the temple's part and I am thankful for those who have forgiven me and us.

There are so many people that I am thankful for and appreciative of who have made these last few months so much better for me. Noemi Gozlan, Robin Sheridan, Rayna Engle and Oscar Monterrosa have led their departments through what seemed impossible circumstance. They were helped by an incredible staff and assisted by Dina Milgram, Jennifer Schatz Young and Michal Medina. I can't mention all the administrative staff and teachers here, there are so many of them, but to all them I think we need to say todah raba. Laura Goodman, Michael Geller, Susie Meroz have worked hard to keep the "ship on course."

If the High Holy Days were at all successful in helping you connect to our people or your souls it was because of our Chazanit Jan Sheer and Rabbi Frank DeWoskin who kept me on track and who added their passion and spirituality to our endeavors.

But a real special thank you has to be given to five guys who did the mitzvah of High Holy Days out of their hearts, asking for nothing not even thanks. They were willing to leave their families for hours at a time, give up family dinners, be with "strangers" whom they hoped were being safe, etc. I am of course talking about our musicians and video guys. When we called them to ask if they would be willing to help, we really expected a negative reply. But instead we got enthusiastic "Yeses". And we all got a most professional production which was not a production, but which was truly a service, a religious experience. Mike Curtis, Steve Sloan and Yzo Hernandez shared their musical talents with us beautifying our day. Bruce Solomon, Joel Kaplan and Steve Daleo brought their equipment and skills and used them to broadcast TBE out to our worshipers throughout the country.

A last thank you, and this is going to sound a bit silly, goes out to those of you who shared their pictures with us, so we did not feel that we were in an empty room. Looking out at familiar faces was really gratifying. We did not get to see the comments some of you put up on the Big Marker or Facebook sites, but we also hope to appreciate those after the fact.

Appreciation and thankfulness are two parts of scat. The other two parts are suspicion and cynicism. These are interesting traits that are necessary in life but also which can be detrimental. You can never be too appreciative or thankful, but you can be too cynical and suspicious.

Sadly, as the election approaches too many of us are becoming too suspicious of others and too cynical. I include myself in this observation. I hope to work on my 'self' to fight these tendencies. I hope you will do the same for your 'selves'. Our society's survival is contingent on us trusting each other and our institutions. As I indicated above, a little bit of cynicism and suspicion is healthy, too much will destroy us.

No one can make us SCAT, only we can. We can choose how we react to what is around us. Let's do it in a healthy way.

I have always been a fan of Simchat Torah, a holiday to celebrate the joy of Torah. As a child, I recall dancing at the synagogue with the Torah and paper flags as we felt the strength of community. We ate caramel covered apples, celebrating the sweetness of the moment. Simchat Torah is the holiday where we end the reading of the Torah and begin once again, creating the never ending cycle of Torah.

In many ways, Simchat Torah reflects an opportunity to begin again. As it ends the high holidays, we have had a chance to reflect, to take action to improve and search for hope. By doing acts of t'shuva, repentance, we are able to return to what we are and return to who we are, the best version of ourselves. It is like a reset button in a video game. As we begin again we approach the new year with experience. The experience of our past year is meant to reshape what we do, how we interact with people and in what ways we change our pattern of behavior for the better. The celebration of Torah can also lead us to have hope.

At Yom Kippur, I spoke about the importance of having hope for today and tomorrow. This hope will allow us to improve, to better ourselves and to take actions to better the world. I shared...

Rabbi Jonathan Sacks wrote, "Optimism is the belief that things will get better. Hope is the belief that, together, we can make things better. Optimism is a passive virtue, hope an active one. It takes no courage to be an optimist, but it takes a great deal of courage to have hope."

I do have hope. I find hope through prayer, through empathy, through learning, through all of our kids. I find hope when I see people taking action to help those who are in need...

Here are a few actions that each of us could take to access the hope in our hearts and to bring life to that hope.

1. Learn...be open to hearing about injustices of the world, starting in the United States
2. Listen...through open and respectful conversation, try to listen to someone who you may not agree with
3. Donate...to organizations that help people or offer a micro-loan that makes a huge impact for someone who has nothing
4. Gratitude...be grateful and show that grace, that thankfulness to others
5. Gratitude through action... write one thank you note a week for a year to different people who you appreciate and are thankful for
6. Communicate...send one text a day to someone you haven't talked with in a long time to share that you are thinking of them and hope they are well
7. Kindness...put up a sign in someone's yard (without sharing who it is from) expressing someone cares about them

Our Simchat Torah celebration is about celebrating the joys we receive from Torah and the joys we get out of life, through community. I hope all of us are able to take at least one action to better the world around us, leading us to find joy in our lives.

High Holiday Appeal



First and foremost, we hope you are well and that you are keeping safe. We hope and pray that this virus will soon be conquered so we can go back to a normal life, even if that means wearing masks and washing our hands more often. As we return to our "new" normal, your Temple Beth Emet experience will change. We look forward to coming back together, but as you know, social distancing will be in place to protect everyone. We will offer both live and virtual services, Merkaz Limud and programs to give our community options to continue to be engaged with TBE.

Temple Beth Emet has been hit hard by the effects of closing our campus and restrictions that have come along with Covid-19. When the virus hit, we had to cancel our school classes therefore taking a major hit on our income. We felt it was right to continue to pay our teachers, after all it wasn't their fault that we had to re-invent our Early Childhood, Elementary and Religious School classes and reduce their hours. Many of our parents were hit economically and so it was not unexpected that they would stop paying for their tuition. Many others continued their payments asking that we apply them to future obligations and some were extremely generous and told us to use their payments as a donation to help ensure that the teachers and staff would get paid and that ZOOM classes would continue.

In June, we decided to open our camp. Normally we would have 550 kids running around the campus or traveling on buses. This year we had 110 campers with no traveling and lots of hand washing. We instituted a strong mask policy, implemented a pod system and made sure that those on campus practiced social distancing.

Not only is income down but expenses are up. Where you save in one area you spend in another. Less kids do not mean less mess or cleaning. Some reduced costs such as electricity are balanced by viricides. Members who for years supported the congregation are having to cut back their support of TBE so that they can pay their employees and FPL, as they should.

Yet, through all this, we have continued to persevere. We have continued to have vibrant He*Bros (men's club), Sisterhood and youth groups meeting virtually. Services have continued weekly, virtually of course, with attendees from all over the country and people either watching us live or tuning in at their convenience. B'nai Mitzvot are happening with limited guests present, many on Zoom and drive-by Mazal Tov parades. Funerals are strange without Shiva. Weddings are even stranger.

Yes, this has been challenging. But we are adapting, and we are adapting because of you and for you.

Let's cut to the chase, we also need your help to make sure that Beth Emet will continue to be here and be strong after the pandemic. This year more than ever we need to ask you for your philanthropic gift. As we move into our "new" normal there are items that we need, PPE and building modifications to keep you, your children and your grandchildren healthy, as well as technology for virtual classes and services, which all cost money. So, we need your help now! If you can't help now (we do understand), but down the road in a month or so when things get better for you we ask that you think of TBE and help us.

A Day Unplanned...

We have tried to plan our days with great flexibility. We watch the children, observe them and build a lesson around their interests and joy. What does this mean exactly? How do we do this?

Last month, while sitting in a classroom I observed some amazing lessons emerging. One child pulled out his yoga mat from the box of mats. Another student came over and pulled out a mat. They continued pulling out all of the mats, laying them in a pattern around the room. Other students joined in. One child said, "Don't touch my mat." The students replied, "Ok." I was sitting there thinking of all of the questions we could ask them, or all of the suggestions we could put out there. The teachers and I sat quietly, observing. One child asked, "I wonder how we know whose mat is whose?" "They have names," said the child. "Look," he said, "this one is Ben's, I see a

B." They proceeded to read every name on each mat. The children showed each other the letters and said what they were. They practiced reading names. They pointed out letters that they recognized.

At another table, children were painting. One child somehow covered his face mask in paint. "Oh no!" he said. The teacher put out a bowl of water after they discussed the idea of trying to clean it. "Look!" he said as he put the mask in the water, "The water is changing color!" The other students cheered!

These children showed a natural interest in letters and reading – oh, the places we can go from there! They became scientists as they created an experiment, mixing water, fabric and paint and then they observed what happened. Their minds are sponges, curious and eager to learn. When we lean in and listen we create space for natural learning and wonder to occur.



The children moved through the classroom negotiating rules of play: "my turn," "your turn," back and forth it went. The social interactions were sometimes done with kindness and sometimes not. There was always a tremendous amount of forgiveness in their conversations.



As we head into the month of October we leave behind the High Holy Days of the fall. The messages and thoughts of these holidays will stay with us throughout the year. The students and staff will reflect on their choices each day asking questions such as, "Was I kind? Did I work hard? Did I give it my best?" When we are wrong we will continue to learn and practice saying sorry and asking for forgiveness. As we move through the year each day we practice these skills, adults and children alike. Sometimes our friends have different ideas than we do, and sometimes they are not our friends and they have different ideas than we do, and we continue to find our kindness, our compassion and our empathy.

As adults in a world struggling with the stress of a pandemic in an election year, we know this may be easier said than done. In preschool we learn what it means to agree to disagree. Sometimes we frown, and sometimes we smile as these interactions and conversations occur. This year we may

have strong feelings throughout our days. As we move forward with respect, compassion and the ability to agree to disagree may you find your "preschool heart" that does this with the grace and ease of a child.

Hadasim (myrtle branches) have smell but no taste.

Aravot (willows) have neither taste nor smell.

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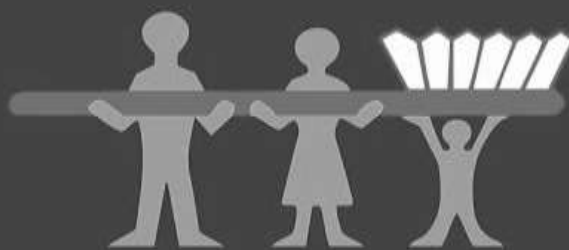
