Yesterday was Mitzvah Day. It was heartwarming to see so many people come out to do good deeds, learn new things or make this world a better place. We wish we lived in a world where some of the groups would be unnecessary or superfluous; it would be

wonderful if no one ever needed blood; it would be wonderful if no one ever needed CPR; it would be wonderful if there were no hostages being held against their will. But that is not the world we live in. Here are some impressions I and others have from our 25th Mitzvah Day.

Critical Mass matters sometimes. It was wonderful having as many people show up as we did. Between registrations, walk-ins, off-site activities and those who only dropped off stuff or sent in contributions, we probably had around 600 participants. That is more than last year but significantly less than pre-Covid times. It was good seeing some people there whom I have not seen in forever. It was sad not seeing others there, who, in the past, had been stalwart supporters of the day. One person there had just retired and had been to 25 Mitzvah Days. Another, also had been to 25 days but they were only 31. There were 80-year-old people who were attending their first as well as two-year-old kids also attending their first.

But the critical mass part was that you could feel the excitement in the air. It's the same with services. Zoom is nice but being there with others is nicer.

Generosity is not dead. One or two of the organizations that were present thanked us for our help and our concern. We are not the only organization they work with. Some of them are significantly larger than ours. Yet we are way more supportive in what we do and what we give.

Nurturing Young Minds: Exploring First Grade Reading and Phonics Philosophy

The first-grade marks a crucial stage in a child's educational journey, especially in the realm of reading and phonics. This foundational year sets the stage for a lifetime of literacy, making it essential to understand and appreciate the philosophy behind first grade reading and phonics education. In this article, we will delve into the principles and strategies that guide our first-grade team in fostering a love for reading and building strong phonics skills amongst first graders.

Our first-grade students are exposed to a variety of texts that allow them to apply their phonics knowledge in context. This integration helps them transfer decoding skills to real-world reading situations. Recognizing that students have different learning styles, we often employ a multisensory approach to phonics instruction. This involves incorporating auditory, visual, and kinesthetic elements to engage learners and reinforce letter-sound relationships. Our first-graders explore word families and patterns, learning to recognize common phonetic elements in words. This approach aids in developing both decoding skills and the ability to identify familiar chunks of words, enhancing overall reading fluency. Alongside phonics instruction, our first-grade students are introduced to high-frequency words (sight words) that may not strictly follow phonetic rules. These words are crucial for building reading fluency and comprehension. Our first-grade classrooms are filled with interactive and engaging phonics activities. Games, puzzles, and interactive technology are

used to make learning phonics enjoyable, fostering a positive attitude toward reading. Recognizing the diverse learning needs of our students, we employ <u>differentiation</u> strategies. This ensures that each student receives targeted instruction to address their unique strengths and areas of growth in reading and phonics.

First-grade is a formative year for young readers, and the philosophy behind reading and phonics instruction plays a vital role in shaping their literacy skills. By embracing systematic phonics instruction, integrating reading activities, and employing a multisensory approach, we, at Beth Emet School, create a rich learning environment that nurtures the love for reading and lays the groundwork for future academic success. As we delve into the intricate world of first-grade reading and phonics philosophy, we recognize the profound impact it has on unlocking the doors to a lifetime of knowledge and imagination.

The masks we wear...

I love Purim! We come to school in costumes and we dance and celebrate with our Early Childhood Students. And we are happy, and so are the students! Children love costumes and the world of make believe. What do they love about it? Is it the opportunity to be a princess or a superhero? Do they try on new characters with courage and joy? What is it about costumes that so many people love, so much so that adults continue to have costume parties into adulthood - one of the few early childhood activities that has longevity!

Costumes allow us the opportunity to be who we want to be. We can hide behind masks, while at the same time, costumes bring a joy and a silliness to our experience. With costumes we can express ourselves in new ways that suddenly seem appropriate because we have on a costume.

Perhaps it is the same for children. With costumes they can explore who they are and who they want to be. With Early Childhood students we spend a great deal of time working on our identity. We discover

who we are independently and in the community of the classroom, as well as in the community of our school. Each activity and experience our students take is a step forward into their journey of discovery as they build their identity. When we collect Tzedakah, some of them eagerly part with their change while others struggle with letting go. When we go in the art room, some of them approach materials with a freedom of creative expression while others step back, carefully approaching the art materials before them. In the millions of social interactions that happen daily, children determine when to take a turn, when to give a turn, and when to help a friend get a turn. They try on capes and magic wands and sometimes they are just themselves trying on different personalities and traits as they grow! We are alongside them, supporting, encouraging, and wondering about who we are.



As I dress up this year, and I smile and parade and march with our children, I will remind myself of the masks we wear each day. Some of us smile when life is hard, while some of us hide our true feelings and struggles. As you think about the masks you wear or maybe someone you know wears each day, let's remind ourselves of the compassion our children are learning at school. We walk in our own shoes and we do not know what is truly behind the mask of others. May we see light and good in each other even when it is hiding behind a mask.

In Jewish custom we sometimes make Mishloach Manot, baskets or little goody bags, to bring to a neighbor or a friend during Purim. We continue to build our compassion and understanding of taking care of others. Perhaps you want to make one at home as a family for a neighbor or someone you know that is in need, or just to tell someone you care about them! Together if we cultivate compassion one goody bag at a time, perhaps we can celebrate the life we live each day with an increased awareness of kindness, compassion, and strength! I am so proud to be part of a school, Temple, and community that strives to do this each day.

Making Memories Along the Journey...

There are many stepping stones to becoming a member of our Jewish adult community. Temple Beth Emet, as your family's partner, walks side by side with you as we believe that it takes a village to raise a Jewish mensch. Most of these stepping stones, large and small, are joint projects between the Temple, the teachers, the students and the parents.

The term Bar/Bat Mitzvah translates as "son/daughter of commandment." It is the time when a young Jewish person becomes responsible to observe the mitzvot of the Torah. One of the milestones in your child's Jewish journey is the Bar/Bat Mitzvah ceremony. Last year, our 5th grade families participated in "The Companion Siddur" experience, which marked the beginning of the Bar/Bat Mitzvah journey. They performed the hiddur mitzvah of creating beautiful covers for their personal siddur, along with an inscription written to the students by you, the parents. The decorated siddur and personalized inscription were presented to each student by their parents at a special Shabbat service. This past month, the 6th Grade families continued to create memories as they took part in the "Bar/Bat Mitzvah Journey" experience.

We began the morning by asking the families to share seven words that come to mind to describe Bar/Bat Mitzvah. As the families submitted their answers, a word cloud (see below) starting populating right before our




eyes. The bigger words are the ones that were submitted the most. Afterwards, the families met with Rabbi Greenspon and Rabbi DeWoskin to learn about the how the portions (parshiyot) are divided up throughout the lunar year of the Hebrew calendar. They also explored the meaning of a parsha and how to make the connection with their personal life. Students then interviewed their parents about their Bar/Bat Mitzvah experience or other important milestones that they had experienced as teenagers. Parents also had the opportunity to share with their child their expectations from them. The Journey experience concluded with each family creating their own tallit bag to use on their special day. Our Merkaz Limud and Beth Emet Middle School 6th grade

families added TBE to their personal memory albums. It was definitely an illuminating and inspiring morning!






