



Here are some book suggestions to help your child (and you) and prepare for their first day of preschool.




What to Expect at Preschool by Hidi Murkoff


My Preschool by Anne Rockwell


Hello School by Priscilla Burris


Mouse's First Day of School by Lauren Thompson
