Pesach 2024

What is your favorite Passover memory? While many of mine are from my childhood, our children have vivid memories of tunes, moments, and how during the year they pick on their dad, reminding him of Passover's past, parroting his chant for the words of the Haggadah.

One of those memories for me is having my mother-in-law join us for seders. Each year, I

would drive from Boston to Bridgeport to pick her up from the Port Jeff ferry. We always had an interesting conversation on the way home. Early the next morning she would be up boiling and peeling her potatoes for her famous German style potato salad. I can still see her at the kitchen table with the peeler in hand as I made my way to shul for the fast of the first-born. By the time I came home, the brisket was in the oven, the matzah balls were made, and the chicken soup was waiting for me to help pour into containers for not only the seder, but for the entire year. And then she waited for me to bring out of the car the Dunkin donuts and coffee to be eaten only in the garage, as the last chametz prior to Passover.

One year, however, the docking mechanism that permitted the ferry to unload stopped working as the boat that she was on was close to Bridgeport. The ferry returned back to Port Jefferson. It was midafternoon when the decision was made that I would drive the 5 ½ hours from the Boston area to her home and back to bring her to our home, because what was Passover without her? How could Passover be without our kid's grandmother at the table?!

Unfortunately, at ninety-four years of age, she no longer can join us for Passover, the trip being too long. However, she will be with us in spirit as we now have to enlarge our table to include two more.

One of the questions that clearly needs to be addressed at our Seder is how do we recite the plagues this year, knowing that the last plague, which in my opinion, represents October 7th through this day – the taking of hostages, the death of so many at the Supernova gathering and concert and the death of so many IDF soldiers. Needless to say, we are pained at the loss of any innocent life and anyone who is a civilian in harm's way. (Might that be the ninth plague?) We recognize that Hamas can be likened to the Pharaoh, his taskmasters and his army.

One of the sad realities related to those whose bodies are held by Hamas and others, and those who are hostages, is that their families remain pained by how they will celebrate Passover. Will the words of the Seder bring them any meaning?

President's Message




Dear Beth El Congregants,

Soon it will be sixth months since the vicious and savage attack on Israel took place on Oct. 7th. It's hard to imagine what life must be like for the >100 hostages in captivity in Gaza (who knows how many of the 134 hostages are still alive?), or the families of these hostages who stagger through tortured lives awaiting news of the fate of their loved ones. We hear rumors of negotiated deals to return the hostages and bring an

end to the war, but so far nothing has materialized. And, sad to say, on the stage of world opinion, the plight of the civilian population of Gaza appears to be far more important than Israel's very existence. In addition, pressure on Israel seems to be coming from all sides, including our own ranking US Senator from New York who is calling for the Israeli people to replace their duly elected Prime Minister and, appallingly, Jonathan Glazer, the director of the Oscar-winning film Zone of Interest, ostensibly about the inevitable consequences of dehumanization. However, I'm inspired by a speech that Rabbi Zauzmer gave at the Park Street (NYC) Synagogue a few days ago. While she criticized Jonathan Glazer for generalizing the Holocaust, i.e., for not recognizing that the victims of the Holocaust suffered uniquely for their Jewishness, she drew an interesting parallel with the story of Purim. In contrast to Jonathan Glazer, who was given a platform on which to speak, and abdicated his responsibility to focus on the dehumanization of Jews by Hamas (to carry out their barbarous attack), Esther took the path of bravery, and jeopardized her comfortable position as queen of Persia to stand up for the Jewish people. In fact, she risked her life to approach the king and expose herself as Jewish. Rabbi Zauzmer then challenged all of us. What will we do when given an opportunity to speak? Will we hide comfortably by saying that we feel sadness and compassion for all the victims of the war in Gaza, on both sides of the conflict (albeit true), or will we be brave and speak out, pointing out the asymmetry of the conflict, that Israel is fighting for survival against an enemy that has sworn to repeat Oct. 7th again and again. I hope I will be able to choose the latter. Once again, I pray for a speedy end to this conflict with Israel achieving its goals. May Hashem protect our troops and the Jewish people everywhere.

Turning to some better news, as I'm sure everyone has already heard, at the end of February we received approval from the two key committees of the Town of Waterford, the Design and Review Board and the Planning and Zoning Commission. The deadline for residents of Waterford to appeal these approvals has already passed, so we are good to go, and our next step is to go out for bid with construction documentation. That documentation is in process and is likely to be ready by mid-month. Also, Ed Goldberg, Chair of the Building Committee, has been working with our architect to prepare "preliminary" drawings and site information which he will be sending to several contractors so they can begin preparing their bids in advance of the completed construction documents, with the intent to shorten the bid time. Ed has indicated that we don't know if this will be successful, but it's worth a shot.

Turning to programming, the Breakfast Club event that was postponed due to inclement weather in February was held at the Waterford Community Center on Mar. 10. This started off with a morning minyan followed by a bagel and lox breakfast. Unfortunately, due to a calendar mix-up, our invited speaker, Stacey Sobel, CT Regional Director at ADL, who was to speak on antisemitism, did not attend. Despite this, Rabbi Kideckel was able to engage the group on a vibrant discussion of our personal experiences with antisemitism, and Marissa Goldberg provided some much-needed information on the laws regarding hate speech in CT. This turned out to be a greatly successful event. Kudos to Artie & Barbara Dean for organizing the event, setting up and providing the food.

Mechirat Chametz: The Selling of Unleavened Products

According to Jewish tradition, one must not have any *chametz*, unleavened products, in his/her legal possession during Passover. In a simple economy one could easily manage this; if by chance a bit was left over it could easily be disposed of. However, today, when people store a large quantity of food in their homes, it would be difficult and a serious waste to dispose of all the not-for-Passover use food products inside one's home. In order to fulfill the requirement that we have no *chametz* in our legal possession during Pesach we put our not-for-Passover foods in a hard to reach place in our homes (e.g. the top of a closet or cabinet, in a far corner of the basement or attic), tape or lock it up (lest someone accidentally use it), and sell the *chametz* to a non Jew. The sale is a conditional one, which must be completed at the end of Pesach or the sold items revert back to the original owner.

ALL CHAMETZ MUST BE DISCARDED OR PUT AWAY BEFORE MONDAY, APRIL 22ND AT 11:00 A.M.





As anti-Semitism continues to spout its evil message here in America and around the globe, we too sense a unique pain in our world. Just the other week, in a small city in Maine, a supermarket's kosher display was doused with shrimp sauce and juice. It is easy for us this year to include not only the historic reality of the story from the Torah, but also the many stories throughout the generations of the persecution of the Jewish people. It seems to me quite appropriate this year to recite the paragraph "shefoch chamatcha," "pour out your wrath upon those who wreak havoc on the Jewish world!" "Vehi she'amda," "in every generation we have a guardian Who watches us and protects us and stands up against our enemies, despite the fact that our enemies wish to destroy us." This year these words are not only historical, but factual. I'm also keen to recite the words "ani ma'amin," in some form or other hoping and believing in the coming of a peaceful end and resolution as well as "leshana ha-ba-a b'Yerushalayim," "next year in Jerusalem."






