# Beineinu - Between Us

This month, we say *l'hitraot* to Henderson Grant, our long time Maintenance Supervisor. Grant has been a tremendous friend and a critical part of the synagogue for decades. We will all miss him and wish him much happiness.

One of the most important turning points in Moses's life came when he saw the Egyptian taskmaster beating a Hebrew slave. The Torah tells us *vayifen ko vachoch* - Moses looked this way and that way and then he struck down the Egyptian. Many commentators have focused on this phrase: "He looked this way and that way." Why did Moses look before he intervened? One explanation is that Moses was waiting to see if anyone would step in to save the slave. The sages taught, "Where there is no man, strive to be a man." Moses understood that, in this instance, justice depended upon him and he needed to step forward and act.

Another way to see the text is that Moses was waiting to see if an Egyptian would intervene. Seeing none, he took matters into his own hand. The lesson: Often, when Jews face oppression, the world looks on in silence. In our day, we know the meaning of this teaching from the sad reality of the Holocaust. We also see it in the ostracization and isolation Israel so often faces in the international arena. As Jews, we must stand up for ourselves. We know we cannot rely upon others.

A third way of understanding this passage is that Moses was waiting to see if another Hebrew would try to save his brother. But none did. The lesson here is that we must remember that *kol Yisrael arevim zeh ba-zeh* - all Israel are responsible for one another. When we see another Jew in need, we should be the first to seek to help.

Taken together, these three lessons teach us we need to always step forward and take action whenever we see suffering and injustice in the world. We have a special obligation to look out for fellow Jews and to defend our people. At the same time, we have an equal obligation to stand up for compassion and justice toward all people.

This Passover, make a commitment to follow in the steps of Moses and stand up for compassion and justice. Best wishes to you and your family for a joyous Pesach!

# Learning Through Experience: A Passover Tradition

Among the goals of our congregation's strategic plan for education is to provide experiential learning opportunities for students and families. This year, we have done

that through Shabbat dinners and Shabbatonim, a unique tallit-making project for pre-B'nai Mitzvah students, a tefillin workshop for B'nai Mitzvah students where they can receive their own set (thanks to donor support), family programs for the holidays on Shabbat mornings, a shofar-making workshop, olive oil press for Hanukkah and more!

Yet, as we continue to develop more experiential learning opportunities for students and families, it is easy to forget that the Jewish people have been practicing experiential education for millennia, long before it was trendy. What have we been doing, you ask? Maybe you've heard of it: the Passover seder.


Rather than simply telling a story, the seder allows us to become part of the story. We sing songs, place symbolic foods on our seder plate and declare our obligation to feel as though we personally came out of Egypt. Bitter herbs recall the bitterness of slavery, parsley dipped in salt water our ancestors' tears, and matzah our hurried departure from Egypt. The Talmud teaches that the goal of the seder is precisely to prompt questions so we learn more.

Perhaps you can enrich your seder this year with a new custom or two. I would love the opportunity to speak with you about a variety of customs you might consider, or you (or your children) can create your own ritual to share!

We already have an incredible example of experiential education right in our own homes on Passover, and each year we have the ability to make it an even more memorable experience!
