Rabbi's Message

"HOPE FOR THE NEW YEAR"

I want to begin by wishing everyone a happy and healthy New Year: may 2024 be filled with peace, love, health, joy, and blessing for all of us.

In many ways, I am not ready for 2023 to end. This has been a big year for us at Temple Sinai. There have been many highlights, many wonderful moments and exciting events shared by our community. I want to thank you, our Temple Sinai Family, for all of your support, your participation, your love and concern for our congregation and community – for all that you do. Please know how much it means to me and to our staff, leadership, members, and beyond.

As I write this column, I am forced to look ahead to the new year. I am excited about 2024 and looking forward to a busy and meaningful year. Our goal is to provide everyone opportunities to connect: to connect with me and Cantor Garfein, connect with your Judaism, with our community, and with our people. We try to offer something for everyone, from our youngest to our oldest, our most involved and to our not as active members. Please remember: the more you put into your involvement in Temple life, the more you will get out of it. And we always love to see you.

I hope in 2024 you will consider attending our Shabbat services, as well as holiday observances and educational opportunities – in addition to our social action projects and social functions.

There is something special happening each Shabbat at Temple this month. We begin on Friday, January 5 with our monthly anniversary and birthday blessings. On Saturday, January 6 we will welcome Ben DiCristina as a Bar Mitzvah during our Shabbat morning service – *Mazal Tov* to Ben and his entire family! On Friday, January 12 our Shabbat Evening Service shifts to 6:00PM, and all are invited to our monthly Congregational Shabbat Dinner – please plan on joining us and making your reservation in advance. On Friday, January 19 we will hold our Bim Bam Kids Club Shabbat at 5:30PM – a special way of welcoming Shabbat with our youngest kids and their families. I

hope you will join Cantor Garfein and me for a fun Friday evening experience. Friday, January 26 is *Shabbat Shirah* – the Sabbath of Song, as we read the Song of the Sea from the Book of Exodus. To make this Shabbat even more joyful and special we will be holding our second *Shabbat B'Shir* Service, featuring additional musicians and lots of singing.

In January we will also observe Tu Bishevat — the 15th day of the Hebrew month Shevat. Tu Bishevat is known as the "birthday of the trees." It is when we celebrate nature and are reminded of our dependence on the earth and of our obligation to take good care of our environment. In addition to being our "green holiday," Tu Bishevat also connects us with the land of Israel. In Israel, the worst parts of the winter are over and the first new buds — usually on the *shekeidiyah*, the almond tree — begin to appear. New life appears and reminds us that the circle and flow of life continue.

I think this is especially important for us this year. 2023 is ending with Israel still at war with Hamas, fighting a brutal enemy for its survival. There are still more than 100 hostages being held in Gaza, and rockets continue to fall in both the south and the north of Israel. Israel is under attack; Israel is scared. Too many innocent people have been killed – both in Israel and in Gaza. Too many soldiers have lost their lives.

As we enter 2024 and look forward to the first buds of new life, we pray that they will bring hope for a better tomorrow for the land and people of Israel and for all of Israel's neighbors. May they be blessed with peace and friendship. May 2024 see an end to this war and a new beginning of safety and security for all in the region. And may this be the year that sees a decrease in anti-semitism, hatred, prejudice, and violence – and an increase in love, compassion, care, and friendship, when enemies become partners, with all working together to make this world a better place.

Memories of Martin Luther King, Jr. Verdie Richburg, Committee Member

President Reagan signed a bill in 1983 to create a federal holiday to honor Dr. King due to his commitment to equal rights and justice for all, and the first observance of Martin Luther King Jr. Day on January 20, 1986. As I thought of the January 2024 Martin Luther King Jr. Holiday, I reflected on my family's direct involvement in the civil rights movement, at my mom's "dining room sessions," helping with education and voter registration. The older girls (myself included) served refreshments as my mom coached the rural citizens in our community so that they could recite the Preamble to the Constitution in order to vote; my dad provided transportation to the polls. This was critical work given the large-scale disenfranchisement of Black voters. At a time of great inequality, Dr. King believed that peace and economic justice were critical human rights for all people across the country regardless of race, color, or creed. He demanded those rights through peaceful protest, but violence ended his life when he was assassinated on April 4, 1968.

As we celebrate his life and work, I offer a few notes of interest about his life: When he was five years old, his name changed from Michael King, Jr. to Martin Luther King, Jr. because his father was so impressed by the history of Protestant Reformation leader Martin Luther; he received a bachelor's degree at age 19 from Moorehouse College and earned a Doctorate Degree in systematic theology from Boston University in 1955; he led the Montgomery bus

boycott that lasted 385 days when on December 1, 1955, a seamstress named Rosa Parks was arrested for refusing to give up her seat on a city bus; he delivered some of the most iconic speeches of the 20th century, including the most well-known "I Have A Dream" one he made on August 28, 1963 at the March on Washington held at the Lincoln Memorial; he was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize in 1964 for his civil rights and social justice activism that were enacted into law with the passage of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 and the 1965 Voting Rights Act.

On a final personal note, as a young college student in North Carolina during the 60's, I remember my cousin and I playing a prank so that we could meet Dr. King during a visit to our campus. Also, in August 1963, tired and exhausted, I left my older sister behind at the March on Washington!

Finally, as Sinai's Tzedek Chair, Luz Molina, reminds us, Temple Sinai has a long history of involvement in our community's social justice issues that are consistent with our Jewish values. American Jews played a significant role in the founding and funding of some of the most important civil rights organizations, including the NAACP, the Leadership Conference on Civil and Human Rights, the Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC) and the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee (SNCC).



MAZAL TOV ON BECOMING A BAR MITZVAH!

Benjamin Joseph DiCristina

January 6 2024 25 Tevet 5784

Benjamin's first and middle names are Hebrew. Benjamin means son of the right hand. Benjamin's older sister, Abigail, chose his name more than two years before he was born. Benjamin loves that his nickname, Ben, means son. Abby could not have chosen a more perfect name for her baby brother, Ben.

Abby and Ben's parents, Lara and Shane DiCristina, chose Ben's Hebrew name. His Hebrew and middle name is Joseph after his maternal great-grandfather, Dr. Joseph Namer. Joseph means *G-d will add*. After years of prayers, G-d added Ben to the DiCristina family on the sixth night of Hanukkah in 2010. Ben's family considers Ben to be their Hanukkah miracle. Ben can be best described using a single Yiddish word: *mensch. Mensch* is a Yiddish word meaning "a person of integrity and honor". Ben has a strong moral compass. Ben quickly identifies the child who is shy, lonely, or struggling and befriends him or her.

He advocates for children who are being teased or left out. He rescues animals and often adopts his rescues as pets. Ben loves to laugh. Overhearing someone refer to Ben as a *mensch*, typically triggers his infectious laughter. He is convinced that Yiddish is a language that makes nearly every word sound hilarious.
